Change in Superintendents.

Some weeks ago Mr. L. D. Wade, superintendent of the water and light plants, tendered his resignation to the commission, to take effect when his successor was secured. The commission engaged Mr. E. G. Couch to take the place and he arrived a few days ago to enter upon the duties. Mr. Couch comes well recommended as a superintendent of such plants and electrical engineer, having had much experience.

RECITAL AT GRADED SCHOOL.

Pupils Acquit Themselves With Much Credit.

Seldom a day passes that does not bring forth something to make us prouder of Greenville and the progress the town is making. It has been said, not so very long in the past, that Greenville had no really accomplished musicians, but the day is close by when this cannot be said any more, for there will be many of them. Wonderful development in this art has been made here in the past year, and the talent of our rising generation is showing itself. There has been no more gratifying demonstration of this than in the recital Friday night by the music pupils of graded school.

The chapel of the building was filled to overflowing and the appreciation of all that transpired was fully shown. The Reflector has previously published the program and will not report it now, but it can be truly said that it was delightfully rendered. The singing and instrumental selections were all good and showed excellent training. The little tots and the largest pupils were all generously applauded, and it was richly deserved.

During an intermission Prof. H. B. Smith made some statements in regard to the graded school. During the present session 412 pupils have been enrolled, taxing the capacity of both the building and the teaching force. In the second grade which contains 51 pupils and the eighth grade which contains twenty four there were none absent and none tardy during the month of November, a record worthy of mention. He took advantage of the opportunity to urge the parents present to keep their children regularly in school, and not allow them to be absent or tardy if it can possibly be avoided. Frequent absence retards the progress of the child.

Greenville has every reason to be proud of the graded school and the work it is doing, and especially the music department and the splendid progress in the development of this art.

PLANNING A BIG EVENT.

When the Trustees of Eastern Carolina Training School Inspect New Building.

The board of trustees of the Eastern Carolina Training School will hold their next meeting in Greenville December 31st and have invited the State Board of Education to sit with them at the meeting, the object of which will be to inspect the work thus far done on the new buildings, and to consider plans for their equipment and the futher interests of the school.

Governor Glenn and all the other members of the Board of Education have agreed to attend the meeting on that day and take part in the ceremonies. It is being planned to make the occasion one of great public interest and each member of the board is looking forward to it with a large amount of pleasure.

This visit of Governor Glenn's will be one of his last official acts in the school work, and he is greatly interested in the exercises. He will probably deliver an address, as will also State Superintendent Joyner and Superintendent Ragsdale, of the Pitt county schools.—Raleigh News and Observer.

It gives us pleasure to learn that the State Board of Education will meet with the trustees of the Teachers' Training School in Greenville on the 31st, inst. We are authorized to State that a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce has already been called for Monday night, 21st, at 7:30, to take action in reference to the coming of the board. This will be a very important meeting and it is hoped that every member of the chamber will be in attendance. We are sure that the trustees of the school and the State Board of Education will be highly gratified at the work done upon the buildings, as is everybody else who sees them.

Our Country's Banking.

The annual report of the Comptroller of the Currency shows that there are twenty-five thousand banks and banking institutions in this country, which means one to about every 3,500 of the inhabitants. The deposits amount to over thirteen and a quarter billion dollars, a sum four times greater than the entire stock of money in the country. The total of the capital, deposits, surplus and circulation of these institutions amount to over seventeen and a half billion dollars, which is three times greater than was the banking power of the country in 1890. Eleven thousand banks have been organized since that year and deposits have increased by over five billion dollars. The banking power of the world is forty-five billion dollars, of which our country, as stated above, has over seventeen and a half billions, leaving less than twenty-eight billions for the other countries. The percentage of increase in this country during this period has been 242 against 159 in the other countries. These figures show the wonderful progress our country has made in business and commercial lines, and if increase in banking facilities means increase in prosperity then we have far outstripped the balance of the world in that also. - Wilmington Star.
