TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION.

Saturday's Session One of the Best Held.

The weather though threatening did not at all prevent a large attendance at the meeting Saturday.

The devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. J. H. Shore, pastor of the Jarvis Memorial Methodist church, in a very impressive manner, after which the regular programme was taken up.

The first topic, "How we teach Agriculture", was ably discussed by Profs. J. A. McArthur, of Ayden graded school and W. H. Cale, of Grifton graded school. They showed the great importance of learning how and why certain things are done on our farms.

The next topic, "Language in the first grades" was discussed by Miss Annie L. Irvine of the Greenville graded school. Miss Irvine is one of our very ablest teachers and her paper was greatly enjoyed.

Following this Miss Cora Moore, of the Farmville graded school, read one of the strongest papers on "Literature in the sixth and seventh grades" ever produced in the history of the association. She took Evangeline and Miles Standish as a basis. This was indeed a treat to all present.

Prof. H. B. Smith, of the Greenville graded school, made a short but very beneficial talk on map drawing in geography work. He also made a several remarks in regard to the manual training enthusiasm that had recently taken place in Anson county. The meeting then adjourned till 2 o'clock.

At 2 o'clock the Woman's Betterment Association was called to order by Prof. F. C. Nye, of Winterville High School. Those who did not attend the afternoon meeting undoubtedly missed one of the best features of the whole day. Two most excellent papers were read by Misses Elizabeth Boushall, of Winterville High School and Ran Archer, of Falkland school. The subject of Miss Boushall's paper was, "What and how the Betterment Association shall do?" The subject of Miss Archer's paper was "The Association as it affects the moral and social uplift of the community."

The reports from the vice presidents of the several townships, some of them especially, were interesting indeed. Only time can tell what this betterment work means to the up building of the Old State.

Saturday's meeting was good indeed. The attendance was fine and the programme was of a high order.

BILL TO ISSUE BONDS.

To Pay Floating Indebtedness of Town of Greenville.

Following is a copy of the bill the legislature will be asked to pass relative to the town of Greenville:

A bill to be entitled an act to authorize the town of Greenville to fund its floating debt, and to issue interest bearing securities therefor.

Whereas, the town of Greenville has outstanding obligations in the form of notes and accounts incurred in making necessary improvements in said town in paving and repairing streets, and in repairing and enlarging the water, light and sewerage systems of said town, which are owned by the town of Greenville!

Whereas, the revenues of said town are insufficient to meet its current expenses and pay off and discharge said floating indebtedness, therefore:

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

Section 1. That the town of Greenville is hereby authorized and empowered to issue interest bearing notes or bonds to fund its present floating indebtedness, in a sum not to exceed twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000); said notes or bonds shall run for such time, not to exceed fifteen years, and bear such interest, not to exceed six per cent payable semi annually, as the Board of Aldermen of said town may determine.

And the said board may provide in issuing the said notes or bonds that certain amounts and numbers of them shall be due and payable each year as the same may be called for by said board.

Section 2 That said Board of Aldermen may exchange said notes or bonds with the holder or holders of said floating indebtedness, dollar for dollar, or they may sell said bonds for cash, and with the proceeds of such sale pay off and discharge said indebtedness or any part of the same, provided that no note or bond shall be exchanged or sold for less than par.

Section 3. That said Board of Aldermen shall cause a record to be made and kept by the board, of the number and amount of bonds issued under this act, and of the sale or exchange and for what price or upon what terms.

Section 4 The said Board of Aldermen shall cause to be levied and collected each year a sufficient tax upon real and personal property and polls in said town to pay the semi annual interest on said notes or bonds and to pay the principle or said bonds as they may fall due each year.

Section 5. This act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

Working for the Town.

The statement of The Home Building & Loan Association, published in this issue, should be of interest to every citizen of the town. This association is not quite three years old, yet in this short time it has loaned more than \$40,000 to people with which to build homes. The figures show exactly what the association is doing. Every business man and every wage earner in the town ought to have some shares in it.

Pitt Lady Dies in Tarboro.

On Sunday night the wife of Mr. J. I. Barnhill, of Tarboro, died in that town. Mrs. Barnhill was taken suddenly ill Sunday afternoon and lived only a few hours. The family moved to Tarboro from Bethel section of this county.

STATE NEWS.

Happenings of Interest in North Carolina.

Kinston, Feb. 13.—The Norfolk & Southern freight office was entered last night and the cash drawer robbed of \$75 by a robber who has thus far covered his tracks successfully. Entrance was effected through a window on the south side of the office, the nail holding the sash down having been worked loose and the sash raised. A string of box cars on the sidetrack shut off the electric light and furnished a friendly cover under which the robber operated.

Durham, Feb. 13.—L. V. Cash, a young fireman, was perhaps fatally injured tonight in an effort to catch the hook and ladder wagon when called out on a false alarm. He was thrown violently to the pavement and the wagon passed over him, giving such internal injuries as to incapacitate him for all time.

Concord, Feb. 13.—One of the most shocking tragedies this county has experienced in many years occurred this afternoon about 5:30 o'clock when Pearle Faggart, 23 years old, cut her throat with a razor, severing the jugular vein, death resulting within half an hour. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel M. Faggart, of No. 6 township, who lived just six miles from this city. The woman was in her room at the time, having left the family fifteen minutes before she was found in a dying condition. When called to supper there was no response from her room, which caused the family to make the ghastly find when they did.

Salisbury, N. C., Feb. 13.—Policeman W. A. Monroe, of Salisbury, was shot and mortally wounded by Joe Jackson, a negro, here late tonight. Jackson was beating his wife when Police Monroe and Sicheloff were called to the scene on a dark street. Seeing the officers, Jackson ran and was pursued. He turned and fired and Monroe fell, with a bullet under his heart. He was carried to a sanatorium and his condition is decidedly critical. Jackson made his escape.

Sunday School Makes High Record.

On Sunday morning the Memorial Baptist Sunday school reached high water mark for general attendance, the record showing 248. In the Baraca class there were 67 men present. This is the highest record of the school except on one rally day. It was only a little more than a year ago that the Sunday school rooms were remodeled, and the school has grown so since then as to overcrowd its present quarters. A committee has been appointed to look into the matter of providing additional rooms.

Those who heard Mr. White before will be glad to hear him again, and those who did not hear him should not miss this opportunity. His voice is superb and he is equalled by few singers.

THE LEGISLATURE.

What Our Law Makers Are Doing at Raleigh.

THIRTY-FOURTH DAY. SENATE.

Saturday was a good day for local bills, and all but one of the new bills introduced was purely local in nature. The one exception was by Senator Spence for the protection of holders of accident insurance policies, providing that where a person holds a policy in more than one company and death arises from accident, the companies shall not be allowed to prorata the loss but each pay the full amount of policy. This is a very just measure.

The bill to amend the charter of Farmville passed third reading, and also the bill in regard to the time of holding courts in Pitt county.

HOUSE.

In the house there were no new bills of much importance, but several of a local nature.

The bill to amend the law as to the practice of medicine had a long discussion and then went over to another day for consideration. A bill to punish for non-payment of debt was lost on second reading.

The house is now holding night sessions.

"A merchant in one of the large eastern cities," says an advertiser's magazine, "composed a circular letter recently that looked to him like a trade-winner. He showed the letter and the results to an acquaintance in another line of business, who persuaded him to print the same letter, word for word, in a newspaper 'ad.' cost \$124. The profits on the sales directly attributed to it within three days were \$662.50, with mail orders still coming in at the end of that time. What is the moral?" There are several. The most obvious moral is that the daily newspaper carries business announcements at a much cheaper rate and with much greater certainty of effective delivery than Uncle Sam.

It is explained that they "do not want the substitute, which prohibits conspiracies to put down or keep down the price of what conspirators intend buying; yet they are afraid to oppose it lest they be put in the position of doing the very thing they have been so loud-mouthed in begging and beseeching others not to do." Seems to have put them in a hole, sure enough.—Charlotte Chronicle.

The management of our public institutions should be entrusted only to those men who have successfully managed their own affairs. And such men can safely be entrusted with the power to select all employees. Therefore we hope that the legislature will not pass a bill now pending that will take away the right of the directors of our public institutions to select their employees and gives that right to the superintendent. They should be as competent to select the employees as they are to select the superintendent.
