TO LENGTHEN SCHOOL TERM. WILL LEVY A SPECIAL TAX IF NEEDED.

Bill to Make Term at Least Four Months in Every District in the State.

The most important bill affecting the educational interests of North Carolina to come before the legislature at this session was introduced yesterday by Chairman Blow, of the senate committee on education. The bill is understood to have been prepared in the office of State Superintendent Joyner.

The title of this bill is to repeal sections 4112, 4098, 4100, 4101, 4102, 4103, 4104 and 4105 of the revisal of 1905 of North Carolina, and to provide for the levying of a special tax and for a special State appropriation for the maintenance of one or more public schools in every school district for a term of four months in each year and for a more equitable apportionment thereof. It amends section 4112 of the revisal by striking out all of said section and substituting in place thereof the following:

"On or before the first Monday in June of each and every year, the county board of education of each county shall ascertain the amount of money that will be needed to maintain the public schools of such county for four months during the succeeding school year. The board of education, using, as a basis the receipts for school purposes during the current school year ending June 30th, shall ascertain the amount that will be available for school purposes from the regular school tax, from fines and penalties, and from the amount appropriated under section 4097 of the revisal. If the amount to be received is less than the amount ascertained to be needed, the board of education shall submit a statement of the above facts to the board of county commissioners of such county; and it shall be the duty of the board of county commissioners to levy a special tax on all property and polls in said county to supply one-half the deficiency for the support and maintenance of the public schools of such county for four months: Provided, that this special tax shall not be less than one cent on the one hundred dollars valuation of property and three cents on each poll nor more than five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property and fifteen cents on each poll in any county. This tax shall be levied and collected as other county taxes are levied and collected and the funds thus raised shall be expended in such manner as the county board of education may determine for maintaining one or more public schools in each school district for four months in each year.

"The calculation of the amount that will be necessary shall state separately the amounts needed for supervision for administration, for buildings and repairs, for expenses, this to be itemized, and for salaries of teachers. The limitation placed by law on each of these objects shall not be exceeded. The county board of education shall further state the number of teachers, white and colored, to be employed in each district and the salary of each teacher in each district, and the average of salaries to be paid according to this statement shall not exceed the average salaries paid for the State during the preceding year for white teachers

and colored teachers respectively.

"In the event of a disagreement between the county board of education and the board of county commissioners as to the rate of tax to be levied, the county board of education may bring an action in the nature of mandamus against the board of county commissioners to compel the levy of such special tax in the manner and form as provided in sections 822 and 824 of the revisal of one thousand nine hundred and five of North Carolina, and it shall be the duty of the judge hearing the same to find the facts as to the amount needed and the amount available from the sources herein specified, which finding shall be conclusive, and to give judgment accordingly."

Sections 4099, 4100, 4101, 4102, 4103, 4104 and 4105 of the revisal are repealed, and in lieu thereof the following substituted:

"One hundred thousand dollars is hereby appropriated annually out of the State treasury for the benefit of the public schools, to be apportioned by the State Board of Education as follows: The treasurer of the county school fund and the county superintendent of public instruction of each county in which a special tax has been levied and collected by the county commissioners thereof to maintain one or more public schools in each school district of said county for a period of four months in each year shall make affidavit to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction on or before the second Monday in January of each year, stating the rate of the special tax so levied by said commissioners in June of the preceding year and the amount collected, and said affidavit shall be accompanied with a certified copy of the itemized statement submitted by the county board of education in accordance with which said levy of said special tax for schools was made, signed by the chairman of the county board of education and the county superintendent of public instruction, and such further information about the receipts and expenditures and apportionment of the school fund in said county as may be required by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction; and thereupon the State Board of Education shall apportion to said county from said appropriation a sum of money equal to the amount so collected from said special tax: Provided, that, if in any county that has levied and collected a maximum special tax of five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property and fifteen cents on the poll the funds are still insufficient to maintain in every school district one or more public schools for at least four months, an additional apportionment shall be made to said county of the additional amount necessary to provide a four-months school term in every school district in such county. The State Superintendent of Public Instruction shall issue a requisition on the State Auditor for the amount so apportioned to any county, who shall issue his warrant in favor of the county treasurer of said county for said amount, and the money shall be placed by said treasurer to the credit of the general public school fund of the county, to be used, first, for providing a four-months school term in every school district, and any balance to be used for equalizing, as nearly as may be, the terms of all the public

THE LEGISLATURE.

What Our Law Makers Are Doing at Raleigh.

THIRTY SEVENTH DAY.
SENATE.

Among the new bills were: To make the passing of a worthless check prima facie evidence of intent to defraud; to amend several sections of the laws of 1907 relative to the general school law (by Blow); to create two bank examiners instead of one; a joint resolution to adjourn March 3rd, to appropriate \$100,000 to furnish governor's mansion.

In this branch were also a large number of new local bills, and many former bills passed final reading.

HOUSE.

Among the new bills were: to increase the number of commissioners in Greene county; to allow governor to define state lines; to compel express companies to make prompt settlement on C. O. D. shipments; to repeal certain laws as to immigration; as to fees of state librarian; to amend laws as to riding on freight trains. The revenue act was also presented and ordered printed.

The fish bill, like Banquo's ghost, bobbed up again and a conference substitute bill was sent up to take its place. There was another long discussion that continued until adjournment to the night session.

Trade Report.

Richmond, Va., Feb 18, 1909.

Trade conditions generally show a tendency toward improvement. Shoes and leather goods are more active. Manufacturers of harness and saddlery report increased orders. Lumber is more active than at a comparative period of last month and manufacturers in this line are gradually resuming operations. Dry goods are reported more active. The tobacco market continues strong and previous prevailing prices are maintained. Cotton continues generally active, prices ranging up to 9 1/2 cents. While collections continue backward the tendency is toward improvement. Crop conditions are reported good. Retail trade is quiet.

The balance of the State appropriation of one hundred thousand dollars herein provided shall be apportioned by the State Board of Education to the respective counties of the State, per capita as to school population, as provided for the apportionment of the one hundred thousand dollars appropriated under Section 4097 of the Revisal; Provided, further, that the State Board of Education shall deduct from said appropriation biennially the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars for rural libraries, as provided in Section 4179 of the Revisal."

No county needing aid from this appropriation for a four-months school term in every district shall receive any funds therefrom until it shall have levied and collected the special tax required of it in this act for that purpose.—Raleigh News and Observer.

NEW BERN BANK CLOSES

Teller is Arrested and the Directors Issue Statement.

New Bern, N. C., Feb. 18 — "To the creditors of the National Bank of New Bern: The teller of this bank has defaulted and is under arrest. The directors have made good the shortage so that the capital stock, surplus and undivided profits stand as before the default, and all concerned are absolutely safe."

The above notice fastened upon the entrance door of the National Bank of New Bern late yesterday afternoon, signed by all of the directors of the bank and approved by the national bank examiner, was the first intimation that any such startling event had taken place with this bank. As soon as the defalcation became known cash was brought here, which is now in the bank's vaults, more than enough to cover every possible dollar lost and also every dollar that any emergency might demand, this besides the bank's customary cash funds.

The public street expression last night was not upon the bank's stability, but as to the defaulting teller, the sentiment being one of surprise and sorrow. The financial soundness of the bank was not discussed, much less questioned. The amount of reported defalcation is not public. Mr. J. R. B. Carroway, the teller, was taken before U. S. Commissioner Hill and gave bond for \$5,000 for appearance at a preliminary hearing set for Friday morning.

Anti-Jug Law Passed.

The House passed this afternoon the Knox anti-jug law, which was attached as a rider to the bill codifying the criminal laws. While the anti-jug measure is not as strong as the temperance people desired, it is the best the constitutional lawyers of the senate would agree to. In the opinion of Representative Page and other temperance advocates in the delegation the law will be very helpful to the authorities in prohibition States. The bill prevents C. O. D. shipments to prohibition States, and also requires that all packages containing liquor be so labelled. Probably the strongest feature of the measure is that requiring that shipments shall be bona fide and shall not be addressed to fictitious persons.—Washington Cor. Raleigh News and Observer.
