CORN JUDGING DAY.

GREAT GATHERING OF FARMERS AT HERTFORD.

An Occasion That Means Much to Farming Interests of Eastern North Carolina.

Mr. J. F. Evans, agent for Pitt county of the Farmers Co-operative Demonstration work, returned this morning from the corn growers meeting held in Hertford on the 9th, and dropped in to give The Reflector a report of the meeting.

There were estimated to be between 1,000 and 1,200 farmers present, practically every county in the first district being represented. Those from Pitt in attendance were J. F. Evans, J. T. Thorne, A. J. Moye, W. M. McArthur, J. B. Speight, S. H. Smith, S. C. Whichard and Peyton Atkinson.

There were 213 different exhibits of corn, 35 ears to each exhibit, some of it as fine as was ever seen anywhere.

The meeting was called to order by Congressman John H. Small, by whose efforts it had been arranged, and whose work in behalf of the farmers of his district is well known to all.

Maj. W. A. Graham, State commissioner of agriculture, made an address along general agricultural lines. Mr. Kile, of the bureau of plant industry, Washington, D. C., spoke on seed breeding and selection. J. P. Campbell spoke on preparation of the seed bed. C. R. Hudson, State agent of the Farmers Co-operative Demonstration work, spoke on cultivation of crops.

At 1 p. m. dinner was served the entire assemblage by the citizens of Perquimans county who showed the visitors every attention.

At the afternoon session an educational address was delivered by Dr. D. H. Hill, of the A. & M. College, who was followed by J. O. Wright, civil engineer and drainage expert, and several others in interesting short talks.

The judges of the corn exhibit were T. B. Parker, C. R. Hudson, C. B. Williams and J. P. Campbell. Congressman Small offered three prizes for the best exhibits, \$5, \$3 and \$2, respectively. The first prize was awarded to Mr. Stokesberry, of Pungo; the second to C. C. Archbell, of Aurora; the third to J. H. Carter, of Pungo.

A Corn Growers' Association for the first district was organized with the following officers: President—T. W. Blount, of Washington county.

Vice Presidents—Frank Wood, of Chowan county; R. O. Bagley, of Currituck county; Jonathan Havens, of Beaufort county.

Secretary and Treasurer—T. E. Brown, of Hertford county.

R. O. Bagley, of Currituck, had about 400 ears of fine seed corn at the meeting which was donated for distribution among the exhibitors.

Mr. Evans says the meeting at Hertford was one of the most interesting he ever attended, and he feels sure that much good will result from it. He is going to use his efforts to have a similar meeting held in Pitt county.

OIL TRUST MUST LEAVE MISSOURI.

State Supreme Court Refuses Rehearing.

Jefferson City, Mo., March 9.—The motions by the Standard Oil Co., of Indiana, and the Republic Oil Co., of Ohio, for a rehearing of the oyster suit recently decided against them and for a modification of the judgment were overruled by the Missouri Supreme court today.

The position of the Waters-Pierce Oil Co., was upheld, the motion of the Attorney-General for an absolute oyster of the Missouri Company being denied, the compliance with the court order recently filed by the company approved and the judgment of oyster against it being suspended.

The effect of these decisions is to expel the Indiana and Ohio companies from Missouri and to restore to the Waters-Pierce Co., sixty per cent of whose stock is held by the Standard Co., of New Jersey, the right to do business within the State.

Hon. C. B. Watson's Condition Serious.

Winston-Salem, N. C., March 9.—Hon. C. B. Watson's condition tonight is not as favorable as it was yesterday. He is unconscious and in such a state that physicians and nurses fear the end may come at any time.

Thirty Killed in Arkansas Tornado.

Brinkley, Ark., March 9.—Thirty or more lives were snuffed out, sixty persons were injured and property estimated to be worth one million dollars was destroyed as a result of the tornado which wrecked this little city last night.

Man Killed at Shelmerdine.

At Shelmerdine this morning two young colored men, Lawrence Taylor and Ed Harris, got into a row over a pair of gloves when Harris drew a pistol and shot Taylor twice through the head, killing him almost instantly. The body of Taylor was shipped to Whitakers, his former home, this afternoon.
