## PITT COUNTY'S WEALTH.

One Tax Payer in Seven Worth \$1,000 and Above.

The Reflector has been agreeably surprised at some facts in regard to the wealth of Pitt county furnished by Mr. H. A. Blow. A firm in another city engaged Mr. Blow to compile a list of people in this county who own \$1,000 and more of real estate. In preparing this list it was developed that there are in round numbers about 8,500 tax payers in Pitt county, and of these some over 1,300, or about one in seven, own real estate to the value of \$1,000 and above. The Reflector doubts if another county in the State can make a better showing than this.

## Trade Report.

Richmond, Va., March 11, 1909.

Bradstreet's Saturday will say for Richmond and vicinity:

Trade conditions generally are about as reported last week. Conservation in placing future orders is still noted but the tendency is toward improvement along practically all lines. Building operations show more activity with the approach of spring. Lumber shows more activity and inquiries show an increase. Wholesale dealers in and roasters of coffee report increased orders. Dry goods notions and shoes are in fair demand. Tobacco sales are large and the demand active. Weather conditions favorable to farming operations have prevailed during this week. Wholesale milliners report increased sales as the season advances, retail trade is fair. Collections in most lines show improvement.

## Oil Trust Released from Fine.

Chicago, Ills., March 10.—The Standard Oil Co., of Indiana today was found not guilty of accepting rebates from the Chicago and Alton Railroad on shipments of oil from Whiting, Ind., to East St. Louis, Ills. The verdict was returned by a jury in the Federal court on instructions of Judge Anderson, who averred that he followed the circuit court of appeals' decisions as to the verdict returned at the former trial of the same case when Judge Kenesaw Mountain Landis assessed a fine of \$29,240,000.

## STATE NEWS.

Happenings of Interest in North Carolina.

Wentworth, March 9.—One of the most deplorable and grievous accidents that has ever happened in any county occurred this morning at 3:30 o'clock when the building at the home for the aged and infirmed, one mile from here, which is used as an insane department, was totally consumed by fire and two human beings were burned into an unrecognizable mass.

A bouncing boy was born to Mr. and Mrs. Sut Hendrix, of Elk, last week. The new arrival has, we learn, six toes upon each foot and a thumb and six fingers upon each hand. This makes a total of twenty-six fingers and toes, whereas the usual apportionment is but twenty.—Wilkes Patriot.

Hinton Rowan Helper, a native of Davie county, this State, committed suicide in his room, No. 628, Pennsylvania avenue, northwest, Washington, Monday night by tying a towel about his neck and turning on the gas. His body was found half dressed lying across the bed and a physician was immediately summoned who stated that death had ensued some hours before.

## May Be The Death of Oil Trust Suit.

Chicago, Ill., March 9.—The government's case in the re-trial of the Standard Oil Co. of Indiana, which, so far, has fared unfortunately in Judge Anderson's court, narrowly averted a death blow today. Judge Anderson held that the government must prove as alleged in the indictment that there was a standard rate for oil shipments between Whiting, Ind., and East, St. Louis, at the time of the offenses with which the defendant is charged, and that the defendant knowingly accepted a lower rate. The court declared that the government must convince him that it would be able to prove this.

## Carr & Atkins Hardware Co.

The hardware business formerly conducted here by H. L. Carr has been converted into an incorporated company under the style of Carr & Atkins Hardware Co. H. L. Carr is president of the company and W. S. Atkins secretary and treasurer. Some others are interested with them as stockholders, but these two, who are both capable business men, will have the management of the business. The stock will be largely increased for carrying on an extensive hardware business.

## Will Enlarge Church.

The rapid growth of the Sunday school of Memorial Baptist church and the increased attendance upon the regular services of the church, has brought the congregation face to face with the problem that the building must be enlarged. Architect C. C. Hook, of Charlotte, has submitted two drawings looking to the needed enlargement which were considered by the church at a conference Wednesday night and referred to a committee for further consideration.

## B. F. Dixon Presides Over Blue and Gray.

Fitzgerald, Ga., March 10.—The eighth annual encampment of the National Association of Blue and Gray Veterans and their sons began a four day session here today. Major B. F. Dixon, of Raleigh, N. C., presiding.

## A Sensible Legislature.

## Looks Warlike in Central America.

Washington, D. C., Mar. 10.—Dispatches received at the State Department from Nicaragua say that notwithstanding the presence at Corite of the United States warships, South Dakota and Colorado, the warlike attitude of that part of Central America has not abated in the least. The dispatch says the conditions in Central America are threatening.

Potato growers of Aroostook probably know their business better than any other special farmers in this country. They study potatoes, think potatoes and eat potatoes the year around. They hire high-class experts to talk to them once in a while and sometimes they learn something new, but more often the best of them know more about potato growing than the experts. It is a wonder why our farmers do not pay more attention to potato growing. It is nearly always a profitable crop, but it is hard work, and then a great many farmers object to any crop that is in the nature of trucking. They seem to want to do great things on wide stretches and bore with a big auger, even if the financial chips are not so plentiful.—Modern Farming.

Legislative headlines are a thing of the past.

The Standard Oil Company must be feeling good over the Federal courts swinging around on its side.

The Raleigh Times says the recent legislature passed 1,819 bills and 57 resolutions, an average of 25 a day.

Since Mr. Roosevelt has departed, the report comes from Washington that the Annanias club is about to disband.

There is talk again of a combination to beat Speaker Cannon and prevent his reelection as speaker, but the old man will show that he can still work his tricks.

Willis L. Moore, the head of the government bureau, is pouring out his wrath upon the newspapers for criticising his weather predictions, especially as to inauguration day.

Greenville chickens seem to be aware that the late legislature restricted none of their privileges of scratching, and the way they are tearing up front yards is very exasperating to the owners of the yards. Chickens and dogs are privileged characters.

Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, the government pure food expert, in an address to a hundred college girls warned them against the soft drink habit. In his address Dr. Wiley said:

"If you only knew what I know about what those soft drinks contain, you would abstain from them. It will surprise you to know that most of them contain more caffeine than coffee, and a drug which is more deadly. So beware of the soft drink. It is more harmful than coffee, and I advise all young people against the use of this stimulant. Perhaps you would be interested to know I have collected more than one hundred samples of soft drinks at soda fountains and each contains caffeine and many of them a deadly drug."

### High Among Legislatures.

The legislature has adjourned amid the plaudits of the people—plaudits not given, as often heretofore, to the act of adjournment but to the legislature itself. Very seldom indeed have the people of North Carolina been quite so well served by their representatives. This legislature, meeting at a time when the State and the country sought rest after agitation, and when the business world was recuperating with difficulty from an upset, acted the part that became it best. Conservative counsels prevailed throughout; where decision was not easy, as in the matter of anti-trust legislation, conservatism received the benefit of the doubt. Appropriations for some purposes might have been a trifle more liberal. The good measures altogether failing of passage became few after the bill to

And now comes a Cooper lawyer in Tennessee advocating the right of any defaulting official to shoot down an editor who criticizes his political actions. The Roosevelts, the Coopers, and the Manila colonial officers would all like to destroy newspaper criticism. It can be done in the twilight zone of government in Manila, but cannot obtain in a really civilized community.—Raleigh News and Observer.
