## THE KING'S DAUGHTERS.

### STATE CONVENTION IN SESSION HERE.

#### Stonewall Jackson Training School the Topic of Morning Session.

At Wednesday afternoon session a letter was read from Rescue Circle, of Raleigh, asking to be allowed to withdraw from the convention. After some discussion it was decided to write the circle a letter and request it to retain membership.

It was also decided to write some other circles that had disbanded and urge them to reorganize and again take up their work with the convention.

Methods of carrying on the work of the circles to best advantage and plans for increasing interest were discussed by several of the delegates.

Wednesday night the attendance was very much larger than either of the day sessions, more of the people of the town being present. The devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. J. H. Shore. This service was in celebration of the twentieth anniversary of the order.

The principal speaker of the evening was Mrs. Burton, of Richmond, who gave a brief history of the order and summarized some of the great work it had done for humanity. Mrs. Burton is truly a charming and fluent speaker and said many good things in her address, none more forceful than her reference to the necessity for compulsory education.

Mrs. Burgwyn, who is a charming and graceful presiding officer, with appropriate introductory remarks called for other speakers and Mrs. T. J. Jarvis, of Greenville, and Mrs. D. Y. Cooper, of Henderson, responded in splendid addresses.

When Mrs. James Burton Cherry was called she sang a beautiful solo "The Ninety and Nine" and then read an interesting sketch of the Patient Circle, of Greenville.

Mrs. Shaw, of Rockingham, was to give the closing address at this service, but as she was detained at home by sickness her address was read by Mrs. A. L. Blow.

A silver offering was taken to help pay the indebtedness on The King's Daughters college at the Stonewall Jackson Training school, the collection amounting to \$190.85.

#### THURSDAY MORNING.

The devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. D. W. Arnold. Several letters and telegrams of congratulations and greetings were read.

A recess of 30 minutes was taken to give opportunity for an informal ballot on the nomination of officers of the convention for the next year.

After closing the informal ballot Mrs. Burgwyn made a report of the work being done on The King's Daughters cottage at the Stonewall Jackson Training school at Concord. Several of the delegates in discussing the report told of the encouragements and discouragements with which they had met in raising money for the cottage.

Mrs. R. R. Cotten, president of the Stonewall Jackson Association, made a report of her work during the year in raising funds for the school. Of the funds she had raised \$165 was tendered to The King's Daughters for their cottage, and was accepted with a rising vote of thanks. Adjournment was then had for

## STATE NEWS.

### Happenings of Interest in North Carolina.

Spring Hope, May 24.—Two negro boys, 4 or 5 years of age, are dead near here as a result of taking morphine administered late Saturday night by their father. The boys were the children of William Toney, a half-witted negro, who was married to Alice Howard some three weeks ago. Alice had one child. The evidence is that all three of the children were given morphine. The woman's child, however, has recovered from the effects of the drug.

Fayetteville, May 24.—Bradley Parker, a merchant of Parkersburg, Sampson county, was shot and instantly killed by Rural Mail Carrier Bass yesterday afternoon for refusing to sell a box of cartridges to Bass, who declared he wanted to kill another man. Parker remonstrated with the fellow and declined to open his store to procure the cartridges after Bass had threatened to kill him unless he did so, whereupon the mail carrier drew a revolver and shot him dead. Bass was arrested and placed in the Sampson county jail at Clinton. Parker was a prominent and highly esteemed citizen of Parkersburg.

Greensboro, N. C., May 26.—Albert Garrett, aged thirty-six, while operating his saw mill near Pleasant Garden, was instantly killed this afternoon by being struck on the head by a bolt flying from a broken piece of the machinery.

Wilson, N. C., May 25.—Sheriff Sharp received a 'phone call tonight from Elm City stating that a white tramp, weighing about 175 pounds, heavy mustache, several days' growth of beard, entered the home of E. O. McGowan, and demanded money of one of the ladies of the house. She promptly threw a gun in his face, when he took fright, coming in the direction of Wilson.

#### Trade Report.

Richmond, Va., May 27, 1909. Bradstreet's Saturday will say for Richmond and vicinity:

Trade conditions generally continue unchanged since recent reports, wherever a change is noticeable an improvement is noted. Dry goods and shoes are quiet. Groceries and produce are fairly active. Dealers in scrap iron and junk report better ordering. Foundries and manufacturers of steel and iron castings report inquiries more active and considerable orders have been placed recently. Sales in trunks, bags and furniture show improvement. A much needed rain has improved crop conditions throughout the district; cotton and tobacco planting is well under way; an increased acreage of corn is reported. Building continues active creating a considerable demand in supplies. Retail trade is quiet. Collections are slow.

## TROUBLE OVER SIDE TRACK.

### Citizens Try to Stop Railroad From Work.

There came near being serious trouble this morning over a spur track that is being laid on a portion of Pitt street by the Norfolk & Southern railroad.

The track of the Norfolk & Southern runs from the "Y" up South Pitt street to the depot. On this street at the northeast corner of Tenth street, Messrs Harvey & Ferrell are building a tobacco storage warehouse and wanted a side track to it. The railroad had applied to the town officials and received permission to run this spur track across Tenth street. In order to put in this spur it was necessary to start at the main track about 100 feet south of Tenth street and run the spur along the side of Pitt street to the warehouse, and this morning Section Master Dempsey had his crew doing this work.

On the opposite side of Tenth street from the new warehouse site is a building owned by Mr. R. O. Jeffress, by which the spur track would pass. Mr. Jeffress objected to the track going by his building, and with Mr. W. I. Skinner went out and ordered the men to stop work. Section Master Dempsey asked for their authority to stop the laying of the track, but none being shown ordered his men to go on with the work. At this Mr. Jeffress threatened bodily harm to any one who undertook to work further on the track, and serious trouble would have doubtless ensued had not Policeman George Clark appeared on the scene about this time and put a stop to it.

Under the circumstances it was deemed best for the work to stop until the board of Aldermen can meet and pass the proper order for it to proceed.

**DEMOCRATIC PRIMARIES.**

**To Select a Candidate for Mayor for Greenville.**

The General Assembly of North Carolina at its recent session, having so amended the charter of the town of Greenville, as to provide for the election of the mayor of said town by a direct vote of the people, instead of by the board of aldermen elect, as heretofore provided, and the duty having devolved upon the undersigned as chairman of the various ward executive committees of the town to provide some means for the nomination of a candidate for said office, to be voted for at the election to be held on the 7th day of June, 1909;

At a meeting of the various committees from the several wards held this day, it was ordered, that a voting primary be held at the court house by L. W. Lawrence and R. Hyman, on Tuesday, June 1st, 1909, from 2 p. m. to 8:30 p. m., at which any person who shall be legally entitled to vote at said election for mayor and alderman to be held on June 7th, 1909, shall be entitled to participate and vote for the person whom he favors for nomination for mayor.

It was also further ordered, that the usual primaries be held in the various wards of said town for nomination of aldermen, on Friday June 4th, 1909, at 8:30 p. m., at the following places:

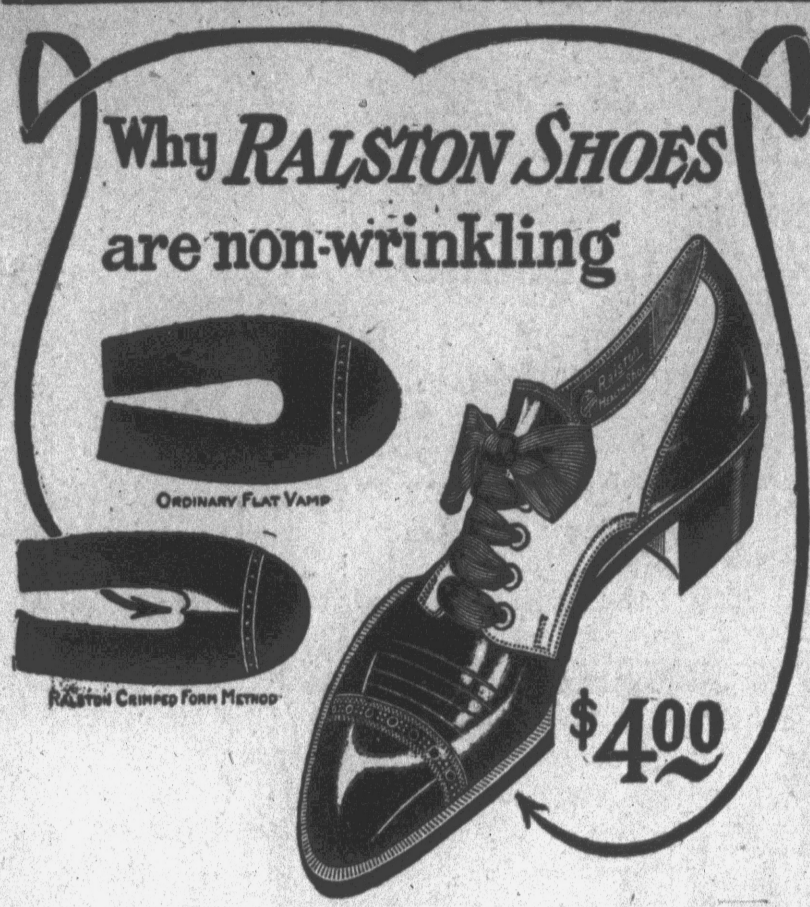
