Wilson Baptists Join Scotland Neck Church.

The community irrespective of opinion about matters at issue now for sometime among the Baptists of our town will be glad to know that order is coming out of confusion and there is favorable prospect of an end of the trouble.

On Wednesday night of this week, those members recently expelled by the Wilson Baptist church for refusing to fellowship and support the pastor, Rev. John T. Jenkins, were received into the membership and full fellowship of the Scotland Neck Baptist church, the strongest and most influential Baptist church in all this eastern part of North Carolina, and one of the very strongest in the state. The import of this action on the part of the Scotland Neck church is that it is its declaration of their belief after investigation satisfactory to themselves of the excellence of the Christian character and the worthiness of these people to be members of any Baptist church.

Authoritative publication of the action will be made by the Scotland Neck church.

Furthermore, in addition to those received into membership, eighteen members of the Wilson Baptist church who will apply for letters of dismission from it were taken under the watchcare of the Scotland Neck church. A branch of the Scotland Neck church will at once be organized for religious work in Wilson.—Wilson Times.

MR. SMALL'S POSITION.

Cannot Personally Favor Any Particular Site for Public Building.

Washington, N. C., May 28, 1909.
Editor Reflector:

In view of a number of letters which I have received from prominent citizens of Greenville, regarding the selection of a suitable site for the proposed public building in Greenville, I deem it proper to make a public statement of my attitude regarding the matter. I ought not, and I cannot, take a position favoring or opposing any particular site. This is exclusively a local matter, and should be left to the citizens of Greenville to determine.

Even if I should decide to favor some particular site, I would only do so after very careful personal examination of all the sites and all the local conditions, in order that my conclusion might be based as far as possible upon merit. However, this is the function of the treasury department, and not of the district representative in congress. Suppose, however, I should attempt to inform myself and reach a conclusion as to the most appropriate site, would it be proper even under such circumstances for me to advocate any particular site? I think not. I am the representative of all the people of Greenville, and if I have any influence with the treasury department, arising from such official position, I ought not to use that influence in favor of the owner of any one site, against the owners of other sites.

In view of the fact that an agent of the treasury department has made a recommendation for a particular site, I have requested the treasury department to hold up the matter of approval of this report until July 1st. I first named June 1st, but have requested a month longer, in order that the fullest opportunity may be afforded.

I will very gladly arrange for any public hearing before the assistant secretary of the treasury upon behalf of any citizen or delegation of citizens from Greenville, in order that they may present their views, regardless of what their views may be. This is a very important matter for Greenville, because it involves the location of a site for a postoffice building, which will probably not be changed for many years to come, and it is the right of your board of trade, or any citizens of Greenville to take a part in the determination of the matter.

I will thank you to publish this communication, in order that my position may be fully known. I have stated my position without any mental reservations, and shall endeavor consistently to maintain my attitude upon the subject.

I shall be absent from Washington, D. C., from Tuesday June 1st, for about a week, with a party of congressmen on a trip of inspection of the Norfolk-Beaufort waterway, and after that shall be continuously at Washington, D. C., during the month of June.

Since it was announced that Charlotte has above 45,000 population, Greensboro has set about to have another city directory made.

Those fellows who want to hold an indignation meeting to denounce President Taft for appointing Judge Connor, must have time hanging heavy on their hands.

The tariff agitation in congress has warmed up until it is leading to blows. Senator Bailey, of Texas and a New York newspaper man got in a scrap the other day and exchanged licks at each other. They had all better quit and go home.

Again The Reflector will remind you that Tuesday, June 1st, a voting primary will be held to nominate a candidate for mayor of Greenville. Those who have the welfare of the town at heart should be very careful how they vote, as it is no time for the town to be making mistakes. An incompetent man in the mayor's office could do the town great harm.

When a State votes prohibition on itself, it should be allowed to enforce prohibition, but is not able to do so under existing inter-state laws. Two things that congress should pass a law to stop is the shipment of liquor into a prohibition State and the use of the mails for carrying whiskey advertisements into a prohibition State. If this was done a State prohibition law could be made thoroughly effective.

The Man Who Meets His Small Obligations.

We want to say a good word for the man who meets his small obligations promptly. They are not as plentiful as they should be and the man needs encouraging. Most men will pay but fewer will pay promptly. Almost any firm will testify that, counting the time, postage, booking, and the like it costs all some accounts are worth to collect them, and still the man owing them is perfectly responsible in a financial way. It very often happens that the worst sinner in this particular is the man best able to pay.—Albermarle Enterprise.

DEMOCRATIC PRIMARIES.

To Select a Candidate for Mayor for Greenville.

The General Assembly of North Carolina at its recent session, having so amended the charter of the town of Greenville, as to provide for the election of the mayor of said town by a direct vote of the people, instead of by the board of aldermen elect, as heretofore provided, and the duty having devolved upon the undersigned as chairmen of the various ward executive committees of the town to provide some means for the nomination of a candidate for said office, to be voted for at the election to be held on the 7th day of June, 1909;

At a meeting of the various committees from the several wards held this day, it was ordered, that a voting primary be held at the court house by L. W. Lawrence and R. Hyman, on Tuesday, June 1st, 1909, from 2 p. m. to 8:30 p. m., at which any person who shall be legally entitled to vote at said election for mayor and alderman to be held on June 7th, 1909, shall be entitled to participate and vote for the person whom he favors for nomination for mayor.

It was also further ordered, that the usual primaries be held in the various wards of said town for nomination of aldermen, on Friday June 4th, 1909, at 8:30 p. m., at the following places:

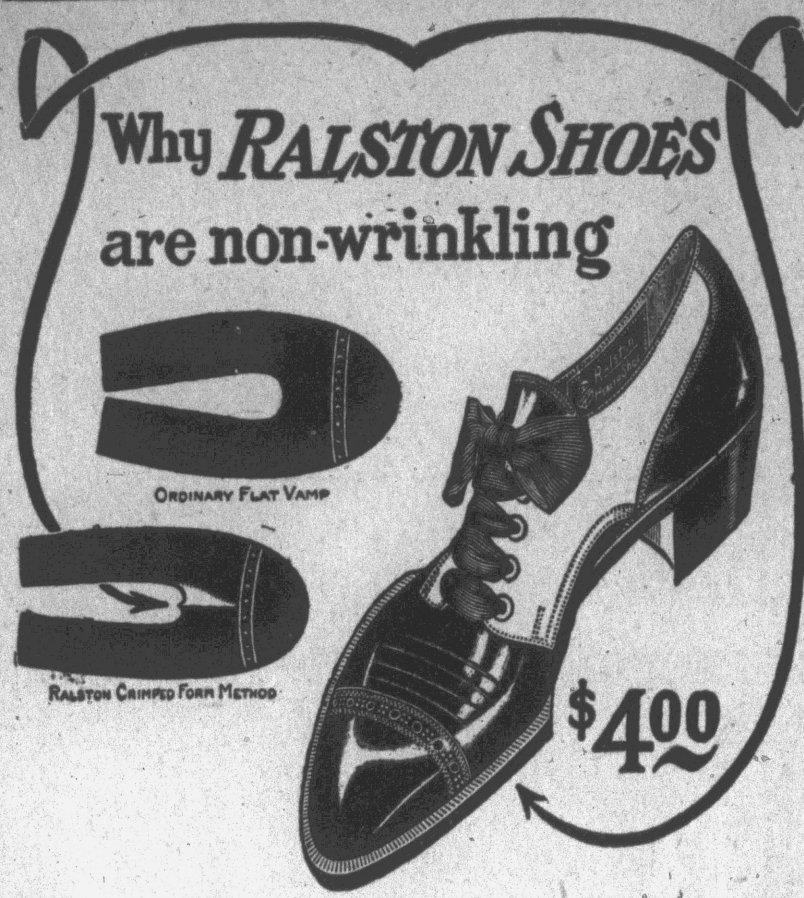
