Trying to win favor by misrepresentations and false accusations does not pay even in politics.

The result of the primary for mayor Tuesday shows that a great majority of the people of Greenville have not lost interest in the welfare of the town. Now let the same good common sense prevail in the ward primaries for aldermen Friday night.

From the way somebody was counting votes beforehand that he was going to get in the primary, and the number actually received, it is inferred that he must have been taking lessons from a Greensboro directory maker and learned how to count names that were not.

We fail to see wherein the Eastern Carolina teams composing the base league can feel much interest in them when the teams are composed entirely of hired players without a local man on them. Teams made up entirely of home men and games in which no outsider is allowed to participate would be more occasion for local pride and enthusiasm. As it now is the idea seems to be what town can put up the most money and have the best players.

The result of Tuesday's primary for mayor is cause for congratulation to Greenville. It shows that the people appreciate a competent administration in which they have confidence and want to continue it, and therein they acted wisely. The town has had no better mayor than Mr. Whedbee. In the management of the town's affairs he is aided by an excellent board of aldermen, and the people should also continue these in office to carry out the important matters now in hand. It will be unwise to make changes at present.

Moon's Eclipse Thursday Night.
All interested in the science of astronomy will have a chance to witness an interesting eclipse, that of the moon, on Thursday, June 3, when the lunar light will be almost totally obscured by the shadow of the earth passing between its satellite and the sun. The phenomenon may be observed all over the North American continent, if the sky be clear, but will be more visible on the eastern side of the Mississippi river.
The moon will not be entirely darkened, for there will be still a little light reflected by the outer edge of the earth's atmosphere, though it will be so dim as only to cause a faint reddish color. As the moon rises it will be seen to be partially obscured.

Gradually it will enter deeper and deeper into the earth's shadow until it will give no light, and will be barely perceptible.

The eclipse will be an object lesson to children, who may see for themselves the truth of some of the things they have learned in their physical geographies. They will also be able to recall the fact that it is the same lunar eclipse which saved the lives of Columbus and his party in 1504.

The natives refused to give food to the hungry voyagers, and Columbus, knowing that an eclipse was at hand, told them that God was angry and would take away the light of the moon if they did not receive food. Presently the moon began to grow dim, and the frightened natives rushed pell-mell to their storehouses, bringing out the choicest viands and delicacies they could find and supplicating Columbus that he restore to them the light of the moon. Columbus promised to appease the divine wrath, and an hour or so gave them back the lunar light.

An eclipse of the sun will be witnessed a fortnight later, on Thursday, June 17, shortly before sunset. So late in the day, it will not cause much effect, though chickens will probably think it time to go to bed and retire to their roosts.

The drowning season has opened and for the next four months items in the newspapers chronicling the deaths of persons from drowning will be a feature of warm weather news. Careless on the water, fright in an emergency, ignorant recklessness and largely inability to swim are the contributing causes. It is surprising that there should be so many people in the world who have not learned the simple art of keeping afloat in the water, a knowledge so necessary to all human beings. The boy or girl who grows up without learning to be a swimmer is only half educated and is exposed to a life peril from which the swimmer is almost exempt.—Durham Sun.

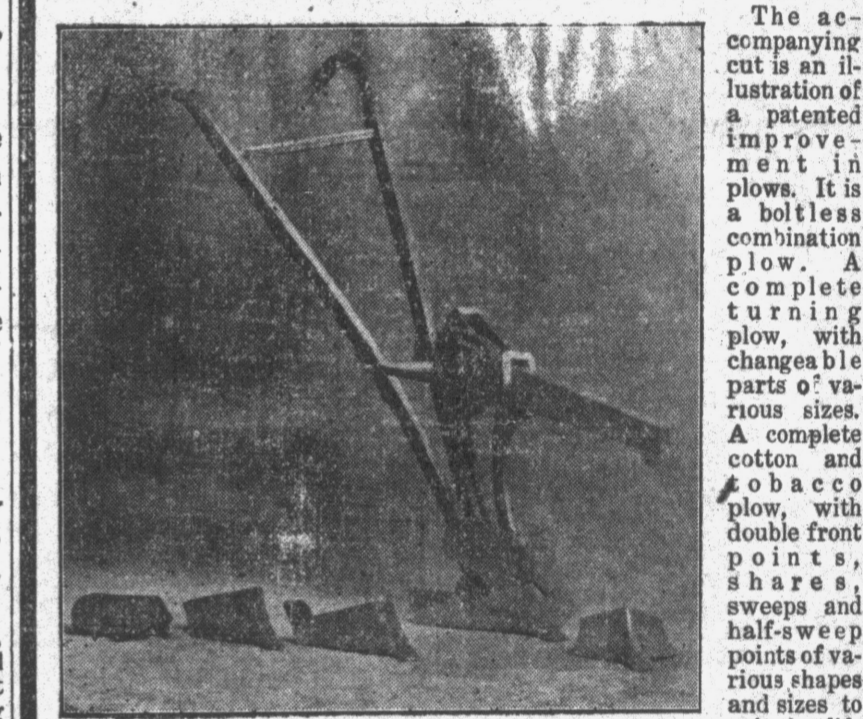
