## A WORK OF VALUE.

### SOIL MAP OF PITT COUNTY COMPLETED.

#### Some Interesting Facts Concerning the Work and Its Results.

The soil survey of Pitt county which Messrs. W. E. Hearn and J. W. Nelson, of the Bureau of Soils, Washington, D. C., and Mr. Frank P. Drane, of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture have been working on for the past three months, has just been completed. Mr. Hearn says Pitt county contains about 644 square miles, being 34 miles from north to south and 35 miles from east to west in its furthest extremities. The elevation varies from 121 feet above sea level at Fountain on the western border down to practically sea level on the eastern side at the confluence of Tranters creek and the Tar river.

Perhaps no county in Eastern North Carolina has a greater variety of soils than does Pitt. Eleven distinct types of soil were recognized within its borders and each of these and the area it occupies has been shown on the map in a separate color. Nearly one hundred samples of soil including marl were collected from various parts of the county. These were so distributed as to represent each soil type and condition. Every public road and nearly every path in the county was traveled and many side trips on foot to the swamps and pocosin areas were made. Borings to a depth of 3 feet were taken to determine the character of both the soil and subsoil. It is important to know what kind of material lies beneath your soil.

In addition to the soil map a write up or report on the county is being made. Each soil type will be written up in much detail describing the soil, subsoil, location in county, topography, drainage, origin, crops to which adapted, crops grown and yields. Under the chapter on agriculture will be considered the history of the crops, crops grown at present time, methods, adaptation of soils to crops, fertilizers, prices of land, etc. A special chapter on tobacco will be added tracing this industry from its beginning in 1886 when 32 acres were grown up to the present time. Drainage of the pocosin areas will be outlined, elevations given showing the best outlet to the natural drainage ways. The marl will be described and analyses given which will inform the farmer as to the amount most beneficial for the different soils. A general description of the county will be given, its location, transportation facilities, markets, surface features and its citizenship. The published report accompanying the map will contain about 40 or more printed pages, and it is hoped that it will carry some information to the farmers and land-owners.

Pitt county with its variety of soils, large area of which are as yet undeveloped, the level, undulating to gently rolling character of its surface, coupled with good drainage offers great opportunities to settlers. Its resources are just beginning to be known. Large areas of the most fertile land in the county for corn and oats could be drained, reclaimed and made productive.

## PROF. WRIGHT ACCEPTS.

### Eastern High School Principal To Go To Greenville.

Believing his field will be broader and his opportunities greater, Prof. Robert H. Wright, principal of the Eastern High School, has accepted the presidency of the Eastern Carolina Training School for teachers, at Greenville, N. C. He will present his resignation as head of the local school at the next meeting of the school-board.

Mr. James H. Van Sickle, superintendent of Public Instruction, said last night that the school board would feel greatly the loss of Professor Wright, who during his three years' administration of the Eastern High School, has removed all friction in the conduct of the institution and proved himself admirably efficient and capable. He said he had feared when Professor Wright informed him of his offer, and the trustees of the North Carolina institution wrote him for information regarding the principal, that Professor Wright would be induced to accept.

A telegram from Mr. Thomas J. Jarvis, president of the trustees of the Eastern Carolina Training School and former Governor of North Carolina, was received by Professor Wright Wednesday. He was invited to meet the trustees of that institution the following day, and, securing leave of absence, Professor Wright met Mr. Jarvis in Norfolk, and went to Greenville, where he was presented to the trustees. The following day he was surprised to receive official notification from the board that he had been elected president of the training school.

Before leaving for his new position Professor Wright will arrange the work of the High School for the opening in the fall—Baltimore Sun.

## STATE NEWS.

### Happenings of Interest in North Carolina.

Atlantic Hotel, Morehead City, N. C., June 15.—The twenty-sixth annual session of the North Carolina Teachers' Assembly opened Tuesday evening at 9:30 with the largest attendance of any opening in years. There were over seven hundred teachers present.

Asheville, N. C., June 15.—The State Board of Medical Examiners this afternoon completed its work and announced the successful candidates. There were a total of 120 applicants for license besides those applying under the reciprocity rule and 95 were granted license, including eight negroes and one lady from Texas.

### Superintendent Wilson Resigns.

Prof. C. W. Wilson, superintendent of Scotland Neck graded schools, tendered to the board of trustees his resignation last Monday night. The trustees of the East Carolina Training School at Greenville last Friday elected Prof. Wilson business manager of that institution and assistant professor in pedagogy, and he tendered his resignation here that he might feel free to accept that position. Prof. Wilson stated to the trustees of Scotland Neck graded school Monday night that when he was re-elected superintendent here a week before he had no thought of going elsewhere for the ensuing school year. He said that he did not then know that there would be such a position in the East Carolina Training school.

The board of trustees accepted his resignation and a committee was appointed to draw up suitable resolutions expressing appreciation of Prof. Wilson's work here and regret at losing him. He has been superintendent of Scotland Neck graded school since its establishment six years ago. He has done a great work here and has greatly endeared himself to the people of the town and community who will regret his going away. Prof. Wilson is easily amongst the first school men of the State and he has succeeded in making Scotland Neck graded school one of the best in the State.—Scotland Neck Commonwealth.

### Starkey Buys the Whole Load.

The car load of Florida water-melons which were consigned to W. B. Wilson & Son reached Greenville Wednesday over the Atlantic coast line. C. G. Starkey purchased the entire load of melons and today hauled them down to the store. It is unusual for Greenville to get a whole car load of melons, and such ready sale for them indicates that this is a good market. Seeing so many melons as they were hauled down attracted the attention of everybody on the street. They are being sold cheaper than usual for early melons, owing to the large quantity of them on hand.

Durham aldermen have repealed the "blue laws" of that city and have opened doors to the sale of cigars and cold drinks on Sunday. It is charged that this is paving the way to the granting of license to druggists to sell liquor.

For Southern Democratic congressmen to claim credit that in voting for a tariff on certain articles they were acting in the interest of their constituents, is an admission that they think the Republicans who have always voted for protection are entitled to the same credit.

A fellow was arrested in Greensboro on the charge of bigamy. After staying in jail a few days some friends advanced enough money for him to put up a cash bond of \$100 and he released. When court met the grand jury did not find a true bill against him, whereupon he took down the bond money himself and skipped out. Now some of the friends who furnished the money are trying to find him to have him arrested for embezzlement. A man with no more character than that ought to have been kept in jail.

In a special message sent to congress Wednesday, President Taft took the ground that as the Supreme court of the United States had already declared that the government has no authority to levy an income tax, it is useless for the present congress to pass such a law in connection with the tariff bill now being considered. At the same time he argued that the government should have authority to levy such tax, and he deemed it the duty of both branches of congress to adopt an amendment to the constitution, to be submitted to the people for ratification, conferring power upon the government to levy an income tax whenever it shall be deemed necessary. This may put an end to the present efforts to pass an income tax, but the recommendation of the president to adopt the constitutional amendment should be carried out promptly.

almost a straight shoot with the exception of the few miles deviation to Raleigh and to Carey. The Seaboard's tracks from Henderson to Raleigh and from Henderson to Durham are in the shape of an inverted V. through the centre of which the short cut in fact, being less than 50 miles in length, but it would cut out an elbow that, with the backing in and out of Raleigh, is a time-loser. The advantage to be gained in cutting out a few miles in the truck line between North and South and shortening the schedule is sufficient to give color to the report, and we expect Raleigh's uneasiness is well-founded. The competition between the Southern, Coast Line and Seaboard in both through passenger and freight traffic is acute and one road is always doing something to make the others move up, perhaps the people back of the reorganization of the Seaboard had the short-cut question in mind as one of the possible traffic improvements for the company.—Charlotte Chronicle.

**Regulations Governing Pardon Applications.**

Gov. Kitchin has changed in several important respects the rules governing applications for pardons, commutations and reprieves. Briefly stated, they are now as follows: Applications must be by party convicted or someone in his behalf, accompanied by concise statement of facts, and specific grounds for executive clemency; must be accompanied by transcript of record of court, including bill of indictment, verdict and judgment. Notice must be published in a county paper, or posted in prescribed manner and form; private prosecutor, if any, must be notified of the intended application for pardon; recommendations from the trial judge and solicitor must be presented or statement as to why not obtained. After refusal of application there will be no further hearing unless there are some new facts and then there must be re-publication.—Ex.

### INVOKING THE SPIRITS.

Queer Superstitions of the Veddas of Ceylon.

Dr. C. G. Seligman, writing in Travel and Exploration, throws some interesting light on the beliefs and superstitions of the Veddas, the strange hill tribes and cave dwellers of Ceylon: "Although there is no clearly formulated idea of a death contagion, the rapidity with which all Veddas leave the place where a death has occurred and avoid it for years shows that some evil quality is associated with dissolution. According to most Veddas, the spirit of every dead man, woman or child becomes a 'yaku' (plural 'yaku') within a few days after death. Some Veddas, however, say that when ordinary folk die they cease utterly and that a surviving part, which becomes a yaku, exists only in the case of especially strong, energetic or skilled men, who have shown their strength of character in this world or who have had the power of calling the yaku during their lifetime.

"Since each Vedda community consists of a small number of families, usually related by blood and marriage, the yaku of the recent dead—called collectively the ne yaku—are supposed to stand toward the surviving members of the group in the light of friends and relatives, who, if well treated, will continue their loving kindness to their survivors, and only if neglected will show their disgust and anger by withdrawing their assistance or even becoming actively hostile; hence it is generally considered necessary to present an offering to the newly dead, usually within a week or two of death. This offering must consist of cooked rice and coconut milk, the food that every Vedda esteems above all other, but betel leaves and areca nuts are often added.

"In each community there is one man, called 'kapurale,' or 'dugganawa,' who has the power and knowledge requisite to call the yaku, and this man calls upon the yaku of the recently dead man to come and take the offering. The yaku comes, and the kapurale becomes possessed by the yaku of the dead man, who speaks through his mouth in hoarse, guttural accents, stating that he approves the offering and will assist his kinfolk in hunting and often definitely indicating the direction in which the next hunting party should go. One or more of the near relatives may also become possessed. Soon after the spirit leaves the kapurale the rice is eaten by the assembled folk."

Death is a friend of ours, and he that is not ready to entertain him is not at home.—Bacon.

### THE NEW COLONEL.

How Grant Proved Himself to Be a Master of Men.

When Captain Grant, formerly of the regular army, was appointed colonel of an Illinois regiment in place of Colonel Goode, John A. Logan while escorting him to the camp said: "Colonel, the regiment is a little unruly. Do you think you can manage the boys?"

"I think I can," replied Grant.

Logan and McClernand, two congressmen, made patriotic speeches, and Logan, after a two hours' oration, led forward a quiet man in plain citizen's clothes, saying:

"Allow me to present to you your new commander, Colonel U. S. Grant."

"Most of the soldiers observed him for the first time," writes Hamlin Garland, from whose "Life of Grant" we have quoted. "They were astonished and disappointed." Grant looked like a grave country doctor. But he showed that he could manage the "unruly boys." There were loud calls: "Grant! Grant! A speech!" Their late colonel used to "orate" before them. The new colonel stepped two paces toward them and said in a clear, calm voice:

"Men, go to your quarters!"

If an eight inch shell had exploded in their ranks the "boys" would not have been more surprised, but they went to their quarters. There was that in the new colonel's voice which expressed command. The tone was not loud, but it was given with a clear cut inflection which showed him a master of men.

That evening at dress parade as he stepped to the center of the regiment, wearing no uniform save a pair of gray trousers with a stripe running down the outside seams and an old sword, the men jested in low voices about their new commander.

Colonel Goode, the late colonel, not infrequently used the daily parade as an occasion to make a speech, and the men expected one from Grant. The line officers advanced, and the adjutant saluted.

"A soldier's first duty is to learn to obey his commander. I shall expect my orders to be obeyed as exactly and as instantly as if we were on the field of battle."

That was all he said. As the men marched back to quarters a private asked: "What do they mean by sending down a little man like him to command this regiment? He can't pound dry sand in a straight hole."

"He can't make a speech. Look at the clothes he wears. Who is he anyhow?"

"Boys," retorted a sergeant, "I'll tell you who he is. He's the colonel of this regiment, as you'll find, and don't you forget it."
