**County Alumnae of the Normal College Meet.**

## CAPITAL INCREASED.

**The Bank of Greenville Enlarges and Adds More Directors.**

The stockholders of the Bank of Greenville, held a meeting on June 28th. for the purpose of increasing its capital from \$25,000 to \$50,000. There was a large attendance of new subscribers to the increased capital stock, which has all been subscribed.

At this meeting the board of directors was increased to 12, and the following well known business men were added to the board: Messrs. R. R. Fleming, W. E. Proctor, R. A. Fountain and B. W. Moseley.

The Bank of Greenville has been one of the most successful banks in North Carolina, having won a place on the roll of honor among the State banks.

With about forty new stockholders, its field and opportunity for usefulness will be vastly broadened and the prospects for a continuation of the success that has attended them in the past, looks very bright for the future. The Bank will commence operating with a capital of \$50,000 July 1st.

## CHARMING HENDERSONVILLE.

The editors of North Carolina were fortunate in having Hendersonville as the place of holding their annual convention last week. Hendersonville is indeed a beautiful town surrounded by magnificent scenery. It has a population of about 5,000, broad paved streets, concrete sidewalks, splendid hotels, elegant homes and a warm hearted people. The editors made their headquarters at the Gates Hotel that was truly an ideal place. Here everything that could contribute to their comfort and pleasure was looked after. When the editors were not engaged in the business of the convention every moment was spent in pleasure and sight-seeing, the citizens being profuse with courtesies. There were drives to picturesque mountain heights, through shady glens, around sparkling lakes, the panorama of magnificent views changing almost as rapidly as the pictures of a kaleidoscope.

Hendersonville abounds with such beautiful surroundings that one never feels like tiring looking at them. Owners of private parks and grounds threw wide their gates for the time being and bade the editors enter at will. Mr. W. A. And such a delightful place is Laurel Park with its lakes of pond lilies, groves of fragrant rhododendron, winding walks through overhanging boughs, rustic seats in cozy nooks and around crystal springs, rippling brooklets here and there, gushing cataracts splashing over rocks, and from the highest point a tower commanding a view of the town and surrounding country.

No editor who went to Hendersonville will ever forget Mayor R. H. Staton and Col. S. V. Pickens, a veteran of the Confederacy. Both in meeting and when out on pleasure bent these were on hand to give every attention to the guests. Editor M. L. Shipman, State commissioner of labor and printing, felt particular pride in having his brother editors in his home town and did much to make it pleasant for them.

The Reflector man also feels grateful to Dr. J. G. Waldrop and his excellent family (from which Greenville has drawn some charming additions to her population) the hospitality of whose home was more than once enjoyed and by whose attention in visiting plates of interest his pleasure was largely increased. Hendersonville is truly a charming place and entitled to all that is claimed for it as the "Gem City."


## NORTH CAROLINA EDITORS.
