Durham has joined the rank of first-class postoffices in North Carolina, making seven that are now in the State.

From the talk we hear of contemplated new buildings, there will be something doing in Greenville before a great while.

The Council of State is having some trouble over the half million dollar bond issue authorized by the last legislature. A Raleigh bank made a bid for the bonds that was accepted, but a question having arisen over the legality of an amendment to the bond bill passed by the legislature, the issue of the bonds is being held up until the courts can pass upon the matter. While the purchasers of bonds naturally want to be satisfied that they are legally issued, there is no need for embarrassing the State. The legislature acted in good faith and there is not the slightest danger of the act being repudiated.

When the old blue-back spelling book of Noah Webster, a volume that had a sale second to the Holy Bible only, was a text-book in every American primary school, the pupils were much more accomplished spellers than they are under the new fad of "intensive education," says The Washington Post. This The Richmond News-Leader thinks, "is a shot not far wide of the mark." We are glad to see these endorsements of the old blue-back from such high sources. The scholar who got his education from Noah Webster will be very generally found at the head of the class.—Charlotte Chronicle.
