Renewed Talk Among Railroad Men.

Railroad, N. C., July 13.—The signing of the ancillary order by Judge H. G. Connor, of the Eastern Carolina U. S. District Court, for the foreclosure sale of the Norfolk & Southern Railroad, in the hands of receivers the past several months gives renewed impetus to talk among well informed railroad men hereabouts that the Norfolk and Southern, with principal North Carolina holdings, the Atlantic & North Carolina and the Raleigh and Pamlico Sound roads, will pass into the hands of the Norfolk & Western. It is pointed out that under the North Carolina laws neither the Southern nor the Seaboard Air Line could be a bidder and the Atlantic Coast Line would scarcely be a bidder. On the other hand there are a number of vital reasons why the Norfolk and Western would want this property. By constructing a link from Raleigh to Durham a new through line for outlet for the Norfolk and Western coal traffic would be an established, covering a large part of Eastern Carolina that would otherwise be invaded by the Seaboard Air Line and Clinchfield road coal carrying combination just looming up as one of the great coal combinations of the country.

The construction of the link from Durham to Raleigh from the Norfolk & Western to connect with the Norfolk & Southern would be of incalculable value to this city in a commercial way. Indeed it is the general verdict that there is no disposition of the Norfolk & Southern that could more greatly benefit Raleigh or the whole of Eastern Carolina than for it to fall into the hands of the Norfolk & Western. This prospect along with that of a link of road from Spring Hope to Raleigh to bring the Atlantic Coast Line into the capital city give to business interests here especial buoyancy and sanguine hopes of rapid growth.—New Bern Sun.

STATE NEWS.

Happenings of Interest in North Carolina.

Jefferson City, N. C., July 13.—The Recorder has a news item from the country saying that on Friday Walter Osborne, of Hemlock, shot himself accidentally, dying in about seventeen minutes. He stopped at a spring to drink and picking up his gun carelessly, causing it to explode, the load entering his chest. He leaves a wife and one child.

Hendersonville, N. C., July 13.—Joe D. Heaton, 12 years old, was struck and instantly killed by lightning here this morning at 11 o'clock. Young Heaton is the son of Jim Heaton, and was well known in this city. One or two black spots on the body are the only marks of the terrible death. He had a basket of vegetables in his hand at the time he was struck and they were scattered to the wind.

Jonesboro, July 13.—A terrific storm passed over Jonesboro this afternoon at four o'clock doing considerable damage. Lightning struck the cotton mill here and set fire to building, but the flames were extinguished quickly, the damage being slight. Lightning also struck the barn of Mr. W. F. Loyd, killed a fine pair mules and shocked Mr. Loyd. A cow in the barn was knocked down but not killed. Mr. Loyd had just driven into the barn from out the storm. His escape was miraculous.

The peach crop in this section is an entire failure this year. There have been no shipments at all from the large orchards of J. Van Lindley and John A. Young. At Southern Pines, however, where Mr. Lindley has 35,000 peach trees, he has shipped \$20,000 worth of peaches so far, and expects an equally large shipment the last of July of the Elberta peach.—Greensboro Record.

Greenville Wallops Bethel 9 to 6

In a short but interesting game at Bethel Tuesday Greenville defeated the locals by hard hitting. After the visitors second time at bat it was seen that their hitting could not be checked and that Bethel was doomed to take the pills. Lanier for Greenville succeeded White in the third inning and pitched fancy ball, allowing only three hits. In the fifth and sixth he went in total eclipse to the Bethelites, fanning five of the six who faced him. The features were the hitting of Greenville, pitching of Lanier and a catch by Bethel's centerfield which robbed Timberlake of a two-bagger.

Best Men Will Get Appointments.

Washington, D. C., July 13.—Senator Overman was a caller at the White House today and talked with the president about the appointment of census supervisors in the south. Mr. Taft continues to assert that his policy will be to name the best men he can find for the positions in the States of the South, regardless of the politics, provided of course, they are not partisans. President McKinley divided the appointments of census supervisors equally between the two parties, but Southern Republican politicians are telling Mr. Taft that he will make a mistake if he pursues such a liberal course. In every district in the South there are said to be from one to fifty Republican candidates for appointment as supervisors.

North Carolina, especially its western end, will undoubtedly become one of the great apple sections of the future. Here are produced apples unsurpassed by any other part of the country. The reason these apples have not commanded particular notoriety on the market is because of lack of enterprise in making their merits known. They are splendid apples, but they are marketed with indifference and given little care in their growing. One thing North Carolina farmers should learn and that soon, is better selection and better packing of apples for city markets. Take the Oregon and Washington apple growers, they carefully select their apples, wrap them in paper, pack them in boxes and sell at fancy prices. North Carolina apples are better in quality, but bad in looks.—American Agriculturist.
