BIG CIRCUS AT ROCKY MOUNT.

Barnum and Bailey to Exhibit There on Thursday, Oct. 21.

The Wilmington Star says "There'll be something doing when a man quits yawning for his town and goes to yelling for it." That's the thing. We want to see everybody here yell for Greenville and wear Greenville slogan buttons. Are you doing your part?

Greenville has had a week of carnival, and while it gave the people much amusement it cannot be said that it helped business. Of course in some instances, such as the market, the transfers, the express office, the railroads, the hotels and boarding houses, there was more patronage than ordinarily, but taking business generally it was more hindered than helped. Several of the merchants who have been spoken to say it gave them a very poor week, as both people and money were taken away from the stores to the carnival. The carnival people say they did a good business here, and they likely took away much money.

Certainly money is sent away for whiskey. That will be the case just as long as it can be shipped into prohibition territory. But the money sent away is very small in comparison to what was spent for the stuff when it could be purchased from open saloons or a dispensary. Not near so much liquor is drunk as before prohibition went into effect, so there is no use in arguing that prohibition is not proving a benefit. One of the greatest benefits arising from it is the removal of temptation from the rising generation, and it is well worth while even if nothing else was accomplished. But more is accomplished, for the good results of prohibition become more apparent every day.

The Wichita (Kan.) Beacon puts the matter tersely and epigrammatically when, in referring to Lieutenant Peary it says: "He found the pole and lost the United States." It insists that the country is and will be with Dr. Cook; "not," it argues, "because Dr. Cook's discovery antedated Peary's by a year of time. Men have been trying to discover the pole since the seventeenth century—so the year's time is of no object. The public was ready to give Peary the same applause as Cook. But Peary lost his public by his mean spirited attack on Cook. The American public has profound sense and a perfect understanding of what is good taste. Commander Peary deliberately robbed himself of the public's sympathy and interest by violating the rules of conduct which the public sets up for public men."
