MOVEMENT OF PASSENGER TRAINS

Much Business Done by the Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen were in regular monthly session Thursday night with seven of the members present, Alderman Higgs being kept at home with a sprained ankle.

F. C. Harding, chairman of the trustees and H. B. Smith, superintendent of the graded school, appeared before the board relative to the need of immediate funds for the school. The treasurer was ordered to honor all drafts for the salaries of teachers and maintenance of the school for the month ending Oct. 24th, with authority to use any available funds in his hands for this purpose, the same to be replaced as fast as school funds are collected. The chief of the fire department was also instructed to furnish hose to be used in sprinkling the school grounds.

The chief of the fire department called the attention of the board to the urgent need of fire alarm, and Aldermen W. S. Moye and D. W. Hardee were appointed a committee to look after this at once.

The street committee reported having held consultation with F. C. Harding and J. J. Perkins relative to a claim by the latter of damage done his stable property on Fourth street by reason of water overflow. The committee held the opinion that the town was not liable for damage, but recommended removing the cause of the overflow.

The street committee also reported that the town's part of proceeds from the recent carnival amounted to \$336.03 with an expense of \$101.05. The committee was instructed to complete the work on Fifth street to the culvert in the same manner as started.

The paving of sidewalks on Fifth street westward from Evans street was referred to the street committee with power to act.

Aldermen Flanagan and Hardee were added to the committee on improvement of the market house.

R. I. Howard tendered his resignation as clerk of the Water and Light Commission and assistant tax collector, to take effect Oct. 8th, which was accepted. Several names were presented as his successor, but the matter was postponed to a special meeting of the board to be held on Monday night, 11th.

A street light was ordered to be placed at the corner of Washington and Eighth streets.

On motion of Alderman Flanagan the Water and Light Commission was ordered to furnish the board a detailed statement of receipts and disbursements of the water and light plants up to Oct. 1st., as required by law, and that the superintendent also furnish a statement each month of the arclights not in use on any nights during the month and the reason therefor.

The municipal building committee was given power to rent the city hall, rents to be collected in advance.

The chief of police was instructed to notify property owners in the prohibited surface privy district not to use them after Oct. 8th, and to obtain warrants for any violation of the order.

Restaurant license was granted W. C. Hines.

Died at 7:30 O'clock This Morning at His Home.

Greenville lost a good citizen in the death of Mr. John R. Moore which occurred at 7:30 o'clock this morning at his home on Dickinson avenue, near the A. C. L. depot.

Mr. Moore was a native of New Hanover county and was in his 57th year. He came to Greenville from Burgaw in the spring of 1889 on the completion of the Atlantic Coast Line railroad to this town, to take the position he held most acceptably until about three years ago, when he was compelled by failing health to give it up. His health was never good afterwards, but he continued to carry on some business in a partnership with one of his sons.

Mr. Moore made a host of friends in Greenville, was a good citizen and liked by everybody. He was an elder in the Presbyterian church, and was the prime mover in establishing a church of that denomination here and securing the building of a house of worship. For many years he was superintendent of the Sunday school and was active in all work of the church.

For a few years when a young man Mr. Moore lived in Shelby and was married in that town in 1872. His wife and four children survive him, the latter being Mrs. R. F. Betts, of Reidsville, and Messrs. Bailey, Howard and Robert Moore, of Greenville.

Funeral services will be held by Rev. J. N. H. Summerell in the Presbyterian church at 10:30 o'clock Saturday morning, the interment following in Cherry Hill cemetery with Masonic honors, he being a member of that fraternity.

Alderman Bowen was authorized to purchase uniforms for the police officers.

Reports of officers and allowing accounts were attended to and the board adjourned to the special meeting to be held next Monday night.

Working for Betterment of the Community.

While some of our other organizations have lagged during the summer months, the Merchants' Association has quietly, but persistently, kept at work. This organization is working for the betterment of the town and the improvement of business conditions.

At the meeting Wednesday night it was decided to prepare a credit rating system, listing every inhabitant of the community, so as to facilitate the exclusion of "beats" from undeserved credit and to promote a better knowledge of those upon whom such courtesies should be bestowed. A resolution was also adopted stating it to be the sense of the association that good business methods demanded of each individual merchant that he send out to his customers a monthly statement of account, unless an agreement to the contrary is made with the customer.

At this meeting other live questions were discussed, and much good was received therefrom. The permanency of the local association is assured, and much good should follow an organized effort on the part of our leading merchants in improving local business conditions and upbuilding the town.

Talk good roads and you will be on a live subject.

When Thaw settles down to the fact that he is there to stay, he may have less to worry about.

When the street and road from Evans street to the training school is completed there will be another good road object lesson for the people to look at.

Hearst has decided to try it some more. The Independence party in New York City has nominated him for mayor. He ought to learn sometime when he has had enough.

Another thing that Greenville must have is more manufacturing enterprises. There is every opportunity here for these, and they are needed to help the business and development of the town.

Tennessee seems to have made a mess of her prohibition law. While no liquor can be sold in the State, it can be made, and distilleries are running right along. That looks like simply playing over the matter.

The State fair will be held in Raleigh Oct. 18th to 23rd, and the outlook is that it is to be the best yet held. Many applications for space for exhibits have been made, and the attractions for visitors will be numerous.

Yes, there are some people who had rather trudge along over bad roads than to pay a little tax to have good ones. They were the same way about education—rather be themselves, and keep their children, in ignorance than to pay a little school tax. But the school tax came and you see what education is doing for Pitt county. Still greater improvement will follow when the entire county has good roads.

The National Farmers' Congress will meet in Raleigh November 3rd to 8th, bringing together representative men from every part of the United States. At the same time exhibits of North Carolina crops will be made to show the visitors the advantages of this as an agricultural State. For these exhibits premiums have been offered, a list of which can be had by writing W. A. Graham, commissioner of agriculture, Raleigh, N. C. The Reflector would like to see Pitt county make exhibits and win some of the premiums.

The Board of Aldermen have not done a better thing than the

action in calling for a statement of receipts and expenses of the water and light plants, to be made public. The law under which the Water and Light Commission was created provided that such statements be made to the aldermen every three months, but the law in this respect has not been complied with. The water and light service is costing the town and the consumers much money, and there has been criticism that the financial part of it is not made public just the same as other departments of the town's affairs. The people should be advised just what the receipts and disbursements are, so they may know whether the town is losing or gaining by owning such plants.

Two ministers of the gospel served on the jury at the superior court of Alexander county last week, one of them being a prominent Baptist preacher and the other a Methodist. We make mention of this in order to commend them for so doing and to express the hope that many more ministers may follow their good example. The law does not make ministers ineligible to serve as jurors but merely excuses them and does not require or force them to serve. Every intelligent and law-abiding minister is doing his fellowmen and society a great service when he serves as a juror. The trouble is that much complaint is made of our jury system because so many good men try to evade jury duty. No man has a higher or more responsible duty to perform than serving as a juror and thus pass upon the life, liberty and property of his fellowmen. And the pity is that oft-times this duty is evaded by the very men who are best qualified to discharge it.—Pittsboro Record.
