DR. STILES TO SPEAK.

Both to Medical Men, and to School People and Citizens.

One of the distinguished visitors to be here at the training school celebration and inaugural ceremonies, is Dr. C. W. Stiles, of Washington City, who acted the investigation of the hook-worm and who is the authority in the United States on this as well as other sanitary subjects. This visit of Dr. Stiles means more than showing his interest in the opening of a great State school, for the question of the health of the people is one that concerns him greatly and he is devoting himself to matters along this line, especially in the South.

On Friday afternoon in the mayor's office, Dr. Stiles will deliver an address to the Pitt County Medical Society, and Friday night, in the graded school chapel or some suitable place to be announced; there will be a joint meeting of medical men, school superintendents, high school men and citizens generally to hear him speak on questions pertaining to the public health.

The opportunity to hear so distinguished a medical and sanitary authority as Dr. Stiles should be appreciated by our people, and all who can should hear him. It is conceded by those familiar with his great work that he is doing more for the people of the South than any other living man.

"LYRICS FROM COTTON LAND."

The Reflector received from Stone & Bafringer Co., publishers of Charlotte, a copy of their bandana edition of "Lyrics from Cotton Land" written by the late John Charles McNeil. It is a beautiful volume and worthy a place in any library, both for the excellent matter it contains and the artistic manner in which it is printed, illustrated and bound. In an article in the Charlotte Observer H. E. C. Bryant says:

"Two years ago last Sunday, John Charles McNeil died, and was buried near the home of his parents in Scotland county, but he is not forgotten, for he left behind him a monument more lasting than stone. The friends of the charming young Scotchman with the poetic gift did not begin to realize his real worth until after he has passed away. His songs and lyrics are more highly and genuinely appreciated today than they were when they first came from his pen. Charles S. Stone, who is doing so much for North Carolina writers by aiding them in getting their efforts before the public, has issued through the Stone & Barringer Co. of this city the second edition of "Lyrics from Cotton Land," artistically bound in bandana cloth, and beautifully illustrated by A. B. Frost, E. W. Kemble and Mrs. W. O. Kibble making the most attractive book ever printed in the state. In the cover design, the size and the illustrations, Mr. Stone has shown excellent taste, and the entire South owes him a debt of gratitude for the book is typically Southern."

A DIFFERENCE.

In delivering his charge to the grand jury Monday, Judge Guion, in discussing the question of gambling, explained the difference between dealing in cotton futures, where it is not the interest to deliver any cotton but settle the profits or losses in margins, and the entering into a contract to sell cotton and make actual delivery of it at a certain time. He said that under the law the former is gambling, but the latter is not. Judge Guion impressed the fact that when a person sells cotton to be delivered at a certain time at a specified price, he is under the same obligation to deliver the cotton as he is to fulfill any other contract into which he has entered. Those who have been considering the matter of testing such contracts on the ground that it is gambling, in order to avoid delivering the cotton, should think well before taking such a step, as the law will be against it.

Mr. and Mrs. Haywood Smith, of Marltown, were in our town Sunday.

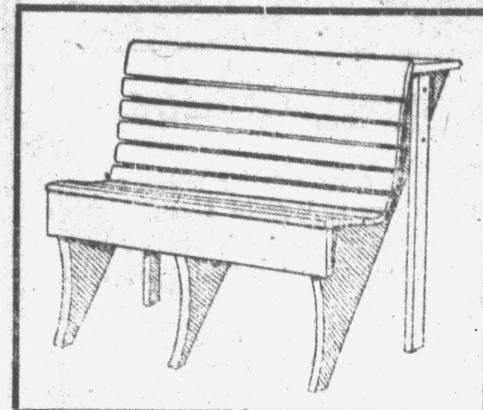
