## THE INAUGURAL CEREMONIES.

### CELEBRATION OF EAST CAROLINA TEACHERS' TRAINING SCHOOL.

More Detailed Report of the Exercises Held Friday—The Day a Great Success—Everybody Happy

The exercises of the celebration of East Carolina Teachers Training School and installation of President R. H. Wright, on Friday, were delayed in beginning until 11, owing to the rain that prevailed through the early hours of the morning. The rain ceased about 9 o'clock, and at once people began turning their faces toward the training school and for two hours the stream of humanity poured in that direction.

It was a fine audience that filled the large auditorium of the school. After the speakers, State officers, presidents of sister schools etc., had entered in a body and taken places upon the rostrum, the students marched in and were greeted with applause as they took their seats.

State Superintendent J. Y. Joyner, who is chairman of the trustees of the school, presided over the exercises. The entire audience rose and sang the doxology, and prayer was offered by Rev. J. H. Shore, pastor of Jarvis Memorial Methodist church.

Owing to circumstances of sorrow, Mayor H. W. Whedbee could not take the part assigned him of extending a welcome for Greenville, but was ably represented in this by Mr. F. C. Harding. Col. F. G. James expressed the welcome for Pitt county, and Prof. W. H. Ragsdale for the faculty.

State Superintendent Joyner then delivered an address in which he gave the history of the movement to establish this school, and paid a beautiful tribute to the late Senator J. L. Fleming, who introduced the bill in the legislature and labored so valiantly for the school. He also spoke eloquently of the labors of ex-Gov. T. J. Jarvis for the school, and expressed regret that illness prevented his presence to take part in these exercises. Without calling names, for he said they were too well known to mention, he referred to the services of Prof. Ragsdale, and he then as chairman of the Board of Trustees of East Carolina Teachers Training School, committed the charge and care of the institution to its president, Robert H. Wright.

Telegrams were read from State Auditor B. F. Dixon, who had missed the morning train, and Governor W. W. Kitchin, who was sick, expressing their regrets at not being present. The governor was represented by State Secretary J. Bryan Grimes, who spoke for the State. Preceding Mr. Grimes' address the audience again arose and with spirit joined in singing "The Old North State." Mr. Grimes referred to the rank of North Carolina in the sisterhood of States, and to Pitt county as the leading educational county. In mentioning those who have been prominent in securing this school, he especially spoke of the late Senator Fleming and said he hoped to see some kind of monument to his memory placed in the school.

Prof. R. H. Wright, president of the school, was then introduced and delivered his inaugural address.

At the conclusion of the address the audience sang "America," and Chairman Joyner introduced the following

representatives of sister institutions present who each gave a word of greeting to this new institution: Prof. M. C. S. Noble, of the University; Dr. D. H. Hill, of the A. & M. College; President J. I. Foust, of the N. & I. College; Dr. J. B. Carlye, of Wake Forest College; President F. P. Hobgood, of Oxford Female Seminary; President E. McK. Goodwin, of the State Deaf and Dumb school.

Chairman Joyner also announced that letters of greeting had been received from the University of Virginia, University of Tennessee, Salem College, Elizabeth College, Oak Ridge Institute, Asheville Normal College, Harvard University, St. Mary's Presbyterian College for Women, Meredith College, Johns Hopkins University, the United States Commissioner of Education and the trustees of the Peabody fund.

Though there were hopes he could be there, ex-Gov. T. J. Jarvis was too unwell to be present and take part in the exercises. It was such a disappointment to both himself and his friends, for no one would have enjoyed the day more than he. From its very beginning his heart has been in this school, and it brings joy to his heart to see a realization of his plans and desires.

#### MR. F. C. HARDING'S ADDRESS.

Mr. Harding said "Some poetic genius, expressing a beautiful thought in beautiful language, has said 'That Hope springs eternal in the human breast, and often times brings within its wake, things substantial.'"

In point of time, scarcely more than a few months ago, the people of the East Carolina indulged the fond hope, that the government of our state might, in its wisdom, establish in our eastern section, an institution for the training of the manhood and womanhood of North Carolina.

Within a few short months, as inch by inch we watched these buildings grow, our hopes have blossomed into fruition, and in the full-grown power of this institution our fondest dreams have been realized.

"And in the name of every citizen of Greenville, in the name of every citizen of the entire county of Pitt, we welcome you to the inaugural ceremonies of the first president of the East Carolina Teachers Training School.

"In keeping with an ancient custom of the Grecian Days, I herewith tender to you today, 'the keys to the city of Greenville.' Her gates have been swung open, and we bid you welcome to our city, to our hearts and to our homes.

You are our guest today, and our Greenville is yours as long as you stay."

#### COL. F. G. JAMES' ADDRESS.

Col. James said "When the erection of a Training School in Eastern Carolina for teachers was first proposed, Pitt county was among the first to endorse the measure and support it with her accustomed zeal, and when the act passed the legislature and became a law, almost her entire population got busy to devise means and ways to secure the location of the new institution here. The contest was friendly, but spirited, and when the smoke of conflict had cleared away the victory was ours. The shouts of rejoicing are still reverberating through many parts of our grand old county and will continue to be occasion-

ally heard until at least some of these new buildings will have become mossy with age; and while all of our citizens did their full duty in voting upon themselves bonds, and going down in their pockets for cash to defray expenses and in many other ways, and while all did their full duty and all deserve great credit, yet in my humble opinion to our eminent leader, our foremost and most beloved citizen, is due most of the honor and glory of planting this great institution upon this beautiful hill, and in the years to come as the noble women and patriotic young men shall go out from these walls to teach in the schools throughout the State, I would have them duly teach their pupils to love, honor and revere the name of Thomas Jordan Jarvis.

"Although Pitt county may not share the historic glory of Mecklenburg and Guilford, her daughters are as fair, pure and as noble and her sons as true, patriotic and brave as trod the earth, and they have at last acquired the one thing needful and are now enthused with the spirit of education, as is evidenced by the many new and handsome school buildings recently erected throughout the county and the large attendance here today, all of which prompts me to pledge to this new institution and its management, the loyal support of all our people.

"And now, Mr. President, members of the faculty and students of the East Carolina Teachers' Training School, in the name of my county, I extend to you a most hearty welcome to our county, to our hearts and to our homes, and express the hope that you have come to stay. And to the visitors who have honored us with their presence here today, I extend to you each and all a Pitt county welcome."

Owing to want of space today we will not publish Prof. Ragsdale's speech until Monday.

## MISSFORTUNE HEAPED ON HIM.

### HIS HOUSE DESTROYED BY FIRE—STORE ROBBED.

Mr L. R. Whichard Suffers Great Loss—Origin of the Fire is Unknown—House Unoccupied

Between 9 and 10 o'clock Friday night the residence of Mr. L. R. Whichard, near Whichard station on the A. C. L. railroad, was destroyed by fire, together with nearly all of the contents.

It is not known how the fire originated, as the house had not been used recently. Since the death of his wife about a month ago, Mr. Whichard had been staying at his mother's, a short distance from his own home. As he was about to retire Friday night he looked out the window toward his home and saw that almost the entire roof was in flames. He hurried there with assistance, but the fire had advanced too far to save anything of consequence. There was a little insurance on the building but none on the furniture.

A few nights previous to the fire, some one had taken advantage of Mr. Whichard's absence and broken into his store near the depot, carrying away a quantity of goods.

**DR. STILES' LECTURE.**

The auditorium of the graded school was more than filled Friday night to hear the illustrated lecture of Dr. C. W. Stiles, of Washington City, on the hook worm disease. The Reflector will not undertake to give a synopsis of the lecture, as it could be appreciated only by hearing it and closely following the speaker. Dr. Stiles has for several years been making a study of conditions in the South with special investigation of the hook worm disease, and the illustrations and statistics given in his lecture shows the alarming extent in which this disease exists. He declared that our people are too extravagant with human life, that is they give heed only to the spectacular, becoming greatly excited over something like the sinking of a ship attended by the loss of a few hundred lives, yet feel little or no concern about the existence of diseases that annually claim thousands of victims. The purpose of his lecture was to correct this by educating the people to better sanitary conditions through which they can safeguard health and materially lower the death rate. That this section should give heed to, Dr. Stiles' advice is shown in his statement that in the few hours he spent in Greenville he saw fully one hundred people who have the hook worm disease. Dr. Stiles is certainly doing the people a great service, and nothing that has been heard here is calculated to do more real good than his lecture Friday night.

How well Greenville lived up to her motto Friday, "Our Greenville, yours if you come," was attested by the many expressions of praise from the visitors. Every one was made to feel entirely at home, and that for the time being the town was really theirs. Surely every citizen has more cause to feel proud of his town today than ever before. It can be truthfully said that no demand is at any time made upon our people that they do not prove equal to the occasion.

President Wright's inaugural address is praised by all who heard it or read the full copy of it in The Reflector. It shows how wise was the selection of the trustees of so able a man as president of East Carolina Teachers Training School.

**What 15c Cotton Means to the South.**

Fifteen-cent cotton is a reality, and the best part of it is that growers will reap the benefit, for a large percentage of the crop is still in their hands. The current price for cotton is the highest recorded in thirty years, except for a short time when Daniel Sully had the market cornered. Although the yield will be comparatively small, probably not exceeding 11,000,000 or 11,500,000 bales, the value of cotton and by products will be approximately \$900,000,000 the largest in the history of the industry.

Mills in this country are not buying the staple to the extent they did in past years owing to the high price and their inability to mark up quotations for the unfinished product to correspond with the cost of the raw material, but foreign consumers are taking every bale they can obtain, and exports already have reached figures that will go far toward repaying the \$500,000,000 which American bankers are said to have borrowed in Europe for the purpose of furthering speculation in Wall street stocks. When we contemplate the great wealth this season's cotton crop will bring to the South, we do not wonder that that section sees boom times ahead.—Baltimore News.

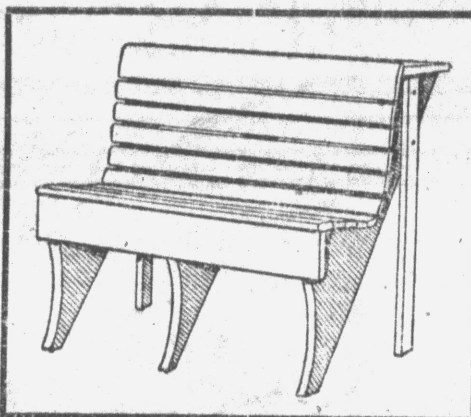
