#### Col. John R. Webster Dead.

Reidsville, Nov. 28.—Col. John R. Webster, aged 64, Confederate soldier, once speaker of the house of representatives and editor of Webster's Weekly, died early this morning as a result of the second stroke of paralysis which he suffered just a week ago. The funeral will be held from Main Street Methodist church Tuesday at 2:30.

Colonel Webster was a vigorous editorial writer and his paper had a wide reputation for the brilliancy of its editorial page. Four years ago he had a stroke of paralysis and has since been feeble, but his mind was clear until the last and only a few days before the end he announced that his paper would be continued.

A brother, Mr. W. A. Webster, of Archdale, and a sister, Mrs. Barrow, of Winston, and his wife, who was Miss Lillie Morrison, survive.

#### Cotton Crop Estimate.

New Orleans, Nov. 28.—The Times-Democrat in presenting its correspondents' final reports on the cotton crop of 1909, states that the consensus of opinion points to a total of 10,625,000 bales.

The figures by States follow: Alabama, 1,050,000; Arkansas, 725,000; Georgia and Florida, 2,000,000; Louisiana, 350,000; Mississippi, 1,100,000; North Carolina, 725,000; Oklahoma, 625,000; South Carolina, 1,150,000; Tennessee, 300,000; Texas, 2,600,000; total, 11,625,000.

#### Correspondents report that farmers have hitherto been disposed to sell freely at current prices, but now are inclined to hold the remnant.

#### Happenings of Interest in North Carolina.

Henderson, N. C., Nov. 29.—Mr. Asa Parham was a victim of a terrible accident at the bagging factory. His hand was caught in the machinery and badly crushed and lacerated. He suffered extremely, but is getting on nicely.

Raleigh, Nov. 29.—A paper was presented to the Methodist conference this morning creating a commission for founding a new Methodist college of a high grade. The following were named on commission: J. B. Brown, J. F. Burton, R. B. John, George F. Smith, H. M. North, John N. Cole and J. S. Wynne.

Charlotte, N. C., Nov. 29.—Mr. Robert Simpson, one of the most prominent farmers of the county, was shot and killed early last night by Mr. Will Hartis, a son of Mr. Henry Hartis, also well known in the Mint Hill section of the county, the scene of the tragedy being at Mullis' store, three miles from Bain academy.

Statesville, Nov. 29.—A distressing death occurred in Eagle Mills township, in the northern section of the county, Saturday, when young Tosso Hayes died from the effects of injuries received in an accident Friday, while cutting saw logs. Young Hayes and his father were in the woods together and had chopped down a medium size tree, which lodged against another tree. The course of the falling tree was changed and before the younger woodsman could get out of the way he was caught under the tree and so badly injured that he died the next day.

In the death of Col. John B. Webster, editor of Webster's Weekly, of Reidsville, North Carolina loses one of her best and most brilliant editors. He rendered his State great service.

Walter Wellman, one of the would-be North Pole discoverers who failed to find it, comes out in an article denouncing Dr. Cook as an imposter. The doctor's achievement seems to have aroused the animosity of all who coveted the honor.

### Raise Hogs.

We have often spoken of the advantage of diversified crops for North Carolina farmers, hogs being mentioned as one of the useful crops, if we may call them a crop.

And now the report comes from Chicago, the centre of the hog meat market in the United States, that the price of bacon is going up and going up to stay; that the hogs of the country are not keeping pace with the growth of the population, and that soon bacon will be a luxury for the rich rather than an ordinary article of diet for the poor. This is brought about by the fact that grain is selling higher in the west and that the large land owners of that section are selling out their stock of hogs.

Why North Carolina should import western hog meat we are unable to see, but the fact remains that we have been using it in almost incredible amounts, and that if we continue to use it, we will have to pay the price, whatever the price may be.

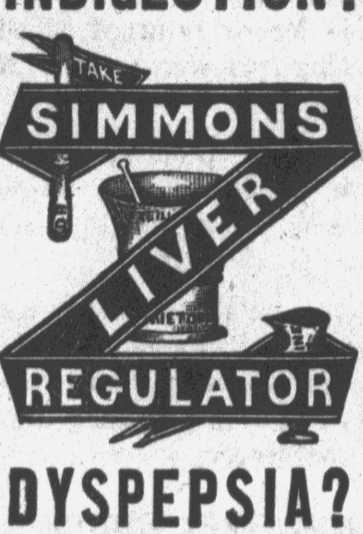
But why should it make any difference to a North Carolina farmer whether western meat is high or low? If he is wise he will raise his own meat and maybe a little to sell and so be benefitted rather than hurt by the increase in price. But will the North Carolina farmer do this? He never has. But the pinch of the higher price may force him to do so. — Greensboro News.
