MOVEMENT OF PASSENGER TRAINS

For the Missionary Baptists of North Carolina.

Prof. E. L. Middleton, statistical secretary of the Baptist State Convention, yesterday gave out the following interview: "The convention year closed November 30. There are 61 associations in the convention, 55 of which made their reports for 1909, which are larger than those of any previous year. For those associations that have not made their reports, the reports of 1908 will be used at the convention.

"There has been an advance at every point. There are now 1,899 Baptist churches in North Carolina, with 1,681 Sunday schools. The total membership in these churches is 217,967; the total Sunday school membership 153,474. Besides these figures there are a number of churches that have not reported membership. These would add nearly 3,000 each to the total church and Sunday school membership.

"During the past year there have been 12,752 baptisms. Financially there has been an advance at every point. There are seven objects to which our people contribute—State missions, home missions, foreign mission, orphanage, ministerial education, aged ministers and Sunday school missions. To these objects has been contributed during the past year, \$136,885.33. This is a net gain over last year \$13,300. There has been a marked gain in the contributions to State and foreign missions. We have given to State missions, \$39,327.95, and to Sunday school missions, which is a part of the funds of the same board, \$2,018.18, an aggregate of \$41,346.13, used in State mission work this year. To foreign missions our people have contributed over \$37,000. All objects show splendid gains.

"In the Sunday school work there have been gains along all lines—membership of schools, number of schools, number of officers and teachers, perennial or evergreen schools and ratio of Sunday school members to church members

"In our denomination, as in all others, there are individuals and churches that are doing nothing. "There has been during the past year, one baptism for every seventeen members in the State. One thousand, three hundred and forty-six churches report baptisms, 1,632 have made contributions to one or more of the objects of the convention, 1,394 have given to State missions, 1,209 to home missions, 1,456 to foreign missions, 450 to Sunday school missions, 1,422 to the orphanage, 633 to ministerial education and 773 to aged ministers." —Raleigh News and Observer.

Washington, Dec. 6.—Representative Sulzer to-day declared war on Nicaragua in a resolution introduced in the house proposing that the house proposing that the president shall use the land and naval forces to restore order, maintain peace and protect life and property in Zelaya's republic.

He demands the arrest, trial and punishment of Zelaya for the murder of the American citizens. Vice Consul Caldera in a dispatch to the State Department today says that Zelaya is sending troops and artillery eastward for the big battle with Estrada. It is rumored he is preparing to leave the country in case of defeat.

Some of them are poking fun at Raleigh because the committee to select a slogan for that city fell upon one that has long been in use in cities of other States. Raleigh had better have followed Greenville's example and adopted a slogan that is original and has some meaning.

COUNTY OFFICERS ON SALARY

In all parts of the state of North Carolina the people are beginning to talk of putting their county officers on salary instead of having them on a commission basis. The salary basis seems to be the most satisfactory way as all of the counties that have tried it are satisfied and others are changing to it. The movement in North Carolina seems to have started during the legislative session of 1905. At that session an act was passed providing for salaries for the county officers of Guilford county, and the fees which have been collected by the officers before were thereafter to be accounted for to the salary fund of the county, and provide the necessary machinery for checking up such fees. Following that enactment there were similar acts passed for Buncombe and Forsyth counties.

At the session of 1907 the acts then in force for the three counties above named were amended in some slight particulars, and similar acts were passed for Columbus and Robeson counties. This gave the people of these counties an opportunity to see how the new plan worked and they were all so well pleased that at the session of the legislature in 1909 a large number of counties asked to have their officers put on salary, and Cleveland, Craven, Durham, Henderson, Pitt, Madison, Rockingham, and Rutherford counties left the old fee system for the modern salary basis.

The movement seems to be confined to no special class of counties as you will find by looking over the map such counties as Buncombe, Durham, Forsyth and Guilford each containing large cities. On the other hand you will find such farming counties as Robeson, Columbus and Madison and the play seems to be working very

satisfactorily for them.

Within about four years' time the idea has spread all over the state and now about one eighth of the counties are on the salary basis, while it is being agitated and talked all over the state and it is likely that in the near future all the counties will come to the salary idea for all county officers.

Each county should adopt the salary system and give each officer a salary in keeping with his office and the requirements of his office and then all money collected should go to the county. Each county should be run as a business institution for all the people in the county and the officers should be well paid for their work and then required to do their full duty and the profits from each office would go to pay the expenses of the county. Nearly all the counties in the state are going to fight this question out in the near future and it is well for the taxpayers to inform themselves on the merits of the case. Study both sides and see the advantages each system has to offer for the benefit of the county.—Raleigh Times.
