This time it is the Phoenix Insurance Company, of Brooklyn, that is catching it in the form of an investigation.

If Colorado sends a woman to congress as now seems probable, wonder if "Uncle Joe" will make her take off her high hat.

For pity sake do not write Xmas for Christmas. Such an abbreviation or contraction robs the word of its beauty and meaning.

Though the president was late getting down at it he made good use of his time, and his message to congress was longer than had been looked for.

The old familiar Turner-Ennis North Carolina almanac has put in its appearance for 1910. It contains its usual good fund of information.

The report of the government secretary of the treasury, as embodied in the president's message to congress, shows that government expenses for the current year will be about \$75,000,000 in excess of receipts. There ought to be a sufficient reform to wipe out such a deficit.

The Greenville Reflector thinks that liquor is too scarce and eggs too high for eggnog to be as plentiful as usual this Christmas. If the Reflector man could be in Durham several days just before Christmas, he could see the jug train coming from Virginia, loaded down every day with jugs and packages, and would naturally conclude that there will be no scarcity of liquor in this vicinity. —Durham Sun.

This is quite a neat bid for more citizens in Durham.

Some of the important matters discussed by President Taft in his message to congress are, how to bring the revenues of the government to a figure in keeping with the expenditures; to check frauds in the collection of customs; to expedite legal procedure in the courts; to establish postal savings banks; higher rates of postage on magazines and periodicals to lessen the deficit in the postoffice department; a ship subsidy, and the conservation of our natural resources. These things may all be approved by the Republicans, but Democrats will be found very much opposed to some of them.

Study Your Farm.

A farm is likely to be especially adapted to some particular line of work, and the farmer himself is likely to be able to do one kind of farming better than any other kind. As a general rule, it will pay the farmer to specialize—that is, to have some one crop or some one kind of stock which is made the main object of his farming, and to which the other crops and the other branches of farm work are subsidiary. If a man wishes to be a cotton farmer, he should plan to give his cotton every possible advantage, and his other crops should be laid out with a view to this end. If he is a trucker, the trucking crop should be the central figure around which his other operations are arranged. If he is a dairyman, the crops he raises and the other stock which he keeps should be disposed and handled with reference to the dairy work—Raleigh (N. C.) Progressive Farmer.

The Carve.
Wonderful skill is displayed in the manufacture of miniature timepieces that are used to ornament bracelets and other pieces of jewelry. The parts of these miniature watches are necessarily as perfect as those used in a much larger timepiece, but much smaller. They must be examined under a powerful microscope.

Some of the small screws are only one twelve-hundred-and-fiftieth part of an inch in diameter and seven one-thousandth part of an inch in length. An idea of their size can be formed when it is estimated that it would require about 100,000 of these delicate parts to fill an ordinary thimble.
