N. & S. Railroad Sold.

Norfolk, Va., Dec. 8.—Representing Marsden J. Perry, of Providence, R. I., and other re-organization interests, Rathbone Gardner, of New York, bid in the properties and franchises of the Norfolk and Southern Railway Company, sold at auction here today, under decree of the United States court. The purchase price, \$8,500,000, is considered cheap for this property, which is now in the hands of receivers, but is expected to be freed from litigation shortly after the sale is confirmed by Judge Edmond Waddill.

The special commissioners who sold the property were Harry K. Wolcott and Edward R. Baird, Jr., of Norfolk, former Governor T. J. Jarvis, of North Carolina, and Frederick Hope, of New York.

STATE NEWS.

Happenings of Interest in North Carolina.

R. B. Raney, one of Raleigh's most prominent and public spirited men, died Wednesday after an illness of only a few days.

Durham, N. C., Dec. 7.—A. W. Douglass, a contractor, dropped dead this morning on top of Duke factory, where he was at work with three other men. The builder was doing some repairing when neuralgia of the heart struck him and he fell, but was prevented from falling to the ground by the flatness of the structure and when let down was dropped through the skylight. He was fifty years old.

The case against Mrs. Thomas Farmer, John H. well, white, and Ben Farmer, colored, for the attempted murder of Thomas Farmer on the night of May 18th, was disposed of Tuesday. A submission was entered and Mrs. Farmer was fined \$750, John Howell was sent to the Reformatory at Concord and Ben Farmer was sent to the roads for seventeen months. From evidence produced on trial it appears that Farmer has been threatening and abusing his wife. He was required to give a \$250 bond to keep the peace—Snow Hill Standard-Laconic.

Mr. Cook performed the ceremony and the bride returned to the store with her friends, where the groom called for her about half an hour later.

BANKS ARE LIABLE.

Those Which Deal in Stocks Must Pay the Broker's Tax

Banks which buy and sell stocks are liable to the State and county broker's tax of \$75, according to the opinion of Attorney General Rickett.

The opinion of the attorney general to Treasurer Lacy is as follows:

Dear Sir—Replying to yours of this date relative to stock brokers I beg to advise: It appears that certain banks in the State are dealing in stock and bonds. Such banks are, in my opinion, liable for the stock brokers' license prescribed by Section 54 of the Revenue Act of 1909. It is immaterial that the charters of the banks authorized them to act as stock brokers. The banking business proper does not include the buying and selling of stocks and bonds, and while it is perfectly proper for the State to authorize a bank to engage in business of this kind, when it does so it must pay the same license as is imposed upon individuals.—New & Observer.

Amount of Cotton Ginned to Dec. 1st.

Washington, Dec. 8.—The bureau of the census report on cotton ginning, issued this morning at 10 o'clock, shows 8,878,277 bales, counting round bales as half bales, ginned from the growth of 1909, to December 1, compared with 11,006,661 for 1908; 8,343,396 for 1907; 10,027,868 for 1906.

Money Deposited in Banks.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 8.—With total resources of \$450.19 per capita of population, the banking institutions of the Eastern or Middle Atlantic States lead the country. The New England comes next with \$433.63 per capita; the Pacific States are third with \$347.78; the Middle Western fourth with \$190.64; the far Western fifth \$161.35; the Southern sixth with \$71.19, and island possessions tail off with \$5.22 per capita. The United States as a whole show banking resources per capita of \$237.24; with the island possessions included the rate is lowered to \$215.37. West Virginia heads the Southern list with a per capita of \$112.66; Louisiana follows with \$96.31; then in order come Texas, 90.67; Virginia, \$88.61; Kentucky, \$86.66; Florida, \$86.54; Tennessee, \$71.46; Georgia, \$64.23; South Carolina, \$52.84; North Carolina and Alabama each \$55.41; Mississippi, \$45.33; Arkansas, \$41.14.

Van Ray Found Guilty.

Durham, Dec. 8.—The Van Ray murder case went to the jury this afternoon in record making time, the special venire reporting, a jury being selected, the witnesses examined and the speeches and charge delivered all in a day. The jury found the Ray girl guilty of murder in the second degree, Judge Biggs reserving sentence until morning.

Editor W. C. Dowd, of the Charlotte News, was elected president of the Baptist State Convention now in session at Wadesboro. The convention made a wise choice and honored itself in bestowing this honor upon Mr. Dowd.

Pitt county farmers have saved more hay this fall than in any previous year, and it means that less of the Western article will be shipped in here next spring and summer. The Reflector always has a feeling of pity for the farmers who come to town to buy hay and corn for their stock, and is glad to think that kind of farming in Pitt county is becoming less.

All Good Roads not Macadam Roads.

A fuller investigation as to the merits of different kinds of roads has only deepened the conviction expressed last week as to the folly of waiting for macadam in most rural counties. If you have a bond issue you can build from three to five times as many miles of good gravel or sand-clay roads as the same money will build of macadam, and unless the traffic is very heavy, most road-builders regard them as equal to the macadam in value. Wherever a bond issue is proposed it ought to be very seriously considered as to whether it is not better to have gravel or sand-clay roads, and from three to five times as much of them as you can have macadam, than to have the very much smaller mileage of macadam.—Raleigh (N. C.) Progressive Farmer.

GAME ANIMALS OF MEXICO.

They Include Nearly Every Species Found in North America.

It may be said that every species of game animal found on the North American continent anywhere south of the fiftieth parallel north, except moose, caribou and elk, is found in Mexico. The silver tip bear ranges all through the high Sierra Madres wherever there are good feeding grounds, and wherever there are grizzlies one may expect also the huge cinnamon bear, the grizzly's close neighbor. The common brown bear is not so numerous, but the black bear is quite plentiful. The white faced bear is more rare, though it is sometimes found in the coast mountains. I could not learn that this species had ever been seen in the Sierra Madres.

The higher mountains at all elevations and even the lower foothills abound with white tail deer. On the Pacific side they are numerous almost to the coast. I saw them just outside the city of Culiacan. They are very plentiful in Tepic territory, and I can vouch from personal experience for the quality of their venison. At many

mountain cabins where I stopped they were household pets, where as fawns they had been found and raised by children.

The mule, burro or blacktail inhabits portions of the states of Chihuahua, Coahuila and Sonora.

The mountain lion lurks in all the high country, and along with him is sometimes found, but seldom killed, the American panther. All the American great cats, in fact, inhabit both the Pacific and gulf coasts and the foothills. The small American leopard is very numerous all along the hot country coasts, and the Mexican jaguar, known locally by foreigners as the tiger, preys upon cattle and ranch animals to such a degree as to be very much of a nuisance.

There are some timber wolves, but they are not dangerous. The one animal that is really dangerous is the javalin, or Mexican wild boar. It runs in large bands and will kill both man and horse. If a javalin is wounded the whole band will turn upon the hunter, and woe to him if he has not provided for escape or safety. The javalin is very numerous in some sections, but if not molested it is not likely to attack.—Dillon Wallace in Outing Magazine.

A Scheme That Failed.

"Did you hear about Samuels?" asked Mrs. Graymare's husband. "No, I didn't hear about Samuels," the lady answered. "When you have anything to tell why don't you tell it?"

"Yes, dear. Well, Samuels was going home the other night when a footpad shot at him, and the ball hit a latchkey in Samuels' vest pocket, and his life was saved. So you see what good a latchkey is."

"Indeed! If Samuels had been going home at a reasonable hour he wouldn't have met any footpad; second, he carries £2,000 insurance, payable to his wife, and if it had not been for that key she would be a rich widow now. So if you are hunting around for a latchkey you will have to bring home some better story than that one: that's all. I'm going to bed now, and out goes the gas in two ticks. Latchkey, indeed!"—London Globe.

Give Goldfish Shade.

A friend was showing me her collection of goldfish the other day with great pride. The tiny fish were darting about here and there in the clear water, and, then resting for awhile, they found life very pleasant.

Some people do not seem to realize that it is positive cruelty to keep these fish in an open vessel without any shade.

Fish have no lids to shield their eyes, as we have, and so cannot endure a bright light. They suffer greatly if entirely exposed, as is evident from the way in which they dash around and around, sometimes until they are fairly worn out.

Shade can easily be provided by placing growing plants, dense enough to shelter the fish, near the globe in which they are kept or by placing a grove of rocks in the aquarium itself.—Philadelphia Inquirer.

A Sensitive Policeman.

An irascible policeman of Paris, arrested a peaceful citizen for calling him a "geometrician." The citizen was talking rather loudly to the proprietor of an old curiosity shop, with whom he was at variance as to the value of alleged antiquities offered for sale in the establishment. The policeman in an excess of zeal entered the shop and expostulated with the citizen for shouting at the top of his voice.

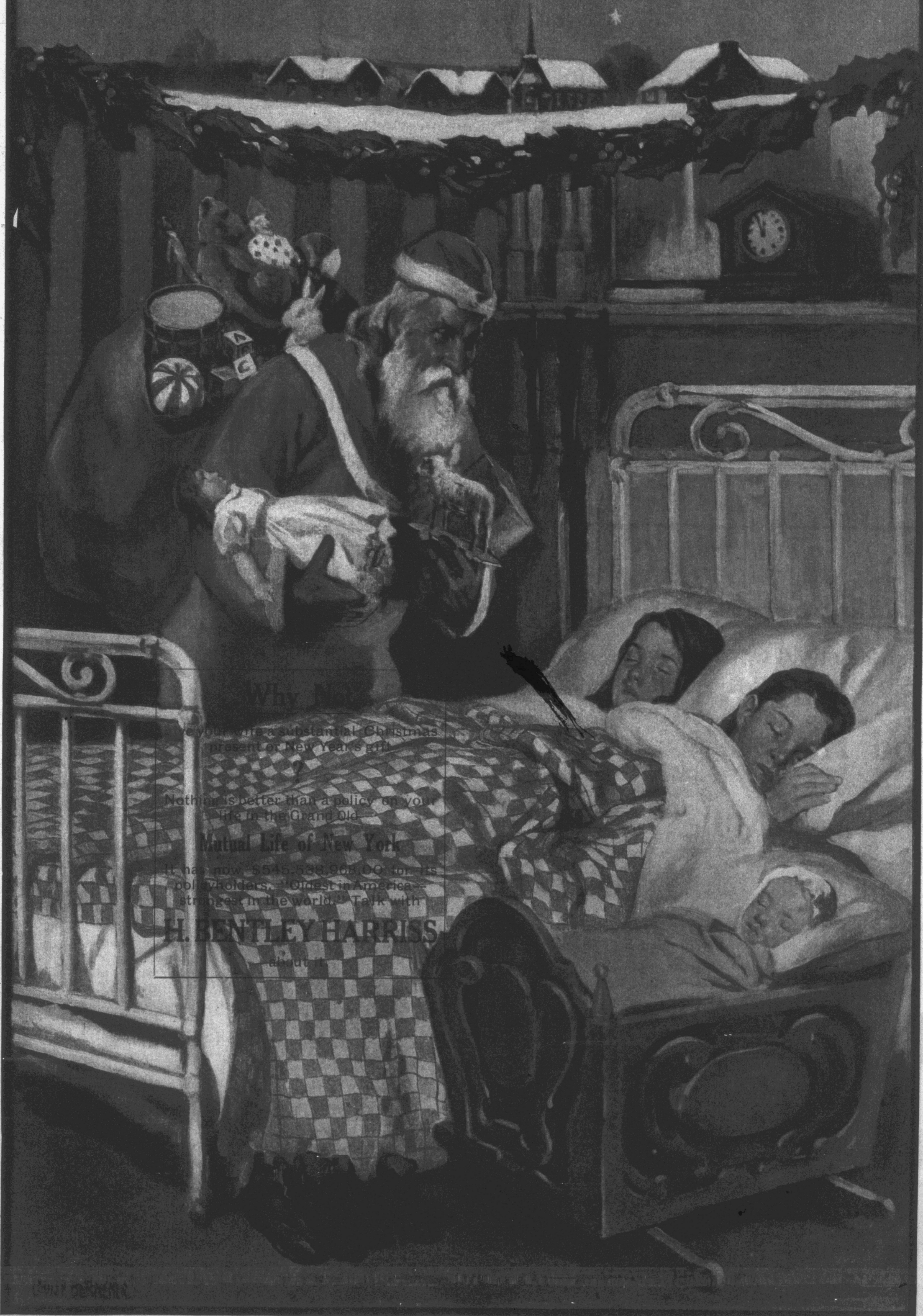

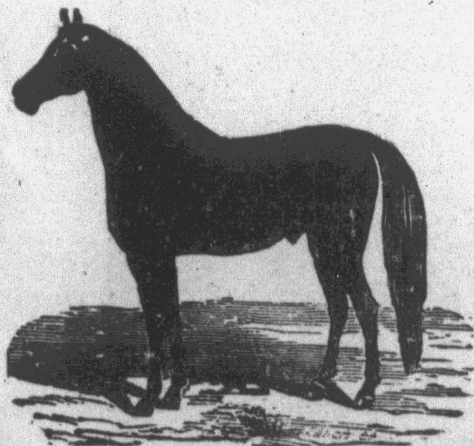
