They have hired some more liars to try to disprove Cook's claim to the discovery of the North Pole. One of these says he made Cook's observations and another says he wrote the report that has been sent to Copenhagen. Wonder how much they got out of Peary for making these statements.

A recent dispatch sent out from Washington says:

President Taft's new plan for recognition of negro Republicans contemplates the appointment of colored men to offices in the Northern States where there are large negro populations. It is understood that he will appoint white men to fill the offices in the South now held by negroes as soon as the terms of the incumbents expire. The appointment of Northern negroes to office in their own section is the president's idea of the proper compensation to the race for the loss of offices South.

Mr. Taft has made a discovery—that the low rates of postage on newspapers and periodicals is a "subsidy." He should inform himself of the facts. A man, not too well known, meets a violent death and the community is shocked: his funeral is largely attended and by scores of people who never heard of him. Another man is seized with illness and lies for months, perhaps years, on a bed of weakness. When he finally passes over, the river it is sometimes a hard job to get enough people to help bury him. We knew of a case in this town once where a man who was always administering to the sick and needy. We had no trained nurses in those days and neighbors and strangers had to be depended on to sit up at night with the sick. This man was always to be depended on, no matter how lowly and dependent the sick, yet he lingered for many months on a sick bed and when he died only a handful of people were present to put him away. Had some one shot him dead in his tracks no church in town would have held the congregation.—Greensboro Record.
