## TOMORROW TELLS THE TALE.

The Reflector Piano Contest Will Close at 12 O'clock Sharp.

## Good Farming.

Mr. Gray Corey, of Carolina township, was in Wednesday to renew his subscription to The Reflector and told us something about his farming this year that is worth telling. From 6 acres of land he raised 108 barrels of corn, or 18 barrels per acre. On the same land ahead of the corn he raised a crop of Irish potatoes and got 50 bushels of these to the acre. In addition to the potatoes and corn he had a heavy pea crop on the same land. This is good farming and shows what proper cultivation will produce. Mr. Corey says this land a few years ago only made about 5 barrels of corn per acre.

## Two North Carolinians Pardoned.

Washington, D. C. Dec. 21.—The President has made Christmas gifts of liberty to two North Carolinians who are serving sentence for their connection with postoffice robberies in the State. One of these to gain freedom during the holiday season is John Leonard, who was convicted several years ago of robbing the postoffice at Dunn. He was sentenced to five years imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$500. His term would have expired February, 1912.

The other beneficiary of President Taft's pardoning power is Charlie Williams, who was sentenced in Judge Purnell's court to five years imprisonment and to pay \$500 in costs. His term would have expired February 1912. His pardon was recommended because he has informed postoffice inspectors as to men who have committed other postoffice robberies in the South. Much of this information has been very valuable, and more is expected from him by government officials.

Norfolk, Dec. 122.—The Norfolk and Southern railway's \$1,000,000 five and a half mile trestle bridge across Albemarle sound, North Carolina, the longest of its kind in the world, has been completed, and the first train will cross it this week. The completion of this stupendous undertaking, long declared impossible, connects the two ends of the Norfolk and Southern and terminal railway's ferry service across Albemarle sound, which has existed since the inauguration of railroading in eastern North Carolina.

The rush of the holiday season is over with the wholesaler, but the retail dealers are in the midst of the busiest season of the year and in practically all lines usually affected by this season dealers report active trade, and a considerable increase over last season is noted. Wholesalers and manufacturers are closing this year's work and the pre-inventory quietude in distributive lines is noticed. The high price of practically all staples continue. Produce and most fruits are scarce and high. Fancy dressed meats and turkeys are unusually high. Tobacco is being marketed in larger quantities and prices compare favorably with those of last year, prices for sun cured wrappers ranging up to thirty cents. Collections are good.

This, the admiral declares, should be done at once in the interests of justice and to establish beyond question the claims of Peary.

The admiral believes that the some body which threw out and repudiated Cook's data should be permitted to pass upon the data submitted by Peary to the Geographical society.
