BRADLEY WILL SEND EXPEDITION

Will Look Into Some of Dr. Cook's Doings in Arctic.

John R. Bradley, Dr. Cook's backer in his polar expedition is, according to Associated Press dispatches, preparing to make another expedition into the Arctic regions.

In a telegram sent from Atlanta yesterday he admitted that he had written to Captain Sverdrup regarding an expedition into the polar sea north of Crocker land.

While he has not yet revealed the purpose of this second expedition it is believed by those who know him that he intends personally to investigate Cook's explorations in the polar regions and satisfy himself just how far, if at all, Cook imposed upon him.

Mr. Bradley stated that when the first news of Cook's exploit was received that he had spent approximately \$50,000 in equipping and maintaining the expedition, and if Cook did not make a dash to the pole at all it would be interesting to Bradley to know what became of the money. Mr. Bradley and his family are expected here later in the season. —Asheville Citizen.

AFTER TOBACCO TRUST.

Attorney General Bickett on Hand to Watch Progress.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 4.—Among the most interested listeners today at the hearing of argument before the Supreme court of the United States in the case of the government for the dissolution of the tobacco trust was Attorney-General T. W. Bickett, of North Carolina.

Mr. Bickett came to Washington especially to hear the argument in this case and this fact was discussed by some Tar Heels as indicative of a purpose on the part of the State administration to take some sort of action against the American Tobacco Company, which had its origin in North Carolina, and which has always operated extensively there.

It is an open secret that friends of the present State administration have been much disappointed as the result of its failure to make a move against the American Tobacco Company while the Federal government display unusual activity in an effort to bring it to terms.—T. J. Pence in Raleigh News and Observer.

PERSONAL ORDERS ONLY.

The new liquor law passed by congress went into effect January 1. It requires that all orders for intoxicants coming from dry territory be accompanied by the actual bona fide personal order of the consignee and prevents the general practice heretofore existing of indiscriminate ordering by one person for a score of others. The law is as follows:

"Section 288: Any officer, agent or employe of any railroad company, express company or other common carrier, who shall knowingly deliver or cause to be delivered to any person other than the person to whom it has been consigned, unless upon the written order in each instance of the bona fide consignee, or to any fictitious person, or to any person under a fictitious name, any spirituous, vinous, malted, fermented, or other intoxicating liquor of any kind which has been shipped from one State, Territory, or district of the United States or place noncontiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof into any other State, Territory, or district of the United States, or place noncontiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof, or from any foreign country into any State, Territory, or district of the United States or place noncontiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof shall be fined not more than five thousand dollars, or imprisoned not more than two years, or both."

pany, express company, or other common carrier, or any other person who in connection with the transportation of any spirituous, vinous, malted, fermented, or other intoxicating liquor of any kind from one State, Territory, or district of the United States, or place noncontiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof, into any other State, Territory, or district of the United States, or place noncontiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof, or from any foreign country into any State, Territory, or district of the United States, or place noncontiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof, shall collect the purchase price or any part thereof, before, on, or after delivery from the consignee, or from any other person, or shall in any manner act as the agent of the buyer or seller of any such liquor, for the purpose of buying or selling, or completing the sale thereof, saving only in the actual transportation and delivery of the same, shall be fined not more than five thousand dollars.

"Sec. 240. Whoever shall knowingly ship or cause to be shipped from one State, Territory, or district of the United States, or place noncontiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof, or from any foreign country into any State, Territory, or district of the United States, or place noncontiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof, of any package of or package containing any spirituous, vinous, malted, fermented, or other intoxicating liquor of any kind, unless such package be so labeled on the outside cover as to plainly show the name of the consignee, the nature of its contents and the quality, contained therein, shall be fined not more than five thousand dollars and such liquor shall be forfeited to the United States, and may be seized and condemned by like proceedings as those provided by law for the seizure and forfeiture of property imported into the United States contrary to law."
