TAFT'S EXTRAVAGANCE EXPOSED

Appropriations Could be Reduced \$100,000,000.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 4.—Had the President's daughter and son, Miss Helen and Robert Taft, remained in the House gallery a few minutes longer today they would have heard their father roundly criticised by Representative Adair, of Indiana, for alleged extravagances of the executive department.

Mr. Adair said the President's salary should not have been increased to \$75,000 a year, adding that a President "with practically no expense, who could not save from an income of \$50,000 a year a sufficient sum to live in ease the balance of his life, in my judgment does not have sufficient business capacity to direct the affairs of this great nation."

Attacking the President's allowance of \$35,000 for vehicles, stables, etc., Mr. Adair argued that this \$30,000 is too much, and he also asserted that one-third of the \$9,000 allowance for care of the White House green houses would "furnish the President with all the flowers he can possibly use."

Without depriving the President of any of the comforts or luxuries which properly belong to the White House, Mr. Adair said, the appropriations of the executive department which were \$329,420 last year, could be reduced at least \$75,000 per year.

Mr. Adair declared that appropriations for all purposes could be reduced at least \$100,000,000 a year without impairing any part of the government service. "Extravagance and waste permeate everywhere through the Federal service," he said amid Democratic applause, "and Congress has been voting away the people's money until we have reached a point where the revenues are not sufficient to meet our enormous expenditures." He asserted that while the population had increased about 40 per cent since 1890, expenditures had increased 100 per cent.

Opposing the proposition to pension government employes, Mr. Adair said the departments in Washington were crowded with incompetents who have held positions for many years at salaries possibly greater than they could have earned elsewhere, and if they had failed to lay aside part of their earnings for a rainy day the failure was due to no fault of the government.

Characterizing the government detective service as the "dumping ground for those who had rendered political service," Mr. Adair said that outside of the benefits derived from the work of the meat and pure food inspectors, the \$7,126,000 appropriated for that service last year had been wasted.

"There is more extravagance in the army and navy than in any other departments of our government," said Mr. Adair. "It is enough to bankrupt any government in the world to spend \$238,132,699 each year for the maintenance of its army and navy, and that too, in time of peace."

NEW BRIDGE MADE USELESS

30 Feet of N. & S Albemarle Bridge Carried Away.

The Norfolk and Southern railway's bridge across Albemarle Sound was completed last Saturday and the first train went over the structure that evening carrying the officials of the road. Monday about 30 feet of the bridge was carried away by a tug towing a barge.

In the bridge has been constructed two draws. The larger of the two has not as yet been adjusted so as to be operated. The smaller draw seems to work. Monday the tug and barge attempted to pass through the bridge by using the smaller draw. It was found that the span was not wide enough for the entrance of the barge so the captain of the tug forced his way through, with the result the bridge was considerably damaged. This makes the structure useless for some time yet.—Washington News.

ANOTHER TEXAS LETTER.

Delfina, Texas, Dec. 31, 1909. To The Greenville Reflector.

Of all that extensive empire which once acknowledged the authority of Spain in the New World, no portion for interest and importance can be compared with Mexico, and this equally whether we consider the variety of soil and climate the inexhaustible stores of its mineral wealth, its scenery, grand and picturesque beyond example, the character of its ancient inhabitants, not only far surpassing in intelligence that of other North American races, but reminding us by their monument of the primitive civilization of Egypt and Hindoostan; or lastly, the peculiar circumstances of its conquest, adventurous and romantic as any legend devised by Norman or Italian Band of chivalry.

Journeying from the coast country to the interior, traveling some twenty leagues (50 to 60 miles) the traveler finds himself coming into a purer atmosphere. The aspect of nature, too, has changed, and the eye no longer revels among the gay variety of colors with which the landscape was painted there. The vanilla, the indigo and the flowering cocoa groves disappear as he advances the sugar cane and the glossy leaved banana still accompany him, and when he has ascended about 4,000 feet he sees in the unchanging verdure and the rich foliage of the liquid-amber tree that he has reached the height where clouds and mists settle in their passage from the Mexican gulf. He has entered the tierra templada or temperate region, whose character resembles that of the temperate zone of the globe, or better the region of eternal spring.

The features of the scene become grand and even terrible. His road sweeps along the base of mighty mountains, once gleaming with volcanic fires, and still resplendent in their mantles of snow, which serve as beacons to the mariners for many, many miles at sea.

New Bern wants to celebrate her two hundredth anniversary this year. Here is hoping she will have a big time of it.

A resolution has been offered in congress to investigate the cause of the increased cost of living. It may not be hard to find the cause, but what people who are paying the bills would like for somebody to find is the remedy.

The high price of last year's cotton crop may be a temptation to farmers to plant for a large crop this year. If they yield to this temptation and make a bumper crop, they will find much disappointment in the low price that will prevail.

It is a pity that just at the time of rejoicing over the completion of the long Norfolk & Southern bridge across Albemarle sound, that there comes an accident which wrecks several feet of it. Wonder if there was not some premeditation in running the barge against the bridge.

Turning to the South.

In its announcement of a forthcoming issue devoted to the South, Collier's takes occasion to forecast a coming movement from the West to the South. "With free government land grants gone," it says, "the cheapest good land in the United States is in the South. An Iowa farmer can sell his place for a hundred dollars an acre and for ten an acre buy its duplicate in any one of half a dozen Southern States. South Carolina has raised more corn to the acre than Iowa, or any other of the 'corn-belt' States. There are those who predict that the census of 1910 will show a net decrease in the population of at least one Western farming States; and that 1920 will find that others have ceased to grow. The middle West's younger generation will have gone where their fathers went before them—to the country with the cheapest land." The South is the land of promise. No other section is so rich in land and forest, in waterpower and minerals and no section of the country is blessed with the climate of the South. The world is fast coming into a knowledge of these facts and we believe that this section is now on the eve of the greatest development the country has ever known. Evidences are not lacking that the tide is already turning this way.—Charlotte Chronicle.

lines as other insurance companies of the state.

This movement is under the auspices of the North Carolina State Firemen's association, and while outside holdings of stock will be allowed, it is the intention to have the majority of the stock scattered in small blocks among the active firemen; though the management of the company will be in the hands of its own stockholders just as any other corporation.

North Carolina has a number of "home" companies, as they are called, and we have yet to hear of one which was conservatively and wisely managed that has not made good.

We see no reason why our firemen should not organize and conduct a successful business along this line, and certainly everyone in the state must hope that they will, for no class of citizens deserve more at the hands of the general public than the volunteer firemen.—Greensboro News.

MUSHROOM POISONING.

The Way It Acts and How It Should Be Treated.

When one considers the frightful consequences of gathering and eating poisonous mushrooms in mistake for the edible variety it is little short of marvelous that one without knowledge should dare go into the fields and woods and pick and eat any of the fungi growing there.

If one is thoroughly familiar with a particular variety of edible mushroom and can distinguish it at sight from all others, however similar in color and form, it is safe to eat that particular variety, but one must beware of other kinds that resemble it, for, however slight the difference in appearance, one may be edible and the other poisonous. There is no absolute rule for distinguishing the edible from the poisonous kinds, and it is better, therefore, to give no general rules, but to follow only one. Suspect every mushroom which you do not know positively to be edible. To this rule perhaps may be added a second: Learn to distinguish the white spored agarics and avoid them all, for, although there is an edible species, it requires an expert to tell it, and the poison of another species is deadly, and there is no known antidote for it.

The chief poisons in mushrooms are two in number--muscarin and phallin. The first of these produces symptoms resembling those of alcoholic intoxication, followed by convulsions or paralysis, collapse and death from heart failure. These symptoms come on soon after the mushrooms have been eaten.

In poisoning by phallin the symptoms do not appear until several hours after the meal. They resemble cholera, beginning with severe abdominal pain, soon followed by vomiting, purging and collapse.

In all cases of mushroom poisoning, vomiting should be induced as soon as possible, and a large dose of castor oil may be given to hasten the elimination of any as yet unabsorbed portions of the mushroom.

Stimulants are needed to support the heart, and milk containing an abundance of magnesia or bicarbonate of sodium may be given.

Injections of a salt solution into the veins and--in case of muscarin poisoning--hypodermic injection of atropin are often employed by physicians with benefit.--Youth's Companion.

Our System of Notation.

Some system of notation has been used since time out of memory. The first record we have of it is of figures written with a stick on a flat surface covered with sand. Before that all calculations were made with pebbles, beans and the like. Even now the Chinese do their calculating with little stones or beads strung on wires, in a frame. The Romans first used vertical lines--I, II, III, etc.--to express numbers. The Arabic figures, which we commonly use at the present time, are of much earlier date. The Arabic system is chiefly valuable on account of the great convenience it affords by giving a figure a value according to the place it occupies in the line. By this system the most enormous sums can be expressed by the ten little characters which form the numerical alphabet.
