Happenings of Interest in North Carolina
LaGrange, N. C., Jan. 11.—Preston Emerson, a young man of this county, son of Jeff Emerson, was fatally injured while coupling cars on the Hines lumber road Saturday and died Sunday. The funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon by D. H. Petree.
Raleigh, Jan. 10.—Because North Carolina's electric chair is not completed Walter Morrison, sentenced to death for the criminal assault and murder of an Indian woman, was today granted a temporary respite from death for the fifth time. Parts of the chair are missing. Morrison cannot be legally executed until they are found.
An alligator was killed yesterday afternoon by Mr. J. L. Bolton, while on a hunting trip in Smith's creek. The gator was seven feet long and Mr. Bolton had to shoot him several times to kill him. He was accompanied on the trip by Mr. T. C. Rhodes and they killed 25 robbers. Mr. Bolton has placed the alligator on exhibition at his store, corner of Fourth and Bladen streets.—Wilmington Star.

Increased cost of living is getting its share of writing about, but the cost hangs on all the same.

"Uncle Joe" intimates that what the insurgents need is a spanking, which he proposes to administer to bring them back to his way of thinking.

Superintendent J. J. Laughinghouse says the net profits of the State prison this year will reach fully \$75,000. For the past eight years the profits have been an average of \$40,000.

Just suppose the congressional investigation into the increased cost of living should place the responsibility therefor on the tariff. You can imagine there would be a crowd of them taking water and eating crow.

The Asheville Citizen says the Republicans will nominate Richmond Pearson for governor in the next campaign. There will likely be two Buncombe men running against each other for governor, as the Democrats will be apt to nominate Locke Craig.
