FROM SKINNER TO SEAWELL.

Opinion That Prevails in Washington—Appointment in a Few Days.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 12.—Herbert F. Seawell, who was the choice of the State Republican organization for the Eastern North Carolina district judgeship to succeed the late Judge Purnell, is picked here to succeed District Attorney Harry Skinner. Mr. Seawell was not originally a candidate for the judgeship, and at one time he wrote a letter to Harry Skinner advocating his selection as Judge Purnell's successor. In this letter, which became a matter of record in the department of justice, Mr. Seawell expressed an ambition to receive appointment as district attorney to succeed Mr. Skinner in the event of his elevation to the Federal bench. The Moore county man was unwillingly forced into the judgeship fight, while his real ambition was to become the district attorney in the East. It is to be presumed that Mr. Seawell has lost none of his ambition to become the prosecuting officer in the eastern half of the state, and those who know of his close relations with National Committeeman Duncan are very much of the opinion that he will be named as Mr. Skinner's successor. It is expected that an appointment will be announced from the White House in the next few days, as Mr. Skinner's term expires on February 1st.—T. J. Pence in Raleigh News and Observer.

As Colonel Skinner is in Raleigh looking after the duties of his office, The Reflector reporter could not see him to get an expression as to the foregoing nor to ascertain if there is any color to the Washington rumor. If the facts are as Mr. Pence has stated and Colonel Skinner is to give way to Mr. Seawell, the government is going to dispense with the services of a very able district attorney for one far from being his equal. It would be a step that the president and department of justice should consider well before taking. The Reflector hopes there is nothing in the rumor.

Barlow & Wilson Minstrels.

This minstrel company gave a performance in Masonic opera house Wednesday night, to a fair sized audience. Unfortunately a rumor came just ahead of the show from a neighboring town that it was on the bum order, and naturally this cut down the attendance. There were one or two soloists who had better been left out of the program, as they had no voices at all and sang with no life.

Good Roads Meeting in Raleigh.

There will be held in Raleigh on Thursday, Jan. 27th, a good roads meeting which will take up the discussion of State aid to the counties in the construction of good roads, and some plan be agreed upon which the convention will consider of greatest benefit to North Carolina. R. W. King, O. L. Joyner and D. J. Whichard have been appointed to represent this section in that convention.

STATE NEWS.

Happenings of Interest in North Carolina

New Bern, Jan. 11.—The Rev. J. W. Ham, pastor of the Tabernacle Baptist church for the past three years, announced to his congregation on Sunday that he had been called to become assistant pastor of the Tabernacle Baptist church in Atlanta, Ga., of which the Rev. L. G. Broughton is pastor. So far he has made no announcement of what he will do.

Record Mortgage Filed.

Fayetteville, Jan. 11.—James C. MacRae, while in this city Saturday, as a special attorney of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company, recorded with the register of deeds of Curberland county what is probably the biggest mortgage ever recorded in the South. It is a unified 50-year 4 per cent mortgage for \$200,000,000, given by the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company to the United States Trust Company of New York.

This enormous sum will be used by the Coast Line in retiring old bonds, double-tracking, and other improvements.

This transaction furnishes to the uninitiated some idea of the expenses connected with the operation of a railroad. The cost of recording the mortgage here was about \$35. As the railroad company is required to register a paper of this kind in every county in which its line or any branch thereof operates, it is evident that the expense of recording this deed will alone amount to a small fortune.

The Atlantic Coast Line operates in twenty seven counties in North Carolina. In addition it has thousands of miles in Virginia, South Carolina, Georgia, and Florida.

Trade Report.

Richmond, Va., Jan. 13. Bradstreet's Saturday will say for Richmond and vicinity: Trade conditions generally have a favorable aspect and those engaged in all lines are entering upon the new year with anticipation of active trading and a profit making year. The usual quietude of inventory season prevails in mercantile lines and houses that have sent their travelers out report ordering of satisfactory volume. The high prices of provision of all kinds continue an important factor in the trade. Shoe sales are up to the average. Drugs are active. Naval stores are firm at recent prevailing prices. The high price of cotton continues to stimulate trade in the south. Dry weather has retarded the marketing of loose tobacco, however, prices are satisfactory for all offerings. Retail trade is quiet following the holiday rush. Collections generally are good.

One Remedy Suggested.

North Carolina should be full of flourishing flour mills. Why is that industry hampered and forbidden to grow? The Charlotte Observer gives the answer in the following:

"Flour can be shipped from Ohio to Lynchburg, Richmond and all the way to Norfolk for 12½ cents a hundred weight; the movement it crosses the North Carolina line the rate leaps to 42½ cents. Western flour can be shipped to Liverpool or Hamburg fifty cents a barrel cheaper than to North Carolina. The rates on grain are similar."

This discrimination hurts business, prevents city expansion, but also operates against the desirable increase in the wheat acreage. If the Interstate Commerce Commission denies relief why does not the State Commission apply the same rate per mile in the State that the railroads have fixed on their interstate shipments?—Raleigh News & Observer.

Eclipses During 1910.

There will be four eclipses during 1910—two of the sun and two of the moon. These are:

An eclipse of the sun, May 9th, not visible in the United States, but visible as a total eclipse in Tasmania and Australia.

A total eclipse of the moon, May 23rd, 24th. Visible in the United States. Moon enters shadow on the 23rd at 10:46 p. m. and leaves shadow on the 24th at 2:22 a. m.

Eclipse of the sun, November 1st. Not visible in the United States, but visible in Siberia, Japan and Korea.

A total eclipse of the moon, November 16th. Visible in the United States. Moon enters shadow at 5:44 p. m., and leaves shadow at 8:58 p. m.

Probably the greatest thing of the year, from an astronomical point of view, is the reappearance of Halley's comet. It will be at its greatest brilliancy about June 9th, when it passes near Pollux in Gemini and will be an interesting celestial object as an evening star. By some Halley's comet is believed to have been the "Star of Bethlehem," coincident with the birth of Christ, and which makes its reappearance about every seventy-five years.

Killed by Log Train.

Mr. Preston Emerson, the 27-year old son of Mr. Jeff Emerson, of InSTITUTE, met with a horrible accident Saturday afternoon at Sugg's Siding which resulted in his death Sunday afternoon. In coupling cars his head was crushed between the ends of two projecting logs and in falling his foot was cut off. He was doing somebody else's work at the time of his accident. It was nearly quitting time and the men were hurrying to get through to leave the woods near Sugg's Siding, and the colored man, whose duty it was to couple the cars requested Mr. Emerson to do the work and let him go to the shack to dress. Mr. Emerson stepped between the cars, as is the custom when making a coupling, but did not notice the two projecting logs. When the cars came together, his head was caught and crushed. He fell and the moving cars crushed a foot. Dr. Harper was immediately summoned and went to his relief but could do no good. He was taken to the hospital in Kinston, where he died Sunday without ever having regained consciousness.—Snow Hill Standard Enconic.
