## STATE NEWS.

### Happenings of Interest in North Carolina

Elizabeth City, Jan. 11.—By the explosion of a lamp which fell from the shelf where it was standing to the stove below, two sisters, Lessie and Bessie Westcott, of Manteo, N. C., daughters of the late Capt. Jos. Westcott, probably were fatally burned and their home is in ashes. They were alone in the house when the accident happened early yesterday morning. Three brothers live with them, but they were absent at the time of the accident. No hope whatever is entertained for the recovery of Miss Lessie, who is 18 years of age, while her sister, if she escapes with her life, will be permanently disfigured.

Washington, N. C., Jan. 13.—News was brought to this city this morning of a sad and horrible accident that occurred at the home of Mr. A. S. Cratch, about five miles from this city on the Bath road, in which his two year child, a girl, was burned to death. It seems that the mother was called out of the house for a few minutes and left two children, one three and the other two years old, alone. When she returned she found a broom on fire and the clothing of the youngest child in flames and the child lying on the floor unconscious, horribly burned all over the face and body. She immediately extinguished the flames and called her husband from the barn, but when he arrived there were only slight signs of life, and the child died in a short while.

There are 312 cotton, woolen and silk mills in North Carolina. These mills employ 55,128 people. Gaston county leads with 48 cotton mills and Mecklenburg comes next.

Rev. J. A. Sullivan, pastor of the First Baptist Church, left this afternoon for Ayden, N. C., where he goes to assist in the ordination of deacons for the Baptist church in that town. Mr. Sullivan will deliver the sermon. He will return to the city tomorrow.—Washington News.

Old age is always to be revered, but extreme age becomes a benediction to the relatives and friends permitted to witness it. Yesterday, January 12, 1910, Miss Mary Marcia Blount Rodman, probably the oldest native citizen of Beaufort county, was "at home" from 3 to 5 o'clock in the afternoon, receiving the good wishes of a host of friends and relatives on the ninety-first anniversary of her natal day. Handsome refreshments were served. Ninety-one candles blazed upon the table.—Washington News.

### Exposition Buildings Burned.

Norfolk, Va., Jan. 12.—Three persons, two of them children, were burned to death in a fire which early today destroyed several of the smaller buildings on the Jamestown exposition grounds. The fire started in the Baltimore city building, which was occupied by H. T. Halstead, of Baltimore, as a residence. The occupants were asleep when the fire began. Neva and Walter Halstead were suffocated and burned before they could be gotten out and Leon E. Miles, who was asleep also in an upper room, was not awakened until the fire had gained such headway as to cut off his escape. The three bodies were almost cremated. Miles was from Warren, N. C.

## TORRENS TITLE SYSTEM.

### Chairman R. R. Cotten Finds Increasing Interest Shown.

Mr. R. R. Cotten, chairman of the committee appointed by the governor by the direction of the last legislature to investigate the Torrens system of registering land titles, is in Raleigh and reports that interest in the subject is increasing remarkably fast. The North Carolina Farmers' Union has endorsed the Torrens plan; the South Carolina legislature will consider it, and the constitutionality of the New York law has just been upheld by the courts.

Mr. Cotten recently made a visit to Massachusetts investigating the Massachusetts law and had conferences with the Massachusetts State officers and Judge Davis, of the Massachusetts land court. Judge Davis told Mr. Cotten that \$34,000,000 worth of property had been registered in his court in the last few years, and of the guarantee fund of \$250,000, not one cent has ever been called for on account of granting a defective title.

"The real estate men of the State are vitally interested in the Torrens law because of the tremendous and unnecessary expense of the present system," Mr. Cotten says, "and the farmers of the State are getting thoroughly aroused because of the ease and cheapness with which their lands could then be used as collateral in getting loans. The banks of the State are interested for the same reason, and Mr. Henry E. Litchford, of Raleigh, has just prepared a notable article setting forth the advantages of the system from the bankers' standpoint. It is perhaps unnecessary to repeat that the Torrens system amounts simply to this: With us every time a piece of real estate is transferred, a lawyer must be paid to investigate the title—he going to the court house and searching through musty records of wills and deeds for generations back, and every time the land changes hands the same dreary, expensive and increasingly difficult task must be repeated; the same identical work repeated time after time to no good purpose whatever. By the Torrens system the State once for all makes a thorough investigation of title, registers it in prescribed fashion, and guarantees the title ever thereafter against the world. The applicant is taxed one-tenth of one percent. tax value of the property as an assurance fund to protect the State against any future adverse claimant.—Raleigh News and Observer.

### N. & S. CASE POSTPONED.

#### Seems to Be Merit in Contention of Interveners.

Federal Judge Edmund Waddill, Jr., will not give a decision until probably early next week in the matter of—the petition of the Van Dyke, Zell Syndicate, of Philadelphia, which seeks to intervene in the Norfolk & Southern railway receivership litigation and stop delivery of the Norfolk & Southern properties and franchises under the \$8,500,000 foreclosure sale here December 7th.

The court had intended giving a decision at this time, but Thomas L. Chadbourne, of Norfolk, appearing with Edward R. Baird, Jr., of Norfolk, for the Norfolk and Southern re-organization committee, requested time in which to file a brief in resistance of the petition and to give Mr. Chadbourne this opportunity Judge Waddill deferred decision in the case.

It is not unlikely that with the filing of the additional brief by Mr. Chadbourne that counsel for the Van Dyke-Zell Syndicate will also amplify their arguments in this matter with a written brief.

The fact that Thomas L. Chadbourne, who is said to have treated very lightly the Van Dyke-Zell petition, now seeks to file a brief, is taken by some to mean that the Norfolk & Southern re-organization is realizing the earnestness of the claims of the Philadelphians and that the latter have a case which it may be very difficult for the court to decline to investigate, especially when the petitioners are without remedy in any other tribunal.—Norfolk Ledger Dispatch.

The Reflector believes that an investment in Greenville real estate will be a good one. Values steadily increase here, and you never hear of any property declining.

Now come the manufacturers of shoes who say that the retail price of our foot gear must advance 10 to 12 per cent. this year. Never mind, summer is coming after a while and we can go bare-footed.

A factory at Worcester, Mass., which makes most of the valentines used in this country, was destroyed by fire Wednesday night, and the coming fourteenth of February will be practically valentineless.

Guilford county is a notable place for law suits. Two men up there had a suit over the carcass of a dead cow, and one got judgment against the other for \$12, the carcass being deemed worth that much as hog feed.

The press dispatches say that some of the old North Carolina bonds have been presented to Rhode Island so that state may bring suit for their recovery. Perhaps Rhode Island is prompted to this step from the fact that a few years ago North Dakota took similar action against North Carolina and got some of our money.

**Don't Do it Any More.**

At this season of the year a number of tenants feel it their bounden duty to move from the farm on which they "cropped" last year and to another place where they expect to "crop" this year, and probably move the next, unless the good Lord shall send them a bounteous crop and good prices.

This moving business among tenants should cease, and we trust every tenant who has not already made up his mind to do so, will determine never to move again, but stay right there and study the soil, seek to improve it and feel that he is a partner with the landlord in securing the greatest yield possible from the farm.

And now, Mr. Landlord, we want you to encourage the tenant by seeing to it that he plants sufficient land in corn, so that the next year your tenant will have ample to furnish him all the bread he needs without going to the store after it, and we want you both to raise meat on shares and arrange pastures on the place so that the tenant may

put up sufficient meat to run him another year.

With his meat and corn the tenant will require only half as much money to run him, and if there is a short crop, both landlord and tenant will be better off, since the tenant will have his living in his crib and smoke-house and the landlord will have his money in his pocket.

Now, let's everybody, both tenant and landlord, go to work to improve the land and make it more productive.

It's all foolishness for the tenant to feel the landlord wants him to improve the land so he can get another.

Every landlord wants a good tenant unless he is a fool, and a fool and his land soon parts. It is reasonable to suppose a landlord desires a tenant of intelligence and industry in order that he may get some return from his property. — Wilson Times.
