## HAPPENINGS WITHIN THE OLD NORTH STATE GATHERED FROM OUR EXCHANGES TODAY

Newspaper Items of Interest Condensed for  
Busy Readers.

Hendersonville, Feb. 14.—One thousand dollars has been appropriated by the town council to advertise the town. Committees appointed for the purpose have already awarded contracts for pamphlets on climatic advantages, circular letters on industrial opportunities and illustrated booklets. It is also proposed to have the mayor or some other suitable citizen visit southern cities to personally tell of the many advantages Hendersonville has to offer.

According to the annual report of President Venable, the State University has 820 students. While the State has only given the University two buildings in 115 years, costing \$75,000, there are now 24 buildings, which with equipment, are valued at \$800,000.

Goldsboro, N. C., Feb. 14.—A most distressing accident occurred here yesterday afternoon when Mrs. J. P. Cole was burned to death and her daughter, in trying to save her, was also severely burned. Mrs. Cole was an invalid and was in her room alone. The room caught fire from a wood box and before the daughter of Mrs. Cole heard her screams she was burned beyond all hope. Mrs. Cole's daughter's clothing caught fire, and if her husband had not arrived and given timely aid she, too, would have been burned to death.

Statesville, Feb. 14.—Mr. Campbell Cloutz and Miss Hattie McCall, both about 16 years of age, went to Taylorsville Friday morning and procured license and were married. There was objection to the marriage on account of their ages and this is the plan adopted by them.

Philadelphia, Feb. 14.—Finding a small cave, just large enough to hold him, near the Garfield statue, below Girard avenue bridge in Fairmont Park, William Graham Adison, a young bank clerk of Charlotte, N. C., decided to make it his grave. Making careful preparations he crawled into it and inhaled the fumes of chloroform until he died. The body was found yesterday afternoon.

Salisbury, Feb. 14.—On account of the appearance of smallpox among the prisoners in the Rowan county jail the spring term of Superior court for this county will not hold its usual session here this week. Judge Crawford Biggs, who was to convene the court tomorrow, has granted a request of the Salisbury Bar Association. It is not thought that there will be any new cases besides the two convicts who are now confined in the jail.

Charlotte, Feb. 14.—The four firms who were either burned out or greatly inconvenienced as a result of the Sunday morning blaze here, which destroyed about \$75,000 worth of property, today secured new quarters or made arrangements for the resumption of business without serious loss. Toomey Heating and Plumbing Company, and J. A. Clinard, wholesale grocers, and a branch of the Piedmont Clothing Company, were totally destroyed by fire, saving nothing. The first two firms have secured new quarters and the last named will fill its contracts as its other

## WONDERS OF THE FINSEN RAY.

It Will Cure a Birthmark or Heal Smallpox.

It was only within recent years that Dr. Niel Finsen, an instructor in the University of Copenhagen, so great an invalid that he could work but intermittently, started to make a scientific study of the phenomena of light-rays.

Finsen's first experiments proved that the irritant power of blue and violet so called actinic rays made them thoroughly germicidal, and Dr. Finsen immediately took advantage of the important discovery, says The Designer for March. The result is a Finsen-ray machine which concentrates the violet rays and completely cures lupus, a dreaded scourge which has thrived among European children for many centuries.

Before the Finsen ray, the principal treatment of lupus was by the knife, and that meant, at the very least, frightful disfigurement. Curing, cauterizing with a hot iron, and with acids or arsenic were also used.

A little girl was brought recently to the London City Hospital with one cheek completely riddled with the disease. A long course of continuous exposure to the violet rays of the Finsen machine healed the diseased cheek so thoroughly that only a tiny pink scar one-eighth of an inch in length remained.

The Finsen ray removes a birthmark, leaving instead a white scar which speedily disappears; it removes as easily moles, warts and pimples; it has been tried with marked success in the relief or cure of erysipelas and other similar face diseases.

Following his experiments with the violet rays Finsen found that those colors which his experiments eliminated, the red rays, would if concentrated heal the pustules of smallpox, and if begun early enough almost completely prevent disfigurement.

## COMPLAINTS OF BURNING QUALITY OF TOBACCO

RAISED IN EASTERN NORTH CAROLINA

Congressman Small Gets Government Bureau to Investigate Cause.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 12, Editor Reflector:

Recently Messrs. Dibrell Brothers, of Danville, Va., tobacco dealers, and also having offices at Kinston and Wilson, wrote me commenting upon the defective burning qualities of our bright tobacco grown in Eastern North Carolina, and stating that the demand for this tobacco was being affected by this condition.

I laid the matter before the Bureau of Plant Industry, of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and asked for a report. The reply of the bureau with the preliminary report attached, appears to me to discuss a matter of vital interest to Eastern North Carolina, and I, therefore, append the same for publication.

Dear Sir:

I beg to acknowledge receipt of your favor of the 1st inst., enclosing a communication from Messrs. Dibrell Brothers, of Danville, Virginia, with reference to defective burning qualities noted in the bright tobacco grown in Eastern North Carolina.

This matter was referred to our tobacco division, and I enclose herewith copy of a preliminary report relating to the probable causes of this trouble. As indicated in this report, our experiments have not progressed far enough as yet to warrant any positive statement in the matter, but we hope to secure more complete data along these lines in the next year or two. We take pleasure in enclosing copy of a pamphlet giving the results of our investigations on the fundamental relationship of the composition of the leaf to the burning qualities of tobacco which may prove of interest in this connection. It is our intention to follow up this matter as far as possible in our work in Eastern North Carolina.

Following is the preliminary report concerning the burning qualities of the Bright Tobacco of Eastern North Carolina.

Investigations were begun last year in a preliminary way in the so-called new tobacco belt of Eastern North Carolina, with headquarters at Greenville, Pitt county, with special reference to the study of the varieties of tobacco best adapted to this section, the fertilizer requirements of the soils for maintaining and increasing their productivity and improving the quality of tobacco, and the best system of crop rotation for these tobacco lands. The work has not progressed far enough as yet to afford definite conclusions regarding these important points, but it is planned to push the work as vigorously as possible, and we hope in the near future to secure more complete data along these lines.

As regards the relatively poor burning quality of the tobacco produced in this section, as noted in the letter of Messrs. Dibrell Brothers, I may say, in the first place, that our extensive labora-

tory studies of the relationship of the composition of tobacco to its burning qualities have indicated very clearly that potassium is the essential element for imparting fire-holding capacity to tobacco as pointed out in bulletin 105 of this bureau, a copy of which is attached. It is further pointed out that the color of the ash is controlled largely by the quantity of lime contained in the leaf. Hence a satisfactory fire holding capacity combined with the proper color and texture of ash is associated with the proper balance between the content of potash and lime. These studies did not have special reference to the North Carolina tobaccos, but doubtless these general conclusions would apply to the conditions existing there. The light soils of Eastern North Carolina are more likely to be markedly deficient in potash than are the heavier soils of the interior portions of the State. Again, it is very generally believed that chlorine is injurious to the burning qualities of tobacco, and our investigations indicate that magnesium salts also are injurious in this respect. It may be, therefore, that the use of kaint as a source of potash, which is rather a general practice in that section, may have an injurious effect on the burning qualities of tobacco. We are carrying on experiments with fertilizers in Pitt county covering a number of plats, to which are applied different fertilizers and in varying quantities, and we hope to get some valuable information on this subject by a careful comparison of the tobacco obtained from the different plats. In the absence of more complete information, we would recommend the use of high grade sulphate as a source of potash on these soils for improving the burning qualities of the tobacco, and applications of lime would also prove beneficial in this respect in most cases. Excessive amounts of nitrogenous fertilizers also tend to give poor burning qualities, particularly when not well balanced with the necessary amounts of potash and lime.

In the course of our further experiments in this section, we are hopeful of getting more complete information in the matter.

## WILSON TIMES PLANT DESTROYED BY FIRE

LOSS ABOUT \$10,000 ABOVE INSURANCE

Papers Will be Issued Without Interruption—Origin of Fire Unknown

Wilson, Feb. 15.—The P. D. Gold Publishing company's plant was destroyed about midnight last night. The building is a total wreck, and nothing was saved except one or two desks. The fire caught from gasoline used in the linotype room. When discovered the flames had reached such a stage that it was impossible to save anything. There was an immense stock of paper on hand.

The P. D. Gold Publishing company publishes The Daily Times, the Weekly Times and Zion's Landmark, a semi-monthly publication, besides operating a large job plant.

The property was covered by insurance.

The Reflector called up Editor Gold over the phone this morning to ascertain further particulars of the fire, and learned that the cause was not known and that it did not start from gas as stated in the foregoing dispatch, as all work in the office had been stopped several hours before the fire occurred. Mr. Gold says that the destruction of the plant entails a loss of about \$10,000 above insurance. While badly handicapped, immediate negotiations were started to get another equipment and continue the publications without interruption. We sympathize with the Messrs. Gold in their misfortune, and hope they may soon be newly equipped and in full operation again.
