The Republican state committee of West Virginia, has decided in favor of statewide primary, with the state as a unit, for 1912. The decision was reached only after a prolonged fight by a number of prominent Republican leaders, who favored the so-called district plan.

United States Senator William A. Smith, of Michigan claims the unique distinction of being the only member of congress whose mother is a qualified voter. Mrs. Smith, who is 76 years old, is resident of Santa Anna, Cal., and has registered to vote at the next election there.

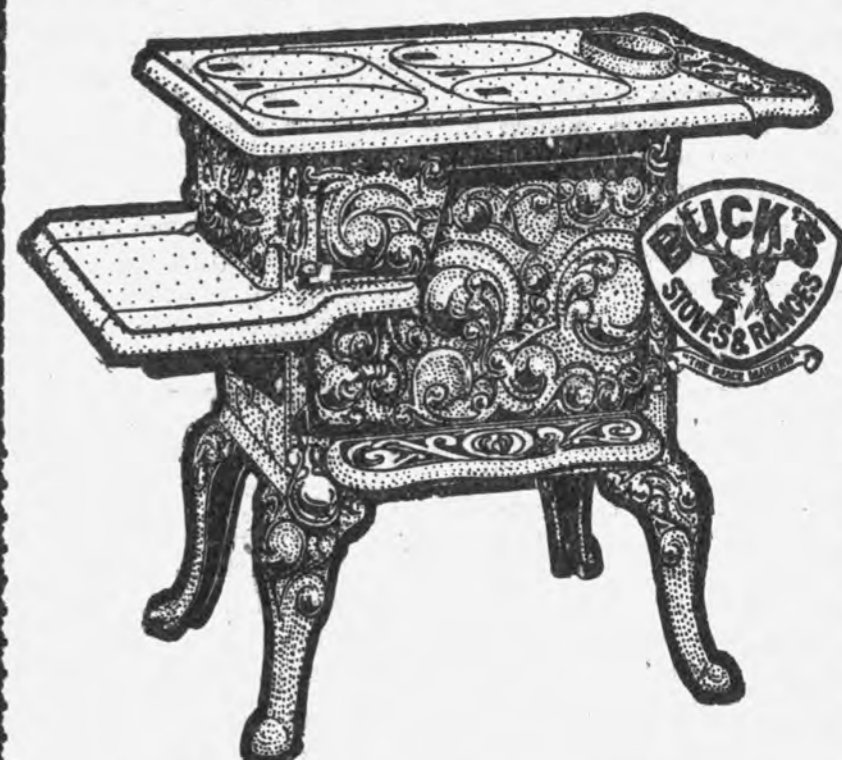

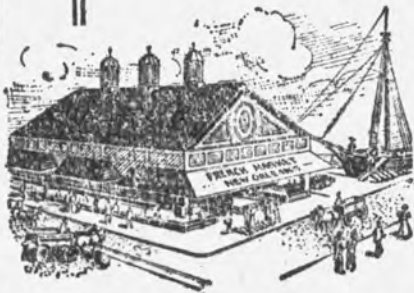
