ALDERMEN MEET.

Proposition to Lease Town Commons Fronting River.

The board of aldermen met in regular monthly session Thursday night, with the mayor and six members of the board present.

The committee reported that a horse and rubber boots and coats had been purchased for the use of the fire department. It was also recommended that two sleeping rooms for firemen be provided in the city hall, and the committee was instructed to fix the rooms as early as possible.

The sanding committee had no reports.

The committee to whom was referred the proposition of J. Benjamin Higgs to lease the town commons fronting on the river, for a term of ninety years, made the following report which was adopted:

1. That the town of Greenville grant to any person, persons, firm or corporation doing an interstate transportation business the privilege of using a portion of said property, or the whole thereof, if necessary, free of charge, for the purpose of constructing a wharf, building warehouses, and erecting any other structure of whatever nature necessary for the proper conduct of said business.

2. That said person, persons, company or corporation doing said business, shall keep and maintain, yearly, a regular and continuous water transportation service, said service not to be interrupted or delayed except for natural causes, such as insufficient water in Tar river any other unavoidable accident.

3. That said person, persons, firm or corporation shall transport to and from the town of Greenville all kinds of commodities carried by railroads and other public carriers.

4. That the privilege granted shall be co-extensive with regular, continuous and adequate transportation service, except as hereinafter stated.

5. That for insufficient or inadequate service the privilege granted shall be forfeited, and the right denied said person, persons, firm or corporation the further use of said property, upon the town through its mayor giving three months notice of the withdrawal of said privilege.

D. D. Overton was elected building inspector. The water and light commission was instructed to put 6-inch pipe on Ninth street from Evans street to Co-tanch street at the expense of the town.

Maude Owens was granted license to run a restaurant in the Darden building on Dickinson avenue.

A committee was appointed to collect for the paving on Fourth street. The officers made their reports for the past month.

Bills as approved by the finance committee were ordered paid.

The meeting took a recess until Tuesday night, 6th.
