No Surprises in National, State, or County Returns. Small's Majority in First District Will Exceed 13,000.

Bishop Weller.
Rt. Rev. Reginald Heber Weller, who recently succeeded the late Bishop Grafton as head of the Episcopal diocese of Fond du Lac, was born in Jefferson City, Mo., Nov. 6, 1857. He was christened Reginald Heber Weller after his father, who in turn had been named after the famous Bishop Heber. Reginald Weller entered an academy at Jacksonville, Fla., in 1866 and after completing his studies there he matriculated at the University of the South, where he obtained his classical degree in 1877. He studied for the church at Nashkotoh Theological Seminary and was ordained in 1884. After filling rectorships in several cities of Wisconsin he was chosen coadjutor bishop of Fond du Lac in 1900 and succeeded to the bishopric upon the death of Bishop Grafton some months ago.

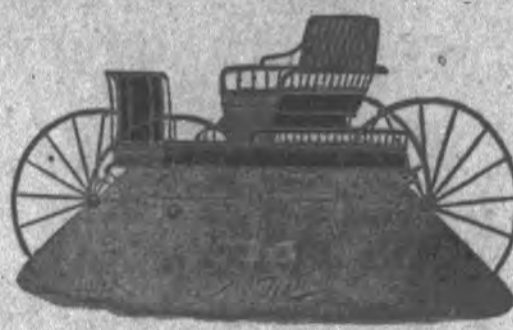

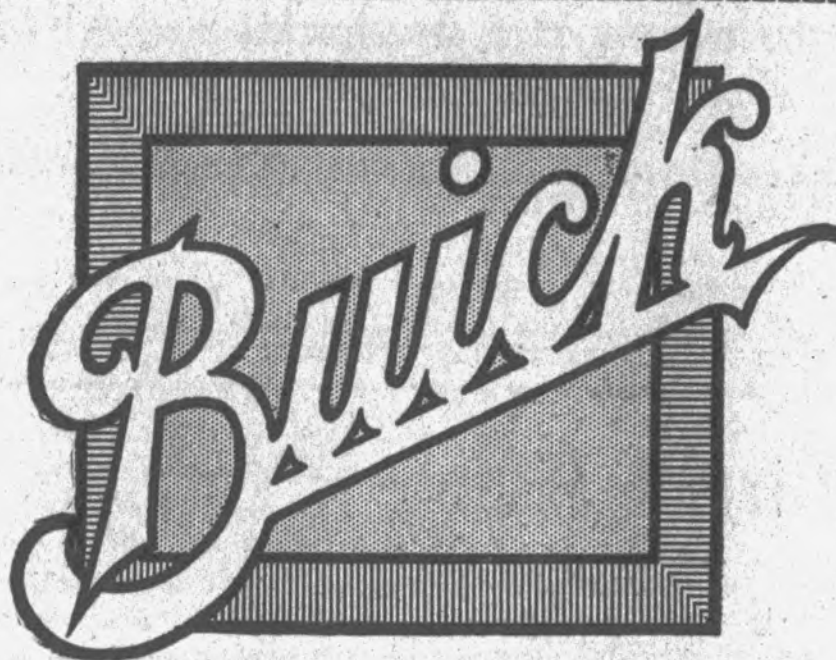

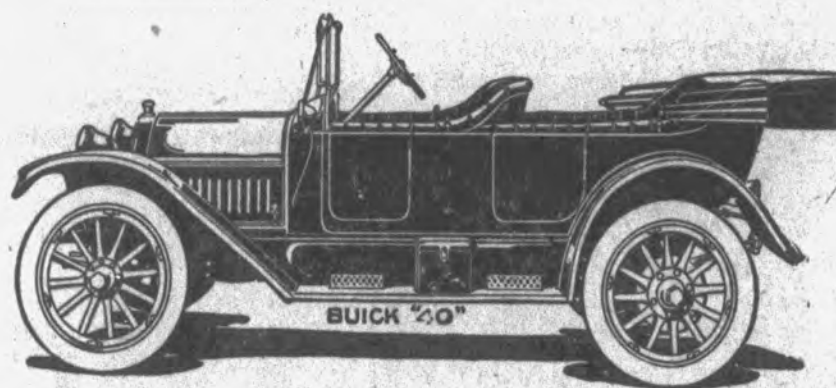
