



right to be, too, for the facts set forth by the candidate for the vice-presidency are upon the same high plane as those presented by Governor Cox in his notification address recently and give the American people something to think about before the campaign really opens in earnest. Both candidates have shown the majority of people that they are for the platform in its every phase, and mean to support its principles in a way that will certainly mean ultimate success for the highest ambitions of the party. It is well that two such prominent figures should appreciate one another's efforts as they do for the time will come probably when they will feel the need of personal sympathy and advice. The friendliness of the candidates is a matter of great consideration and gives every indication of splendid service during their administration.

It matters not which of the two states may ratify suffrage first it may be said candidly of each that they did their best, and deserve equal amount of credit for the final success attending the women's endeavors. Suffrage has been recognized virtually in every country of the world where women enjoy the same liberties as those in America, and when America grants the same prerogative it may be placed upon the same plane with the countries which have advanced so much along this line of public interest.

Thirty-five states have already ratified. Thirty-six are necessary for the amendment to be recognized, so if only one of the two states now being considered ratify, women then will have achieved the greatest privilege which the American people could grant them. The day of the ambitious woman is here, and everything which she achieves in the political field will be well deserved and to the credit of the country she serves.

Now that express company employees have been granted a desired raise it is to be supposed that the country will experience a short period of rest from the annoying disputes arising from desired increases. The labor situation is one of more than ordinary consideration in every section, and deserves even greater attention than has been given it. The laboring class has become so inordinate it no longer can be satisfied, and only adversity in its actual seriousness will have a tendency of relieving the situation.

Governor Cox apparently is greatly pleased with the principles enunciated in the acceptance address of Franklin D. Roosevelt delivered at his notification ceremonies Monday. And he has

The acceptance address of Franklin D. Roosevelt must have been too much for Senator Harding, for so far he has failed completely in presenting the public with his criticisms. Certainly he can't say any more than was expressed regarding that of Governor Cox, but since the public gives his criticism little consideration it is possible now, mind you, that he has really concluded that his efforts are futile. And probably such a conclusion would be correct.

Governor Bickert, so we are told, has a carefully prepared speech to present to the legislature of the state in the interest of woman suffrage, and if this is true it is quite probable the legislature will be more disposed than every to recognize the right of state women to vote. Governor Bickert up until the present time has remained rather quiet regarding the issue, and his position, therefore, has been a source of uncertainty to those not so well acquainted with his way of thinking. His definite stand is certainly more appreciable than silence and will give him a decidedly greater pull with the ladies if nothing more.

Republican papers of the country are harping over the fact that Governor Cox failed to make himself perfectly clear concerning the League of Nations in his acceptance address several days ago, asserting that one may look in vain for some definite declaration with out receiving the slightest intelligence of his position on the question. These papers, whoever, unfortunately missed one of the most significant parts of the governor's address, for he declared "that if elected his first effort will be for the ratification of the League as it exists." This single sentence is plain enough for even the most dense person in the world, and shows conclusively that such papers really fear the directness of the candidate's statements and would avoid them by misinterpretation. Governor Cox expressed himself plainly and emphatically throughout his entire speech. And he "straddled the platform," too as some like to charge, but in doing so he left nothing unsaid or unexpressed that would in any way detract from the ambitious program which the Democratic party has inaugurated for the campaign. The Democrats have a candidate whom they are proud of and if critics would devote more time to careful scrutiny of their own candidate the difference would probably cause them to refrain from further comment.

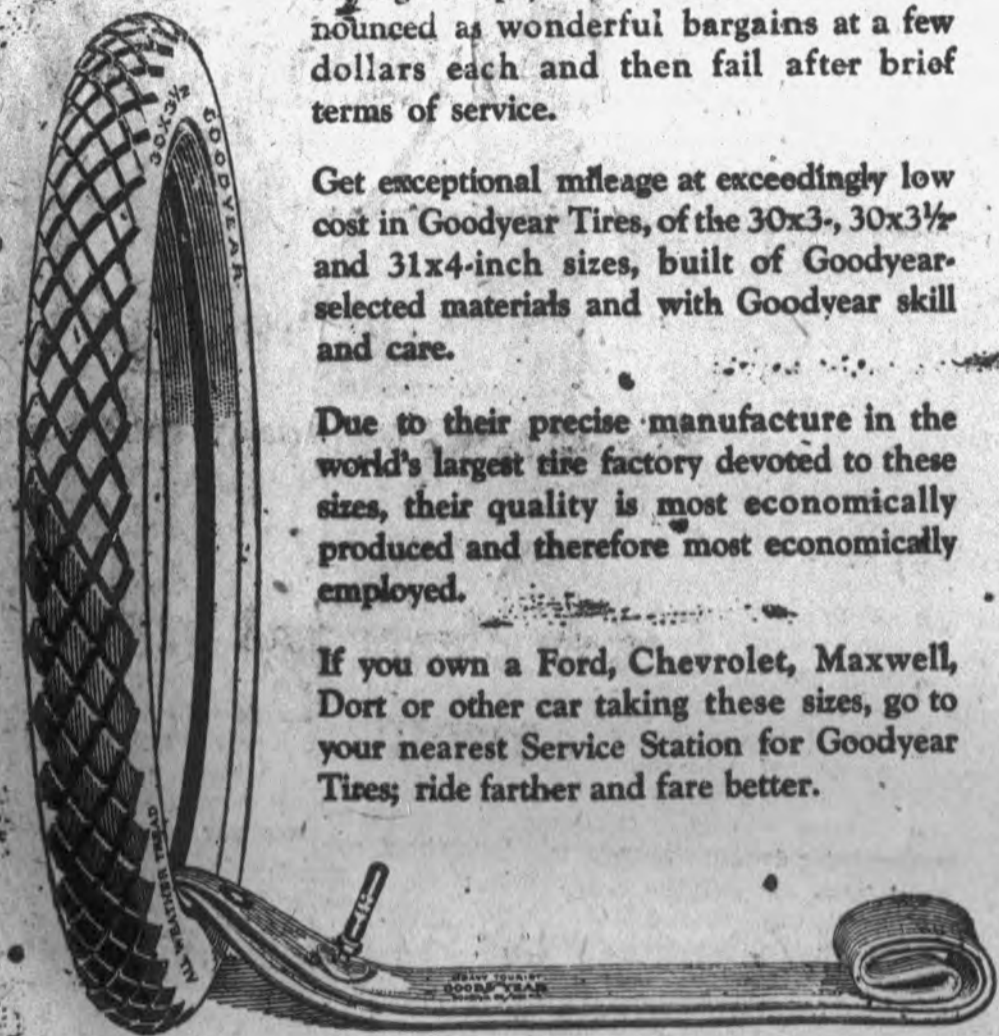

## GREENVILLE PLAYS IN NINE INNING TIE WITH WASHINGTON

Clubs Battle for Nine Innings With  
out Scoring; Game Called Ac-  
count of Darkness.

In probably one of the fastest games  
played in Washington this season  
Greenville and Washington yesterday  
afternoon battled for nine consecutive  
innings without scoring, the game be-  
ing called at the end of the ninth on  
account of darkness. The contest was  
in many ways different from that of  
the day before when Washington won  
in a decidedly easy manner, for the  
visitors showed entirely new form and  
at times handled the ball in an al-  
most sensational way.

Both clubs, it is believed, showed up  
to a decidedly better advantage than  
in any other game of the season, for  
the visitors displayed unusual energy  
and animation and Washington at times  
found it difficult indeed to keep pace  
with them. Infield work was almost  
perfect, while running catches of long  
drives to the outfield featured prom-  
inently on both sides. Greenville was  
credited with an errorless game, while  
Washington had two checked up  
against them. Five well scattered hits  
were secured by Washington, while the  
visitors were credited with three that  
came very near resulting in runs, but  
which, unfortunately, never materialized  
because of inability to hit at oppor-  
tune moments.

Barnes pitched a splendid game for  
Greenville, preventing the heavy hit-  
ting Washington club from hitting  
when hits would have resulted in  
runs. His work with men on bases  
was of an exceptionally fine character,  
for at such times he settled down and  
absolutely refused to yield the slight-  
est kind of hit. Manning for Wash-  
ington also showed splendid form, and  
pitched so effectively at critical stages  
that Greenville found it impossible to  
get anything in the shape of a timely  
hit. The game was nothing more than  
a pitcher's battle, combined with ex-  
cellent fielding on both sides, and  
stands out prominent as one of the  
best of the season.

Stringfield, Ellis and Frazier secured  
the only hits of the game for Green-  
ville, Stringfield and Frazier being  
credited with doubles each and Ellis  
with a single. Bridewell, Spencer,  
Stewart and Lewis did the stick work  
for Washington the latter getting two  
safes out of four times at bat. Run-  
ners were kept at a comfortable dis-  
tance from the home circuit through-  
out the entire game with the exception  
of one or two instances when they  
reached second and third. At such  
stages infield work was of an unusually  
splendid nature, and tightening along  
every line prevented scoring in a way  
that constantly resulted in unrestrain-  
ed applause from the grandstand.

The work of Stringfield at short,  
Massey and first and Dennehey in the  
outfield, were distinctly outstanding  
features of the game for Greenville,  
for they accepted several difficult  
chances, making them all good besides  
making good five of the easy ones.  
In fact, the entire team may be con-  
sidered to have played a splendid game  
with one of the cleanest and most  
games of the season.

### ASKS AUTHORITIES NOT TO INTERFERE IN NEXT ELECTIONS

of Reina Barrios, he was required by  
the constitution to convene elections  
for the Presidential period of six years  
within eight days, said elections to be  
held within six months after his as-  
suming power. Cabrera complied  
with the constitution in that he called  
the elections but he did not allow  
any other candidate in the field.

Herrera, having been designated  
vice-president by the congress, as re-  
quired by law, succeeded Cabrera as  
President interim, and in compliance  
with the law designated the last week  
in August for the Presidential election.  
Besides himself, there are two candi-  
dates in the field, Jose Leon Castillo,  
who was obliged to flee the country  
upon being nominated as a candidate  
in opposition to Cabrera 22 years ago  
and General Francisco Puentes.

In his circular letter to the authori-  
ties throughout the country President  
Herrera calls attention to his frequent  
declaration that it is his purpose, so  
long as he remains at the head of the  
government, "to adhere strictly to the  
principles of true democracy," and that  
he will not nullify or permit the nulli-  
fication of the electoral rights of any  
voter.

entirely consistent with the letters,  
and they add that, if renewed next  
year, "it must be in a form which is  
not inconsistent with the covenant."  
"There is only one weakness about  
this statement, and that is that its  
opening proposition is entirely inaccu-  
rate. The Anglo-Japanese treaty in  
all its forms has always been entirely  
out of harmony with the spirit of the  
covenant. It is a typical example of  
those partial and exclusive agreements  
between particular powers which the  
league of nations was designed to  
supersede. It pledges each of the  
contracting parties to make war if by  
reason of unprovoked attack or ag-  
gressive action' the other finds its 'ter-  
ritorial rights or special interests'  
threatened in Eastern Asia or India.

"The covenant, of course, provides  
an elaborate machinery by which the  
league will deal with such contingen-  
cies and bring its collective powers to  
bear on the offender, whether he is or  
is not himself among its members. The  
Anglo-Japanese treaty will need re-  
modelling from top to bottom in or-  
der to make it consistent with the co-  
venant. It will presumably be done  
by each power undertaking formally  
to go to war in support of the other  
after the league has definitely pronoun-  
ed against an aggressor and ordered  
the enforcement of all the punitive  
measures contemplated in Article 16 of  
the covenant, which include military  
action but do not impose its use as an  
obligation on all the mem-

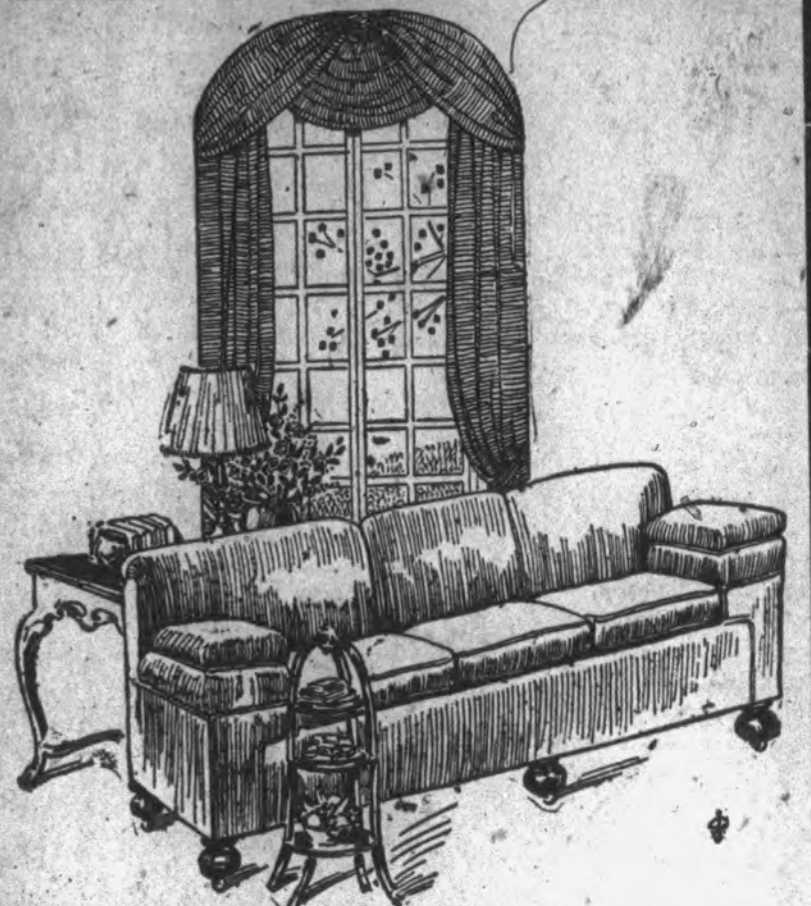
