French General Heygand Assisting in Operations in Many Sections.

Paris, Aug. 20.—Military success for the Poles have continued, according to report of the French foreign office.

WING OF POLISH ARMY IS MARCHING ON BREST LITVSK

Warsaw, Aug. 20.—The extreme right wing of the Polish army is marching on Brest, 120 miles east of Warsaw, says Polish officials.

POLES ADVANCE WITH UNDIMINISHED SPEED

Paris, Aug. 19.—Polish forces are advancing with undiminished speed along the line running from north of Warsaw to Wloda, about 110 miles southeast of Warsaw.

The initial tactical aim of this maneuver, say military experts is already more than attained, as the left wing of the Bolshevik army based on Brest-Litovsk, has become separated.

HIGH LIVING COSTS SERIOUSLY AFFECT HAREMS IN TURKEY

Many Turks Are Forced to Abandon Concubines on Account Low Incomes

AMERICAN WOMEN ARE INVESTIGATING MANY SECTIONS OF COUNTRY

Suffering of Moslem Women Has Become Tragetic in Many Territories.

Constantinople, Aug. 20.—Nowhere has the high cost of living been felt more keenly than in Turkish harems.

American women relief workers who have been investigating social and economic conditions say the tragedies Turkish women have undergone as a result of the war are even worse than in other European countries because of the utter helplessness of women and their lack of training which might make them self-supporting.

The sufferings of Moslem women are worse in cities than in the country, for the country women are frequently trained to do farm work and are asset to their husbands rather than a liability.

TO PLACE EMBARGO ON GOAL TO OCEAN POINTS OF NATION

Railroads Declare that Fuel Must be Unloaded Promptly into Ships.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 19.—An immediate embargo on the movement of coal to tide-water, except upon a definite showing that the coal upon arrival at piers would be unloaded into vessels with reasonable promptness has been agreed upon by the railroads.

In an explanatory statement the association said Chairman Willard of the Association of Railway Executives and Colonel D. B. Wentz, President of the National Coal Association, met in conference yesterday with representatives of the commission on car service of the American Railroad Association.

"The conference considered particularly a report of the special committee of the national coal association in the matter of shipment of tide-water bituminous coal" the statement said, "and unanimously reached the conclusion that such changes should be made in the regulations of the tide-water coal exchange which handles shipments through New York, Philadelphia and Baltimore, as would result in penalizing the holding of bituminous coal by individual members of the exchange beyond the free time permitted in established coal demurrage tariffs.

FINDS ELIHU ROOT STRONG SUPPORTER OF SMALL NATIONS

Brazilian Delegate Discovers New Features at International Court.

ROOT HELPED BRAZIL TO SECURE SEVERAL IMPORTANT MATTERS

The Hague, Aug. 20.—In the course of the jurists' conferences which have been held here to draw up plans for the organization of an International High Court of Justice, Raoul Fernandez, the Brazilian delegate, found Elihu Root a strong supporter in his fight for the interests of small nations.

At two different occasions Mr. Root succeeded in inducing the conference to adopt articles which Senhor Fernandez proposed but which only met with a cold reception until Root came to Fernandez's assistance.

The first case was the right of the country which had no judge in the court to name a judge to sit while that country's case was before the court.

The second case in which Fernandez and Root closely collaborated was when the latter's proposal to extend the power of supplementary judges was about to be rejected.

According to the original plan the vacancies caused through the absence of judges could only be filled when at least three judges were absent.

This majority was endangered by the old plan when in case of two absent judges the small powers vacancies would not be filled and the big powers would have a majority of five to four.

RUSSIAN TERMS OF PEACE NOT PLEASING TO POLISH NATION

London, Aug. 20.—The second sitting of the Russo-Polish peace conference held at Minsk Thursday, but the Russian terms were substantially same as those published in London and which were communicated to the Poles, says a Moscow official dispatch.

WAR TROPHIES ARE BEING DISTRIBUTED IN FRENCH MISSION

Thousands of Relics for Liberty Loan Drive Go to Another Purpose.

UNUSUAL COLLECTION HAS PRESENTED TO ARMY AND NAVY CLUB

New York, Aug. 20.—Thousands of war trophies brought from the battle field of France for use during the Liberty Loan and other drives are being distributed at the warehouse of the French mission here.

Large demands for trophies have come from inland cities, according to Major Jean Malys, director of the Bureau of Information, Direction Generale Des Services Francais Aux Etats Unis, now in this city.

One of the largest single collections, with the exception of that given to Washington for the National Museum, was presented to the Army and Navy Club of America.

The collection of 50 pieces is made up of cannon, flame throwers, trench mortars, machine guns, bayonets, rifles, swords, cuirasses, wire cutting machines, trench stoves, brasses, marmites, shells and shell baskets, marine signal flags and other interesting and valuable trophies.

RUM FIEND STEALS SUIT CASE FILLED WITH REAL VACCINE

Goldsboro Thief Deprives Dr. Mitchener of Grip, Thinking it Contained Monk

Raleigh, Aug. 19.—Dr. J. S. Mitchener, State Epidemiologist, while waiting in the station at Goldsboro one night this week, had stolen from him his grip and raincoat. The doctor admits that he set it down gingerly and that the suspicion might have been aroused that it contained whiskey, but the thief, for all his pains, got only some typhoid vaccine.

The Bureau of Epidemiology of the State Board of Health, of which Dr. Mitchener is Director, warns the rascal that anti-typhoid vaccine is not particularly delicious to the taste in spite of its alleged resemblance of intoxicants and suggests that if he should not know how to use it he may call at the Raleigh office where it can be explained to him.

It is getting pretty serious when North Carolina folks want the vaccine so badly they have to steal it. But there is plenty more at the State Laboratory of Hygiene and another ample supply has already gone forward to Dr. J. F. Doelerty, who is conducting the campaign and lives will be spared and dollars banked in spite of the miscreant who thought he smelled "monkey run."

HARDING'S CAMPAIGN WILL CONTINUE TO BE ALONG FORMER LINES

Marion, Aug. 20.—Senator Harding's campaign will continue as previously planned regardless of strategy adopted by the Democrats, it was said today by Harry Daugherty, a member of the Republican executive committee after a conference with the nominee.

The idea of the Democrats is based on the highest plane of idealism ever made by any political party to the American people in a National campaign. It is that this nation shall enter a League of Nations of the world to prevent or at least make the possibility of war far more difficult than it now is.

Seventeen million American women are going to have their say in the future government of the country, so what the "antis" say now really makes very little difference.

The country likes the way Senator Harding talks, for he talks fluently, but never says anything. That kind of campaigning means something to the Democrats, for he will not be half so dangerous as some candidate able of talking with plain commonsense.

A statement says that France is in complete accord with the United States without questioning what its all over, it is natural that France should be so for it owes much to America, and America in return will continue doing right by LaFayette's people.

The suffrage question has kept the country in such a swirl for the past several days that intoxicants haven't been necessary, and as a result prohibition has been reaping a direct benefit without knowing it.

Maybe the Republicans will find more time to talk about the League of Nations now that suffrage has been settled, for in one they had a chance of approving, but in the other they have talked themselves out of the opportunity of ever sharing in its great victory.

The North Carolina legislature has for the time being defeated woman suffrage in this state, but even at that it has nothing to boast about. Tennessee, really and truly a part of North Carolina, has ratified, and in doing so, has much more to be glad over than the mother state.

If the Poles continue to drive the Russians back over conquered territory as they are doing now it is quite sure the future will prove decidedly more pleasing for the Poles than the past. The Bolsheviks deserve defeat upon every side, and if right dominates they will get everything coming to them along this line.

SUCH ACTION JUSTIFIED.

If there should be two championship series for the pennant of the Eastern Carolina league the clubs playing by decision of the supposed legal committee cannot claim the official pennant any more than Greenville or Scotland Neck, in fact not as much, for these two clubs have won simply by capturing the greatest number of games while the others actually quit, began wrangling about unfairness when there was no reason for such. Who wins the pennant in this case? It matters not what the decision of so-called legal committee, Greenville and Scotland Neck are entitled to the honors, and are taking advantage of the opportunity for the simple reason that they were not given recognition at the final meeting in Tarboro when sentiment of the acting officials was indisputably against Greenville and there was absolutely no chance on earth of gaining justice. Greenville defeated Williamston, and Tarboro in an unquestionably fair way, and the action therefore of the committee appointed by the president before the dissension arose is absolutely without authority to declare the winner of the second half. The fact is, the president of the league should have called a special session of club presidents and considered Williamston's complaints, but instead, he merely authorized the vice-president to act in his capacity and failed completely to live up to the principles of the high office to which he was appointed by the towns composing the league. Greenville has played fair ball throughout the entire season, and utterances that would have one to believe otherwise are inauthentic and of direct injustice not only to Greenville, but to virtually every town composing the league with the exception of Williamston and Tarboro alone. Greenville and Scotland Neck will play off the championship series. The winner of the pennant may feel justified in calling the action legal for they have acted from the highest principles any one could desire, and that is considerably more than those appointed by the committee can claim.

Governor Cox may well feel elated over the suffrage victory in Tennessee for with seventeen million woman enfranchised his chance for winning in the coming election is increased to no little extent. The governor has done by the women what every fair-minded, impartial man with vision would do, and it is only just that they should in return throw the weight of their vote in his direction. The Democratic party, which Governor Cox represents so unmistakably, needs the support of the woman vote for the party is desirous that the moral influence of the American women should dominate the lower principles of living, and eventually place the American people in a position where they can confidently claim themselves the greatest people on earth. The Democrats believe in doing the right, standing for the right and just, therefore, in helping suffrage, they have accomplished a distinct victory without going into the issue as a political expediency. This fact will mean much to the future because the party can face the world calmly and share woman's achievements, happy in the fact that it was instrumental in the great developments that are certain to culminate from the vote of American women.

When Pitt county gets linked up by hard surfaced roads Greenville will be the center of attraction for people from many sections of the state, for it has many things to offer all the year around and can guarantee a good time to everyone. 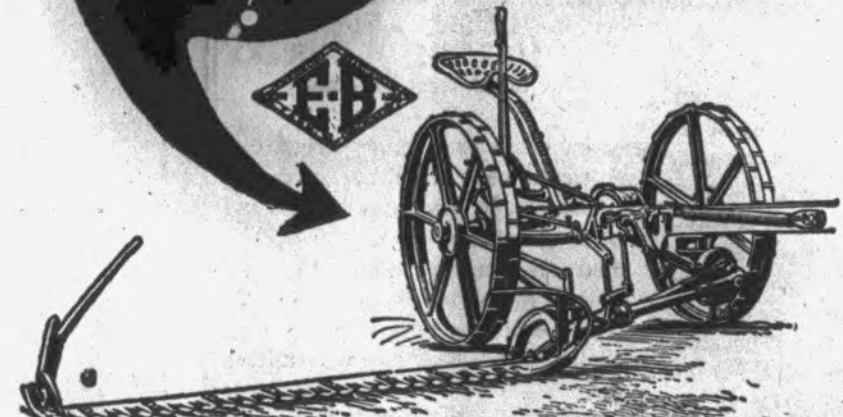

SECOND GAME OF SERIES PREVENTED BY UNTIMELY RAIN

Championship Series Postponed in First Inning by Veritable Cloudburst MANAGERS DECIDE TO PLAY TODAY'S GAME ON HOBGOOD DIAMOND

Regular Schedule Will be Continued During the Remainder of the Week.

The second game of the championship series between Greenville and the Scotland Neck-Hobgood club was postponed in the first half of the first inning here yesterday afternoon by a torrential downpour of rain which flooded the diamond completely and made further playing a matter of impossibility long after the rain was over. Hundreds of those attending the game were forced to flee to shelters of safety and those who didn't find the shelters in time were drenched to such an extent that remaining in the rain for a longer period could not have wet them more.

The cloudburst converted itself into one of the heaviest rainfalls in this section of the country in sometime, and hundreds of people were unable to reach their cars in time to prevent the drenching with Jupiter Pluvius had in store for the afternoon's performance. Numbers of women suffered the hardship with the men, and those who reached shelter in time to prevent getting wet either were forced to wade to their cars or were wet thoroughly by the intermittent showers immediately succeeding the cloudburst.

However, there were very few who regretted attending the game. They claimed that the cloud was sufficiently threatening before they went to the

park to have justified them in remaining at home, and only the slight few who were really discomfited proved to be among the number firing explosives at Jupiter Pluvius for raining out what was destined to be one of the fastest games of the championship series. Even the best-natured woman present was bound to grumble a little, but what they said was justifiable considering the thoroughness with which the rain had accomplished its mission.

It was one time supposed that the clubs would play in Greenville today, but after the matter was talked over by the managers last night it was considered advisable to continue the regular schedule in order not to cause any confusion among those familiar with its provisions. As a consequence, Greenville will appear in Hobgood for the afternoon's contest, and Scotland Neck will appear here for Saturday afternoon. The series will not be concluded this week, and those who have been looking forward to the post-series will have the pleasure of a day's rest followed by the final games of the series.

goes on much as usual. Women can find employment in olive groves, at silk culture, in fruit orchards and even in grainfields.

Since the war has robbed so many women of the husbands, fathers or other male relatives upon whom they were dependent, many city women have forced themselves into employment which was never before regarded as proper for Moslem women. Turkish women with their veils thrown back from their faces may now be seen as saleswomen in scores of Constantinople shops. They are even employed as street sweepers.

There has been a great outcry against Moslem women accepting employment which forces them into association with men, especially Christian men, but the economic pressure has been so strong that religious prejudices had to make way. The need for nurses with the army gave Moslem women their first opportunity to get

hospital training and become nurses. menial women. Turkish women may be found in telephone exchanges. women an independence which was undreamed of six years ago, and the wall of the untrained women
