GREENVILLE WINS THIRD GAME SERIES FROM THE HYPHENS

Stages 5-0 Shutout

Greenville won the third game of the championship series of the Eastern Carolina League from Scotland Neck here this afternoon by the score of 5 to 0. The game was an entire change from that of yesterday, for the champions of the last half hit probably more opportunely than any other game of the series and at no time gave the visitors an opportunity of scoring with exception of the fourth inning, when a runner succeeded in reaching the third corner.

The Hyphens at times showed a return to life but the spurts of animation failed to endure and Greenville several times threatened increasing the lead gained in the second, fourth and sixth innings.

Finch was decidedly wild and ineffective at critical stages, yielding hits, which combined with unfortunate errors of his teammates gave the locals advantages which they accepted immediately.

"Saxe" Barnes pitched one of the steadiest games of the season for Greenville and while Scotland Neck secured seven hits they were so well scattered that runs were an impossibility.

No spectacular fielding featured the game on either side, Greenville merely handled the sphere more consistently and decidedly faster.

Some experts asserted that rent laws passed last spring, designed to check the meteoric rise of rents, had tended to check building of apartment houses. The building trend was well illustrated last month when plans for new structures filed in Manhattan showed to what little extent property owners were going toward filling the need for 100,000 additional apartments. Construction of only one apartment house and one single dwelling were filed, whereas five theatres, 115 garages and three loft structures are contemplated. Normal construction in this city, according to Tenement House Commissioners Mann, is 200.
