

ADVOCATE FUTURE COORDINATION FOR HIGHWAY ACTIVITY

Centralized Body for Research Work
Undertaken by Engineering

ADVISORY BOARD FORMED
TO CONDUCT RESEARCH IN
IMPORTANT TERRITORIES

Number American Institutions Prom-
ises Aid In Effecting Permanent
Organization.

New York, Dec. 14.—Co-ordination of all agencies interested in highway construction to avoid overlapping of efforts and provide a centralized body for research has been undertaken by the Engineering Foundation, with its headquarters in this city. Bureaus of the federal government, various technical organizations and universities are expected to join the movement, it was announced here today.

An advisory board on highway research has been organized under the chairmanship of Professor Anson Marston of the Engineering School of the Iowa State College which will work through the National Research Council. The various co-operating organizations and institutions will name the members to this board. The result of the board's activities will be made available to highway builders throughout the country.

Work of the board, it is expected, will begin at an early date. Effort will be made to obtain from Congress a definite assignment of part of the unexpended balance of federal aid road money to some agency which will administer the fund under direction of the board.

Senate Passes Resolution of Agricultural Committee Reviving War Finance Committee

Washington, Dec. 13.—The Senate late today passed the agriculture committee resolution directing the revival of the War Finance Corporation as a measure of affording relief to farmers.

The second section of the resolution, which as introduced would have directed the extension of liberal credits to farmers by the Federal Reserve system, was amended to make the desirability of such a course only an expression of opinion of Congress.

The amendment making the change in the section of the resolution relating to the Federal Reserve system was pro-

posed by Senator Norris, Republican, of Nebraska, and was accepted by a vote of 47 to 16.

Another change made in the resolution on suggestion of Senator Smith, Democrat, of Georgia, broadened the duties of the Finance Corporation to include the financing of exportation of products other than those produced on the farm. Amendments submitted by Senator Harris, Democrat, of Georgia, to make the rate of discount on loans to farmers five per cent, and by Senator McKellar, Democrat, of Tennessee, to make cotton factors' paper eligible for discount were rejected by overwhelming votes. A substitute for the resolution presented by Senator Spencer, Republican, of Missouri, met a similar fate.

Final action on the resolution was without a record vote. The measure now goes to the House, where a number of similar farm relief measures are pending.

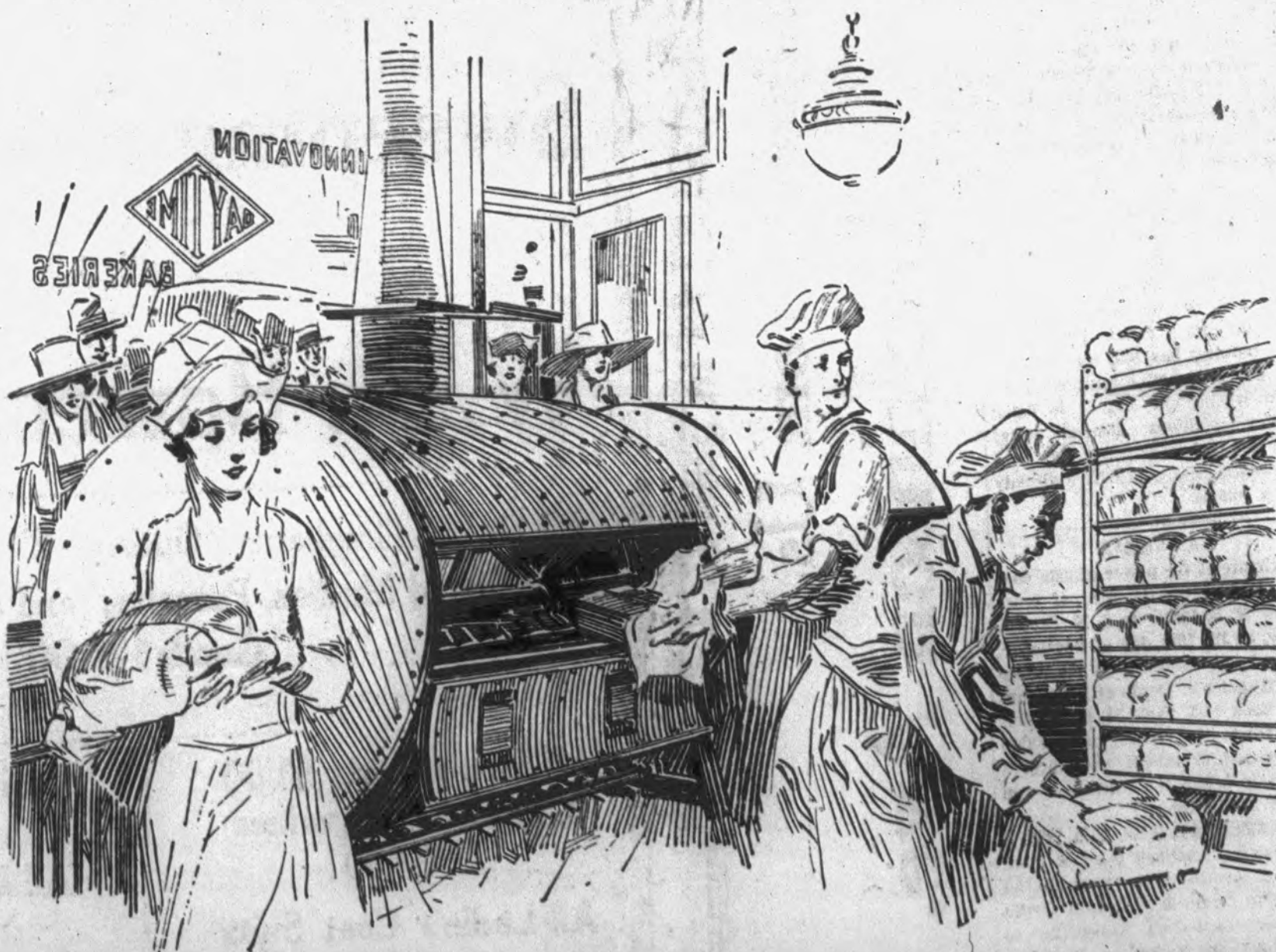

Constantine has decided to abdicate the Greek throne in favor of the Crown Prince. That's certainly generous after raising such a howl over it.

The United States is preparing to repeal war laws. That's favorable to everyone, but it would be better first to effect a state of peace with Germany.

Increased crime ought not to worry American people more than anything else. There are enough lawyers to look out after that.

After consulting "leading minds of the country" Senator Harding may feel like giving the "feeble minds" a hearing, especially after he hears what Mr. Johnson has to say.

Mr. Johnson and Senator Harding may eventually organize a small league of their own, particularly since the assembly in Geneva seems determined to do something worth while.

In giving Christmas presents this year don't forget that a subscription to the Daily Reflector would be appreciated by the fellow away from home, or even a member of the family. The paper has been visiting homes of the city and county regularly for forty years and is just as good a friend as ever.

Reports of continued reduction in wages throughout the country go to show that readjustment is in progress. When prices of commodities drop as they have done for the past month it was natural to expect radical decrease in salaries in every branch of industry. Reconstruction is bound to come, and the sooner the better.

Now that the league assembly has adopted permanent plans for an international court of justice some of America's irreconcilables might explain the outcome of the issue. This is one of the most constructive steps yet taken by the assembly and certainly should be deserving of comment, even though this may be unfavorable.

Secretary Daniels declares that world conditions make continuation of naval and aircraft building imperative. And he's about right, too, as long as we remain in a state of war with Germany and outside of the league of nations. The situation is not so pleasing as one would have it, particularly to the parents who gave thousand of sons in the recent conflict with Germany.

President Wilson has issued another appeal for starving children in Central Europe, and it is hardly probable American people will fail to respond. There are three million five hundred thousand youngsters to be fed and clothed until another harvest season comes around. America has been asked to contribute. Thirty million dollars will be necessary to carry on the work, and America alone must supply this amount. In the name of civilization, send in your donation today.

Restricted credit is doing more than any other one thing to bring people to their senses. Last year most anyone could get credit just so he had a job and worked steadily. In fact, merchants offered it on every hand, and people accepted regardless of the future. The situation today has changed so radically that the country has been thrown almost into a panic. Reaction and not an actual shortage of money brought the change. The change came so suddenly that it caught thousands unprepared, in fact, millions in debt and with no provision for the future. It is these people who are suffering today, but in many cases they are being cared for, and if they should improve by the lesson, the future has the same amount of prosperity as in the past. Only it will be a different kind and more constructive.

The fact that United States vessels carried half of the commerce overseas during the past fiscal year shows conclusively that the nation is becoming of more than ordinary consideration to foreign countries that heretofore have been holding sway on the high seas. Shipbuilding during the war and continued increase in construction since the war ended has provided an enormous number of ships which may be used for commercial purposes, and since our products are always in demand by foreign countries it is not surprising that an increase should have occurred. This is more reason why the United States should be a member of the league of nations.

It seems quite probable that the senate is going to take proposed action for rendering aid to cotton and tobacco farmers of the country, and this fact itself should inspire people with a desire to stop talking "hard times" and get busy and produce. The senate realizes the seriousness of conditions facing the farmer at this time, and it would have been unreasonable indeed if steps had not been taken to bring them relief. It must be remembered, however, that production must be increased when assistance is given, for in this way alone will any improvement be noticeable.

The public is gratified to learn that a substantial increase in production of anthracite and bituminous coal is in progress for it gives assurance that present high prices may eventually take a downward trend. Profitsteering in the industry has had its day, and the public is in better position to ascertain whether or not it is being gouged. Conditions demand lower prices, and coal must get in line with other commodities which have already taken a tumble.
