## PRISONER JUMPS FROM WINDOW OF CITY COURT ROOM

Claude Joyner, Colored, Awaiting Trial for Larceny, Plunges Through Second Story Window

Many pathetic and interesting scenes have been enacted in the court room in this city during past years, but the most unusual transpired during the criminal session of Pitt county court yesterday afternoon when Claude Joyner, colored man awaiting trial on a charge of petty larceny sprang thru one of the windows in rear of the jury room, and made his escape after landing on the ground eighteen feet below. The feat was one of the most extraordinary happenings during a regular session of court recorded by court officials in this section of the state, and more so, because the negro successfully evaded capture after being pursued by police and county officials several miles out side of the city.

This incident with the exception of four minor cases practically constituted the day's proceedings, as much time was consumed in the hearing of one or two long drawn out issues taken up during the morning hours and disposed of after provoking deferment in securing witnesses and legal argument. Judge Cooper, however, did everything possible to make progress and dealt out justice in a way that carried terror to the heart of violators of the law.

Ernest Vance and Clemmie Cox, colored, were fined \$50 each and half costs for an affray occurring between them sometime ago. Louie Britt, also colored, appearing on charge of assault with deadly weapon and carrying concealed weapon was fined \$50 and costs in one offense. Judgement being suspended in the other because of insufficient evidence.

John Stock, white man arrested by county officials several weeks ago on a charge of selling whiskey was found guilty after an exhaustive examination of the little evidence produced against him. Larry Lamb, white man of Wilson, was adjudged not guilty of assault with an automobile.

Claude Joyner, who created principal excitement of the afternoon by plunging to safety through the window was being held for trial by Deputy Sheriff Corbett together with several other prisoners. They all sat together near the jury room awaiting their turn for trial when Mr. Corbett was called to the telephone to summon witnesses. There was considerable commotion in the room owing to a change of cases, and at this time Joyner glided swiftly through the door and deliberately plunged through the window. His absence was discovered almost immediately, and when first seen he was running in a circle close to the jail endeavoring to recover from the shock of the descent.

Seeing he was pursued he made directly for banks of the river and passed through dense undergrowth and mud for about three miles. Officers succeeded in catching him off some time later, so he jumped into the river and swam safely to the other side late reports say he was later caught by colored men and released after pitifully begging for freedom.

## PITT COUNTY FAIR TO OPEN ON FIRST WEEK IN OCTOBER

Contract for Midway Attractions Already Let to Murphy Shows, One of Greatest Carnival Companies

The second Pitt county Fair will open in this city the first week in October with a program that promises to be the best of any other attraction of the kind in Eastern North Carolina. This was made public today by Dr. W. M. Price, secretary who at this time is getting preliminary plans under way for the great event.

The contract for midway attractions was several days ago let to the Murphy shows which is one of the largest carnival organizations in the United States. It provides for numbers of interest free attractions considerably more thrilling than those presented under auspices of the fair last year, together with enough music to keep everything at full blast during the entire week the fair is in progress.

Horse racing this year promises to even climax the several interesting contests witnessed by thousands of people at the grounds daily last year as promoters of the sport from the North have become interested in Pitt county's progress and probably will have a number of splendid horses in training several weeks prior to the opening.

There are quite a number of attractions to be booked which will measure up to expectation in every way. Dr. Price, stated, and everything is going to be done to make the second year measure up to anything presented in other parts of the state. Efforts will be made to increase interest in exhibits of every nature, and products of the farm will be given particular attention.

The fair last year was as good if not better than any other in this section of the state, and with increased effort to improve the exhibits it is assured this year will be everything the public can desire. It is urged that Pitt county people get busy and be prepared to offer competition for prizes offered for various products, as in this way the event will be of far greater interest and show just what the country is doing in every line of industry.

## AMERICANIZATION MEET HELD IN WASHINGTON

Washington, March, 15.—Representatives of nearly eighty civic and patriotic organizations engaged in Americanization work meeting here today organized the National American Council.

The objects of the new organization were declared to be the co-ordination of the work and plans of the various organizations engaged in patriotic and civic activities, the obtaining of the co-operation of the public, elimination of duplication and waste, and minimization of financial appeals for support. The constitution adopted by the council limits the activities of the organization to the promotion of education for patriotism and good citizenship, and specifically forbids it entering economic, industrial, sectarian or partisan political fields.

## TWO NATIONS TO VOTE FOR RIGHTS TO UPPER SILESIA

2,500,000 Germans and Poles to Vote in Plebiscite March 20 for Rights to Rich Stake

Berlin, March 16.—Upper Silesia, where 2,500,000 Germans and Poles will vote in a plebiscite on Sunday March 20 to determine whether that province shall remain German or be annexed to Poland, is a rich stake. The two nationalities are contending for a territory about 5,000 square miles in area or approximately the size of Connecticut. In one year 30,000,000 tons of coal were mined in Upper Silesia and besides it has vast deposits of iron, zinc and lead.

The dispute over its possession which results from the clause in the Versailles treaty providing for the plebiscite has made Upper Silesia one of the storm centers of Europe. The situation there for many months has been tense with both sides heavily armed and possibilities of civil war always present.

The Inner-Allied Council of Ambassadors repeatedly postponed the election which even now seems fraught with grave possibilities.

The loss of Upper Silesia would be a serious blow to the industrial strength of Germany.

It would be impossible to carry on the war except for the resources of Upper Silesia, declared the German Chancellor von Bethmann Hollweg in 1917. Assertion that without Silesia's natural resources, Germany would not be able to redeem her treaty pledges or to work out her own reconstruction was emphasized before the Allied Reparations Commission in London on March 1.

The Germans, since 1740 when Frederick the Great wrested the country from Poland, have developed the country into one of the greatest mining and industrial districts of Europe.

## ARKANSAS REGION CLAIMS THE ONLY U. S. DIAMOND MINE

Only Mine Thus Far Discovered on Western Hemisphere Discovered in Pike County Arkansas

Murphreesboro, Ark. Mar. 16.—The only diamond mine thus far discovered on the Western Hemisphere is located in Pike County, Ark. in which this hamlet is situated. The mine is two and a half miles south of here.

The diamonds are found in a pipe, the crater of an extinct volcano which ages ago boiled up through the surface had its terrific heat chilled by the waters of an island sea, and left bits of carbon scattered throughout the period which now fills the crater, to be pressed into diamonds by the contraction of the rock. The peridotite forms the original matrix of the diamond, and thus far the only diamond found in the Western Hemisphere in their matrices are those of Pike county. Diamonds have been found in some twenty five states in Canada and South America but always in river beds where geologists surmise they have been washed by the waters or in places where it is presumed they have been deposited by glacial action.

The first Arkansas diamond was found in 1906 by John Huddleston, then owner of the farm on which the sixty acre pipe is located by accident. Huddleston observed outcroppings of the gray-green rock, since classed as peridotite and come to the conclusion that his hillside contained valuable mineral perhaps copper. After pecking around without finding anything which looked to him like mineral, he picked up a crystal, and then one day showed it to some friends in Murphreesboro. A little rock fowler pronounced it a diamond and made sure by verifications by jewel experts in New York.

## MALARIA WORK TO BE CONTINUED IN THIS CITY TODAY

\$3,000 Provided By City and County for Eradication of Mosquito and Prevention of Malaria

The malaria campaign which was conducted so successfully in and around Greenville last summer will be continued this year, according to an announcement made public by Mayor D. L. Clark today. A large force of workmen under the direction of J. G. Bowling, inspector, will begin operation today and work from one part of the city to another during the spring and summer months.

The campaign will be conducted thru funds furnished by the city of Greenville and county authorities, as the government last year expended all appropriations available to this section.

Mayor Clark stated that \$3000 had been provided for the operations and while small in comparison to the great good resulting from the campaign, is considered fully adequate to almost entirely eradicate the mosquito, which last year failed to play his usual important role in summer activities.

The campaign will be under the supervision of the state board of health, while Mayor Clark will look out after directing the work. Daily inspection will be made by Mr. Bowling who had the work in charge last year under the government's supervision, and it is expected it will prove as effective in shortening the mosquito's career as last year.

Prevention of Malaria through eradication of the mosquito is considered one of the most direct means of preserving public health. This fact was presented in a forceful and convincing manner last year when Greenville had a health record considerably above the average. Realizing this fact public organizations petitioned the board of aldermen to continue work this year and there is every reason to believe it will be even more successful than last summer.

## EUROPE BELIEVES U. S. LEGISLATURE IS MERE COMEDY

Readers of Newspapers Get the Idea That Legislatures Are Equal to Slap Stick Comedy Dramas

The Hague, Mar. 16.—Readers of the Dutch and other European newspapers these days frequently get the idea that various state legislatures in the United States are conducted among the lines of slapstick comedies.

Each bit of freak legislation, whether introduced with serious intent or merely to cause laugh, which emanates from these various governing bodies, is printed with all seriousness on the side of the Atlantic.

If a senator in a state legislature decides to make the bill of a political opponent appear ridiculous by introducing another along the same lines that goes the opponents one better and is utterly preposterous, the purport of the bill is carried abroad by a European correspondent in New York or Washington and is reprinted throughout Europe.

These dispatches are generally featured or played up in the European press, and many European editors have told the correspondent they are convinced by the dispatches they receive, that most American Lawmakers are crazy.

The fact that these measures are merely introduced and have little if any possibility of passing, is seldom reported with the result that many European newspaper readers are convinced that, here and there in America there are places for example persons sentenced to live several months with their mother-in-laws if found guilty of snoring.

## SAYS AUSTRALIA AND NEW ZELAND DISFAVOR TREATY

Sir John Findley Declares Both Countries Strongly Opposed Renewal of Anglo-Japanese Pact

London, Mar. 16.—New Zealand and Australia, Sir John Findlay are strongly opposed to the renewal of the Anglo-Japanese treaty and he wants the home government to bear that fact in mind when the question of the renewal of the treaty comes up for settlement.

Sir John is one of the leading statesmen of New Zealand. With Sir Joseph Ward he represented New Zealand at the last Imperial Conference in 1911. He is now a gain in London.

The people of Australia and New Zealand have made up their minds that their Island must remain a white man's country, he says in Ball Mall and Globe. This is my opinion merely: it is a national conviction. They do not want emigrants from China, Japan or India. The color bar is definitely fixed and is a fundamental feature of our Constitution. We want the British Empire to recognize that fact and to respect it. It is apparently difficult for the government of the mother country, and possibly for the people, to realize how great is the color question with us New Zealand and Australians. The Chinese come to us in small numbers, and we want their numbers to diminish rather than increase.

The Japanese are of more aggressive people and constitute our greatest menace. We want the Imperial government to understand this matter more thoroughly than it does. The Japanese peril is there all the time.

It has now come to this: New Zealand in Australia for in this matter we are all of one mind—object emphatically to the renewal of the Anglo-Japanese treaty. When that treaty was made there was some excuse for it. Russia was threatening India, while Germany was threatening Europe and America was too much concerned with the Monroe Doctrine to be dependent on the German and the Russian menace are now removed and as for America, she is now ready to make common cause with us over the Japanese peril. So there is no justification for a continuance of an undesirable treaty.

## TEXAS NEGRO CARRIED FROM JAIL AND HANGED NEAR BY

Texarkana, Texas, March 15.—Brownie Tuttle, negro, charged with assault on an aged white woman near Hope, Ark., early today was taken from the Hope City jail early tonight by a mob of about 300 persons and hanged at a spot about 50 feet from the jail.

Co-operative Campaign Carried Into Falkland Last Night With More Than Usual Success

## MCCRARY OUTLINES PLAN FOR DEFINITE METHOD OF HANDLING FUTURE CROPS

Secretary Pace and S. M. Crisp Also Speak of Conditions Prevailing in This Section

That cotton and tobacco farmers of this county are becoming more than ordinarily interested in the co-operative marketing plan as advocated by leading business and agriculturalists in every part of the county was set forth in a vivid and impressive manner last night when members of the local committee carried the campaign into Falkland township. The meeting was held in a storehouse in Falkland, and attended by one of the largest crowds of farmers since the drive opened last week. Practically every farmer expressed great confidence in the new marketing plan as presented by O. F. McCrary, W. B. Pace, S. M. Crisp, and other speakers of the evening and pledged to do everything possible in making it even a greater success than has proven to other states.

The co-operative marketing plan as it vitally affects cotton and tobacco growers in this section of the state was fully explained by Mr. McCrary who declared it the only definite medium by which the practically insolvent farmer will be able to recover from the great financial loss brought on by shrinkage of value for his past crop. He said the plan had been tried out in other parts of the United States and proved so successful that many states at this time have it under consideration. Foreign countries, where the plan was first introduced have found it one of the most direct means of handling every product grown and is used so extensively today that it has vitally succeeded old methods entirely.

"Many planters", Mr. McCrary declared are of the opinion that co-operative marketing will be of little benefit to them. They contend they cannot control the market because they only produce a small per cent of a product grown in many other sections of the country. This contention carries little weight at all, for California does not produce all the peaches in the world, but still finds the co-operative plan advisable and effective where the old way was a direct handicap. They organized in time to control the principal part of the crop, and consequently are in position to ascertain what the market wants and demands a price by which growers will receive a fair profit.

The same condition prevails in other sections of the world where one or two particular crops are the most important. Mr. McCrary declared, especially in Florida where fruit growers are so strictly organized that they easily control the market and demand prices in keeping with the cost of production. The first shares sold by the Florida association brought \$50 each, and after the unorganized planter realized what was being done he tried to purchase stock too, and found that the price had advanced to \$175 per share. This fact shows what growers and business men in that district think of the proposition. They have realized it vitally affects the business man and banker as well as the planter because business is established and general business conditions bettered in many different ways.

"North Carolina this year lost over \$168,000,000 on its crops because of shrinkage in value", he declared, and unless some definite way of marketing and regulating production is generally accepted there is little prospect of any improvement in the future. The time for concerted action has come and it is highly important that every business man, banker and farmer do everything in his power to organize and do away with the abnormality which has threatened industry with ruin and upset many economic principals. It is something that affects everyone and not any one in particular, and unless

It is said there is strong hope of averting a strike in the packing industry. It is to be hoped so, for the strike outside the industry has given the packers enough trouble.

Daily reports indicate President Harding is gradually filling appointments which have been giving so much trouble of late. And after that's all over he will be confronted by something decidedly more pressing in the form of peace treaties and acceptance of the league of nations.

The Germans are beginning to realize by this time that the French troops of occupation mean business, though they are going about their work quietly and returning kindness at every opportunity. The situation is entirely different from what it was when German troops occupied Belgium and France, and shows beyond question that the Allies at least have respect for civilization.

Pitt county planters are doing everything possible to curtail acreage this year, and if plans now in progress mean anything they are going to be the ones to realize what definite marketing means to the country. There is plenty room for improvement in the price situation, and when this change comes Pitt county farmers are going to be in front rank ready to get their proportionate part.

The women are throwing their hats in the ring for political offices in many parts of the state at this time which indicates considerable speculation as to the outcome of elections. There are many candidates for mayor and cities where the women win out it will be a source of much interest in coming years.

The decline in price of fertilizer indicates manufacturers are beginning to realize that farmers cannot pay high prices this year, and are not going to need quite so much fertilizer because of decreased acreage into tobacco and cotton. This fact no doubt is going to mean much in helping the farmer pass over a period of depression which has caused great distress for months, and at the same time help dispose of the supply of fertilizer now on hand. It is all right to charge high prices when the farmer is able to sell his crop at a profit, but as there is no prospect for better prices any time soon it is fortunate that the fertilizer manufacturer cut prices while cutting was good.

It is gratifying to note that the state Department of Education in co-operation with the Federal Department of Agriculture is planning a course in agriculture in common schools of this state. This is one thing every school has needed for years instead of so many other things absolutely unnecessary to the success of the school child in after years. The common schools of North Carolina are patronized mostly by children from rural districts who either become farmers of limited knowledge or enter business life with a smattering knowledge of some new-fangled idea gained in school and which do them absolutely no good in determining the vocation pursued. With a definite course in farming each part of the state would be on a better road to progress because the things learned at school could easily be put into practice on the farm and in the garden and increase the young American's respect for an industry that is vitally essential. It is to the credit of leading schools and agricultural au-

thorities that this course is to become a part of school life and it is safe to say no one will have a cause to regret the time spent in pursuing such studies.

## MIGHTY SOUND LOGIC

The farmers of this state will do well to listen to advice of wide leaders like Dr. Clarence Poe and Dr. Kilgore who are familiar with conditions affecting the tobacco and cotton industry and fully capable of presenting information of great value to everyone. Over planting of cotton and tobacco this year will work incalculable damage and the market will be considerably more gutted than at this time when conditions are probably worse than in years. The plan outlined for co-operative marketing seems to be the only definite way of improving prices, and it is the duty of every farmer or person interested in farming to exert every influence in this direction. Pitt county growers have evinced perfect willingness to do their part, and indications point to quite an improvement for the next several months. There's no doubt the wisdom of curtailment of acreage as presented in every section of the country where tobacco is grown. Domestic and foreign markets are congested as they have never been before and unable to relieve this condition because of the stringent money market. This fact relieves all uncertainty as the right thing to do and the only alternative left open to the American planter is to follow advice laid down by their leaders and plant surplus acreage with crops that may be easily disposed of on local markets. The smokehouse should be filled to capacity, too, because the farmer will be able to provide for himself if the market should be years in returning to normal. There is no argument against plans enunciated by men familiar with world conditions, and the farmer that fails to follow the pathway blazed by experience is the one to be subject to deplorable conditions in the past.

## THE STRIKE SITUATION

Railroad workmen of the nation contend that their wages should not be cut while owners of the railroads declare they cannot continue operation successfully until expenses are reduced. The fight is creating more than general interest in every part of the country, and people are awaiting the outcome with more than general interest because of its effect upon the general public.

The railroad labor board, which was appointed during the administration of Woodrow Wilson, has found in the situation a rather knotty problem, and so far has experienced considerable difficulty in bringing about an adjustment. This problem is one that will give the Harding administration something out of the ordinary to think about and while it is small in comparison to similar issues handled during the Democratic administration, there is just enough uncertainty involved in the entire proceedings to give the new president an idea that he hasn't such an easy job after all.

There is no doubt in the world but what the railroads have a right to demand a decrease after paying thousands of laborers excessive wages since the war and it is equally certain that the operatives have no right to kick when that readjustment is in progress. There are millions of men who went up with the balloon inflation during the war, but they should remember abnormal conditions cannot exist all the time and that deflation is always the aftermath of excessive prices. There are, of course, many facts connected with the incident of which the public is not aware, but it seems perfectly natural to expect wages to come down when the price of all commodities have been on a gradual decline for several weeks.

## UNJUST FREIGHT RATES

The south and especially North Carolina should be represented at the meeting of the Interstate Commerce Commission when the freight rate question is revised again. The fact that Virginia has been receiving cheaper rates than this state for years has been the source of much ill feeling, and it is the purpose of business men and organizations to bring about adjustments at the earliest possible moment.

It has never been stated how the railroads figure that North Carolina should pay a higher rate than Virginia cities, and North Carolina people are of the opinion that they deserve equal rates as tonnage and miles are the only definite way to figure such things. The situation is one that should be considered more seriously by the railroads companies as they get more business from this State simply because it has more stuff to ship.

Agricultural products mean much to the railroad while the shipment of manufactured goods also runs into thousands of dollars yearly. Virginia's rate may suit Virginia, but it suits this

State so much that it is going to wage an incessant warfare on the railroads until the situation is adjusted to the satisfaction of business men who have paid high prices until they are tired of it.

Statements say the famine in China is now at its height, and this fact goes to show the American committee has ample reason to make haste in completing its task of raising funds for this purpose. China is today facing one of the most critical situations in history, and is depending upon the American people for any support which it may receive in relieving the deplorable plight. So far parts of the country have responded in a splendid way, but there are other communities that have been negligent of their duty, and have raised hardly over half the apportionment set by state committees. This delay should be avoided so far as possible, for unless China is given the aid requested by those in close touch with actual conditions in prevalence it is assured suffering will be more acute and real than ever before and thousands will die before aid is received. This is another time the great heart of American people is put to a test and if they maintain the splendid record established for suffering children of Europe and during the war they will have recognition of practically every appreciative country on earth. Constant deferment means disaster, and it is to be hoped immediate action will be taken to come to the rescue of the suffering before it's too late.

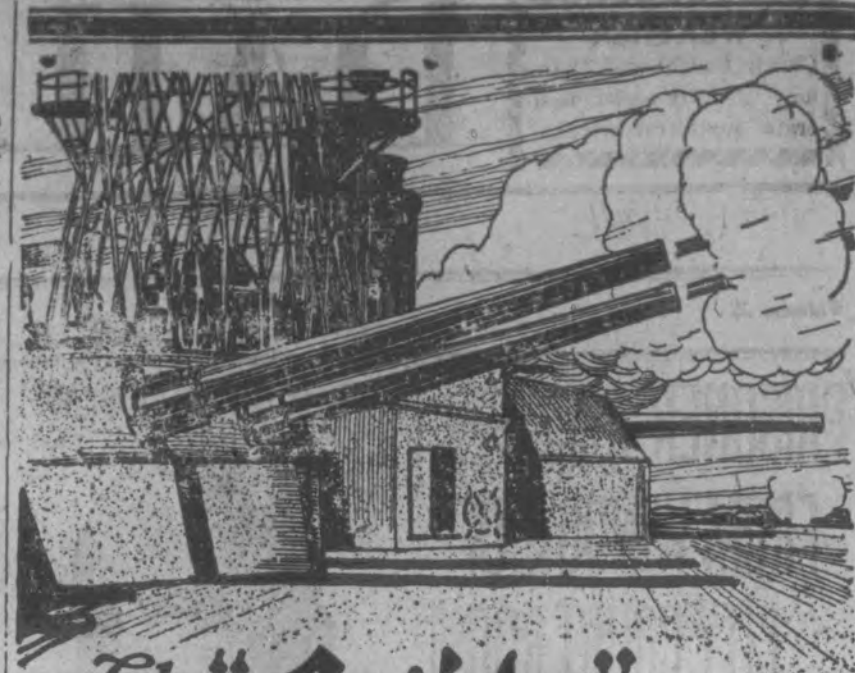

## BEGGARS ORGANIZE SHELL SHOCK SCHOOL IN BERLIN SECTION

Berlin, Mar. 14.—Dishonest beggars seeking to excite public sympathy, have developed a "school of shell-shock here," according to physicians who have had an opportunity to examine some of the men who have been suddenly taken with terrible fits of trembling on the crowded streets.  
The graduates have learned the technique of shaking as if suffering from chronic ague. They walk along, shaking the while, and frequently they fall down in front of or near persons who look as though they had some spare money, trembling a moment and become rigid, the eyes fixed, the face purpling.  
Police men rush up, give the man a quick examination, and if they think he is not faking they give him first aid, and permit those who wish to give him some money.  
One of the first things done, however, is to examine the eyes. If they flicker, or the eyeballs move, the case usually pronounced a fake. Some beggars have learned the business so well that they puzzle the doctors.  
Discussing these alleged shellshock cases, a physician said some of them had absolutely no injuries from their war service and were simple "mimicking men who really had been hurt, and so cheating them out of the sympathy which they deserved.
