ROAD SENTENCES FEATURE LARGELY IN COUNTY COURT

Judge Cooper Again Deals Out Justice In a Way That Carried Terror to Hearts of Offenders

County court delved away energetically in the great mass of documentary evidence which has been piling up for past several months and adjournment yesterday afternoon evinced the fact that ten cases had been definitely disposed of.

The session was in no way different from former ones, with the exception that sentences to the county road forces predominated to a greater extent than in many months.

It has been a mighty difficult matter to obtain sufficient evidence to convict members of the illicit whiskey traffic of the county for several years but right recently the court has been keeping rather close tab on such operations and falls to leave the slightest loophole for escape.

Tom Tucker, Isiah Edwards and Banks Barber, colored men charged with having liquor for sale were sentenced to the roads, with the exception of Edwards who was adjudged not guilty.

Robert Atkinson, colored man of the Farmville district, was found guilty of transporting liquor for sale and sentenced to eight months on the county roads at hard labor.

Eddie Carr another dusky gemmen was found guilty of carrying concealed weapon and sentenced to eight months on the roads.

Tom Atkinson charged with carrying a concealed weapon, was found guilty and fined \$50 and costs, Charles Evans charged with being drunk on a public highway, was fined \$10 and costs.

Walter Mills, charged with distilling contraband liquor, was found not guilty James McClune, recently indicted on a charge of false pretense, was also found not guilty.

Registration Yesterday Proved Decidedly Heavier Than Any Day Since Opening of Books Last Friday

Considerably greater interest is being manifested in registration for the municipal primary to be conducted in this city May 2nd, and as a result registration books this morning showed that yesterday proved a record day since opening of the books last Friday morning.

It is expected this splendid showing will be instrumental in adding greater impetus to registration for the next several days, and that both men and women will get busy and enter their names so they will be enabled to participate in electing a mayor and board of aldermen.

Every effort is being made to cooperate with the public, but this cannot possibly be done unless the people follow the newspapers and keep advised as to where the registrar may be found from day to day.

The prospect of a heavy woman vote has produced a state of uncertainty among candidates already lined up for mayoralty honors, and while figures for a normal vote have already been estimated in a rough way, it is probable the women will rally in greater numbers than expected and produce a momentary state of pandemonium with very candidate.

The primary system gives every person an equal chance in deciding candidates for the board of aldermen and mayor instead of the decision resting entirely with each ward from which the aldermen are chosen.

DECLARES RUSSIA FACES GREAT WAVE OF BLACKEST CRIME

Wife of Gen. Wrangle Says Negligence of Children Blackest Nightmare in Country's History

Constantinople, April 13.—The Baroness Wrangle, wife of the general who commanded the anti-Bolshevik army in Southern Russia until its defeat, and collapse declared that the demoralization of our boys and girls the next generation of Russians, is one of the blackest tragedies of the Bolshevik nightmare.

Abundant evidence from trustworthy sources among the vast Russian refugee colony here is available on this subject.

Our girls are dead, morally, is a phrase in a letter dated a month ago received from Moscow smuggled out by wife of Reval, written by a woman to her nephew in Wrangle's army.

One of the demands of the revolting workmen in Moscow and other cities has been that the Communist education of children be abandoned.

Bela Kun, who in Budapest attempted to give the children of the very poor special playgrounds and introduce in a measure methods well known in the United States has tried to organize the villas and palaces of the Crimea into rest houses and hospitals for children.

JAPAN TELEPHONE SERVICE DECLARED GREATLY INJURED

In beginning my remarks on this particular subject, I wish first of all to give you a clear and concise definition of the word hygiene.

The phase of this subject which claims our attention at this point is personal hygiene or personal cleanliness. The skin acts as a protecting organ not only by mechanically covering and so protecting the delicate parts and organs beneath from external violence, but more particularly in virtue of its being an organ of sensation, heat regulation and secretion.

The fourth point; Divine Fatherhood. As God is the Father, so is He protector of man. The earthly father may become enraged, and drive the child from home, but not so with God.

ADDRESSES LOCAL COLORED PEOPLE ON HYGIENE QUESTION

Dr. W. M. Capehart Tells of the Necessity of Closer Co-operation in Health Measures

The following lecture before the faculty and students of the Greenville colored graded school by Dr. W. M. Capehart will be of general interest to people of this city owing to the fine thought expressed:

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There are certain classes of people (and I hope they are not to be found in Greenville) who think it unwise to make frequent use of water in the form of baths in certain diseased states.

Today is observed throughout the state as Tuberculosis Day but I am taking a wider range as there are many other phases of this science which I think are equally important.

The death rate from tuberculosis is far too high and is quite out of proportion to that of the white race. Tuberculosis is originally a white man's disease and is often referred to as the White Plague, but by an effort on the part of the various states to safeguard their uninfected by establishing suitable institutions or sanitariums in which their infectious sect may be isolated and receive proper treatment.

Even though there are sanitariums at present where our infectious sick may be isolated there is much we can do as individuals to render this disease less prevalent and thereby reduce our death rate.

Let us consider how we may reduce in a great measure many of the diseases which are so prevalent among our

President Harding is working on his first message to congress. If it is as comprehensive and fully of constructive advice as those during the campaign the people will be as well off without hearing it.

The United States has at last decided that the Mayor of Cork must leave. He has been here long enough to accomplish whatever he desired, and the action of the government at this late hour ought not to cause any displeasure.

Greenville is one of the best towns in the state, but if its traffic regulations were better there would be no room for the slightest criticism at all. As it is there is too much disregard for the law to permit lax traffic regulations, and it is to be hoped the authorities will get busy immediately and eliminate further accidents caused by reckless and careless driving.

Chadbourn, North Carolina, has lined up with the promises and bonds for water and light improvements. Money expended in such an interest is spent wisely, and any city is to be congratulated on accomplishments of the kind. Greenville at the present time has one of the best plants in this section of the country, and its people ought to feel gratified they live in a town with such conveniences.

Figures recently compiled show that approximately one-half of the population of the United States is of voting age. This fact may appear astonishing to persons who have never considered the matter, but to others it is surprising because the figures are so large. A comparison two years ago would have hardly probable that woman's entrance in the political field has increased the vote in a general way at all. The question to be considered is how many of these people really vote. If they would all go to the polls and express their preference for some candidate the political situation would be much better, and it is probable influence for good would be on a higher plane. The woman vote is going to prove a powerful factor for improving moral life of the nation for the next several years, and when that time comes the law is going to be more rigidly enforced than in history of the country.

There is a movement among church members of Pittsburg, Penn., to oust house rent gougers from membership. Pittsburg is not the only place where such action would prove advisable, for hundreds of cities and towns have suffered from extortion in rents ever since the house shortage has been in evidence. Fortunately, however, there is every indication of an improvement taking place in the near future, and when that time comes the rental agent is going to suffer worse than being turned out of the church. When you take a selfish man's income away from him that is about the worst punishment that could be afflicted. This is just what will happen when the present situation is relieved, for people now suffering from the high prices will readily take advantage of new buildings to be erected and force down prices in an appalling way. The kite may go up and stay there a long time, but it's against the law of nature for it to remain up all the time.

BETTER LATE THAN NEVER

Persons believing they will be charged with evading the selecting draft, but who did not actually do so, may escape the odium of being publicly branded as deserters unjustly by communicating all facts of the case to Adjutant General Harris without delay. This new turn in affairs may be one means of settling many cases that have not been called to the attention of the government since the war. However, there are many instances in which persons guilty of evading the law will continue to remain silent believing they will be able of getting safely by without punishment.

There were hundreds guilty of the charge; but the government has succeeded in bringing them to account. Whether they are guilty or not any person charged with such a crime is deserving of being tried either exonerated or punished according to the gravity of his offense. America is not alone in facing such problems, for there are many other countries that suffered to a great extent because of the lack of patriotism of its citizens.

However, time works great wonders in case of criminals, and the draft evader may never feel he has successfully escaped apprehension. The law has at long and almost interminable scope and reaches out and gets the criminals when they are least expecting it.

The municipal council of Paris, so we are informed, is preparing to place a memorial stone at each and every place where a Big Bertha bomb shell fell during the war. Considering the financial situation in that country, it looks like it might be more advisable to wait until the country is in better shape for such a venture, and apply available money to places where people would receive immediate benefit. Every nation is in the habit of making mighty great mistakes in handling its finances, but this on the part of France is very unwise at this time. There are thousands of places this money might be placed, and statesmen ought to give the matter greater consideration before carrying it too far.

Health statistics from Kansas show there were 87 public health centers for children in 1920, in which 9,920 cases were enrolled. They also cared for 1,500 parent cases it is stated, which goes to show what may be accomplished along this line when people really become interested in public welfare.

The North Carolina health record has been a matter of much favorable comment for the past several months, but it is yet nothing to compare with other states which have far greater resources available, however, progress of the past few months has been almost remarkable, and authorities are to be congratulated on the fine showing which they have made.

Greenville people should do everything possible to co-operate with plans now under way for an extensive clean-up and anti-fly campaign to become effective within the next several days. Sanitation is one of the greatest assets any town can have for the public is naturally attracted to cleanliness where it would otherwise be repelled. Summer months are rapidly drawing near, and if the community is to be healthy and prosperous it is absolutely necessary that laws of health be highly regarded. The clean-up cam-
