NUMBER OF CASES HEARD IN SUPERIOR COURT YESTERDAY

Edward Fleming, Charged With Cruelty to Animals, Sentenced to Two Years on County Roads

Opening of the second week session of criminal term of Pitt county superior court proved by far one of the most gratifying since court has been in progress, and as a result about twelve cases have been permanently stricken from the docket.

Edward Fleming, charged with cruelty to animals, was sentenced to two years on the roads at hard work. Evidence in this case was convincing in every sense of the word, and Judge Devin consequently made short work of the case after the jury returned a verdict of guilty.

Judgment was suspended on payment of costs in the charge of speeding against Edward Wilkinson, Lula Parker was found not guilty of larceny. The case against D. W. Taylor and Frank Edwards was continued.

TURKISH WOMEN IGNORE DEMAND OF BIG LEADERS

Warning that no Women Will be Permitted to go on Stages not Considered Seriously

Constantinople, April 26.—The command of the Sheik-ul Islam, Vicar of the Sultan, ordering Turkish women not to appear on the stage, is being ignored by them.

They wear their veils still, instead of a hat, but turned back and tied into a pretty knot, after the manner of their Russian refugee sisters.

Because of the high price of cloth, Turkish women no longer wear a multitude of garments, designed in old time to hide the outlines of their figures.

NO DISTINCTION IN RANK OF SOLDIER TO BE MADE IN BURIAL

Chairman of Commission Says Remains of Men From France to be Interred With Similar Honor

Paris, April 26.—No distinctions of rank will be made in making the graves of American soldiers who died in France, says Charles S. Pierce, chairman of the American commission, which has arrived here to prepare plan for beautifying the four permanent military cemeteries where the bodies of all the American fighters are to be gathered.

We shall try to make these cemeteries memorials of which all Americans will be proud, said Colonel Pierce. Early in the discussions we decided that regardless of rank and position each grave should be treated in the same manner and given equal attention.

It is impossible to say now just what form the beautification will take but money will not be spared in making the cemeteries the most imposing in the world. Congress has appropriated \$1,000,000 as a preliminary sum for this work with a promise of more. It is probable that \$3,000,000 will be expended.

WOMEN SHOWING GREAT INTEREST IN REGISTRATION

They Managed to Outnumber Men in Registration Yesterday, Bringing The Total Up to 942.

Registration for the city primary dropped off considerably yesterday, but the women succeeded in leading the men, although not quite so much as the day before.

The second ward has maintained a definite lead over all other wards since opening of the books, having a total of 255 registrations against 241 in the Third ward. The Fifth ward comes next for honors with 184 against 177 in the Fourth.

CAROLINA TOWNSHIP GETS LINED UP FOR MARKETING PLAN

Canvassing Committee Met With Great Success While in That District During Yesterday

The soliciting committee of the cooperative Marketing association met with splendid success in Carolina township yesterday and goes into the Pictolus community today with promise of similar progress.

CHAMBERCOMMERCE PREPARES TO BEGIN MEMBERSHIP DRIVE

Committee Now Stationed at Speight Building and Organization Building Too

Coincident with the announcement this morning that H. A. White will be chairman of the Campaign Committee it was stated that campaign headquarters from which the expansion and re-organization work of the Greenville Chamber of Commerce will be directed, were established this morning in the ground floor office of Speight & Co., on Evans Street, directly opposite the Proctor Hotel.

When the membership of the enlarged Chamber of Commerce is enrolled, we trust that every town and hamlet in Pitt county will be represented, as well as Greenville, said Mr. Ewing this morning.

The Campaign Committee met this afternoon, where important business in regard to the campaign was taken up and where committees were named. Members of the Board of Directors of the present organization, who are also members of the Campaign Committee were present. They are among the most enthusiastic workers to expand the organization and to see the new membership will have full opportunity to elect all future directors and to decide what the Chamber of Commerce shall do for the betterment of Greenville and Pitt county.

Business and professional men of Greenville, residents of other communities in Pitt county and farmers in outlying sections, representing practically every element in the county, have been consulted within the last week and have endorsed the movement. They say that they recognize that a Chamber of Commerce for Pitt county can make for material betterment of all who reside within its boundaries.

There will be no hurrah, booster or revival methods in the coming effort. After consideration of the situation for several weeks, we have adopted plans for a business-like presentation of the matter to the citizens and we believe they will see the value of the proposed organization and join heartily in the movement.

The invitation to join will be made so general that there will be no question in the minds of any portion of the county about its sincerity. Only by making the response just as general as possible can we reach our highest aim. So far we are able to judge, the announcement of the plans has met with unanimous approval and we are confident at the start of success in our endeavors.

The campaign committee has approved of the form of application for membership in the Greenville Chamber of Commerce, but there will be no actual solicitation for some time yet. It is thought best to give the people an opportunity to learn all they may wish to about the movement before asking them to commit themselves.

France is preparing for an outbreak in Germany so we are informed at this time. That's all right, as the only thing troubling that country at this time is meeting demands of the reparations question.

The Montana senate recently passed a bill providing for a special tax of \$3 annually on all bachelors residing in that state. The law deserves attention of other states, for any man willing to live out his life without appreciating women enough to marry one deserves to be taxed, no doubt about that.

Greece, we are told, recently held its first woman suffrage convention. Leading speakers dwelled principally on the great part which women had played in history of the country and urged their rights to participate in the country's politics. The woman has always had as much right to an expression of public sentiment as the man, and if Greece fails to recognize the right they will certainly be behind time, and that's a certainty. It required sometime to convince the American people of the fact, but now they've been convinced there are very few who are willing to oppose the suffrage issue.

IMPROVED SCHOOLS

Sentiment seems to be gaining in favor of the bond issue in June for improvement of schools in this district. The schools will ask for \$200,000, of which \$35,000 will be applied to the payment of outstanding debts. The remainder of the sum is to be expended in improvements of various kinds when building operation becomes advisable, therefore, it is very evident it will receive hearty support as well as considerable opposition.

There are very few persons however, who will vote against the issue. Everyone realizes that schools are of first consideration to every community, especially to Greenville, which is gradually developing into one of the leading educational circles of the state. This splendid record cannot be maintained however unless the bond issue is made possible. There is immediate need of an elementary school building because of congestion in primary departments and the high school. This situation has handicapped work in a noticeable way for the past two years, and unless something is done within the next several months children necessarily will have to be turned away to do the best they can. Facilities in other districts barely meet demands of their own children. This fact shows conclusively that Greenville cannot afford to defer improvements.

The future of the community itself forbids that, therefore, it is necessary indeed that immediate plans for extending every department be considered. It may seem like a very inauspicious period for bond issues, but the fact that other towns have gone ahead and provided sums much larger than those required in Greenville sets aside the probability of hard times and talk of depression interfering. It is the duty of everyone to support the schools, and if other towns can afford to provide for theirs, Greenville cannot fail to do so.

Pitt county people ought to appreciate the privilege of becoming members of the Greenville Chamber of Commerce. This organization promises to be one of the most powerful mediums for civic improvement of any other institution of its kind in the county, therefore, every prominent business man ought to consider it quite an honor to become a member. Chambers of Commerce are powerful assets in community improvement, and any city without one is handicapped to no lit-

tle extent. Greenville has one to be proud of, and its citizens should leave nothing undone in supporting it.

The city's new street sweeper is something to be proud of. Its facilities for street cleaning is a way surpassing the old method in many ways, and enables the department to keep all streets in a clean condition without such a great outlay of personal effort. The council is to be congratulated on the purchase, as it places the town far in advance of surrounding cities of this size.

Plum hunters looking to the Harding administration for relief seem to be getting rather anxious. And they have a right too, for Mr. Harding is in such a position at this time that he's liable to let many jobs remain open long enough to get a line of public sentiment.

By the way, I am looking forward with pleasurable anticipation to the next meeting of our association, and I trust you will be there.

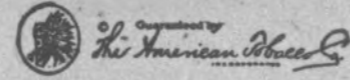
