PITT COUNTY POST AMERICAN LEGION ADOPTS RESOLUTION

Takes Stand in Favor of Improving General Conditions to Disabled Veterans

Whereas, as a part of the great body of American public opinion which compelled and supported the entrance of this nation into the World War for democracy and freedom against autocracy and oppression, we feel solemnly and in duty bound to accept along with the victory our troops so handsomely won the obligation to render our soldiers, sailors and marines injured and disabled in the service every aid, comfort and restitution which through hospital care, financial support and vocational rehabilitation a grateful nation can give, and

Whereas, The American Legion, representing the great bulk of disabled, as well as all ex-service men and women, is, after careful analysis and study suggesting and supporting a program of relief for the disabled which commends itself to us as most conservative and reasonable, and

Whereas, with deep consciousness of our debt to the disabled we wish to join our voices with the voice of The American Legion in requesting that the legislation proposed be given earnest consideration by the national Congress,

Therefore, be it resolved: That we hereby endorse the program of legislation asked by the American Legion of the Sixty-seventh Congress in the interest of the disabled soldiers, sailors and marines of America, and urge upon our Representative from this district and our Senators from this State the speedy enactment of the five bills involved, including:

1. Legislation consolidating the three ex-service bureaus.
2. Appropriations for a permanent hospital building program.
3. Legislation decentralizing the Bureau of War Risk Insurance
4. Legislation to further extend the benefits of vocational training and providing vocational training with pay for all disabled men with disabilities of 10 per cent or more traceable to the service.
5. Legislation providing privilege of retirement with pay for disabled emergency officers of the World War.

MANHATTAN SITE BRINGS HIGHEST FIGURE OF RENT

Part of New York One Time Sold for \$24 Brings Highest Price in History of City

New York, May 7.—Manhattan Island once sold by an Indian for \$24 and a few drinks of firewater, has become so valuable that a tiny plot stretching only 31 feet along Broadway recently was leased for an annual rental of about \$123 a square foot, real estate men said this was the highest figure for which land was ever rented here.
The site is at Broadway and Thirty-fourth street, and extends about 50 feet along the latter. Several years ago a department store wished to buy the corner lot, having procured the land on both sides as the site of a skyscraper, but the owner would not sell, even for \$1,000,000, and the big store had to erect its home around the small building.

TWO WEEK TERM CIVIL COURT TO BE HELD MAY 23

First Week of Civil Court Contains Twenty-two Cases, While Second Week Gets 35

A two week term of Pitt county superior court for the trial of civil cases will convene in this city Monday, May 23. The calendar contains the usual number of cases which have been pending consideration for several weeks, and in many instances, months. There are twenty-two cases on docket for the first week and 35 for the second.

The civil docket has been hopelessly congested at least four years, and contains about six hundred cases in all. The last session over which Judge Devin presided probably proved the most successful in months, and as a consequence numbers of actions were permanently disposed of relieving the situation to no little extent. A number of important cases in which the county is interested will be brought up during the two weeks, and it is generally conceded that more than ordinary interest will prevail throughout the entire term.

It is apparent Germany had rather exchange ultimatum than pay the indemnity. It's not so costly, that's a fact.

Senator Simmons has started his attack against the Emergency tariff bill. If he succeeds in defeating it he will be the favorite of the entire country.

Governor Bickett has been appointed head of the China Relief campaign in North Carolina and is urging every one to contribute as generously as possible. The cause deserves the earnest consideration of every appreciative man and woman, because the lives of millions of human beings are involved. If you haven't given anything get busy and do so before it is too late.

Reports from various parts of the country say that unemployment is on a steady increase in practically all sections, so it is apparent the man that has a good job had better hold to it. The fact will be realized sooner than expected, and when it is the ordinary run of American people will be much more appreciative of wages which they received the past several months.

The United States has received a formal invitation from the Allies to be represented on the Supreme council, the reparations commission and the Council of ambassadors. While it is very kind of the foreigners to propose this, it is hardly probable it will be accepted when it is remembered what kind of reception Mr. Wilson and his followers received after returning from Europe.

Prominent bankers of the nation urge that the strictest economy be observed throughout the country at this time in order that readjustment may come about naturally instead with that air of abnormality that has proven so costly in the past. They believe that an improvement in foreign trade relations will help things along, exceedingly, therefore, it is certain their influence will be thrown that way. The situation is anything but pleasing, but time works wonderful changes, and will certainly do so in this case too.

The plea of hard times seems to be going its rounds throughout the entire nation, but it hasn't prevented the people from keeping pace to educational progress. North Carolina is doing right much along this line now, and indications point to many other ambitious programs before the year is over. Numbers of towns have voted bonds for school improvement, and the fact that they find financiers in New York perfectly willing to float the loans is a very gratifying thing. This may indicate hard times, but it's a mighty strange way of doing it.

The expansion drive of the Chamber of Commerce seems to meeting with much success. In fact, practically all important business men realize it is essential to a progressive community, and mean to do what they can in its interest. The institution has done much in the civic betterment of Greenville the past several months, and it is certain a county-wide organization such as proposed will have far greater influence. The greater the membership the stronger it will be, so everyone should be active and help increase the scope of work.

The resignation of S. B. Underwood as superintendent of Pitt county schools to become head of the Raleigh township school system will be received with keenest regret in this section of the country, as he has made many staunch friends who are proud of his accomplishments. He has been a source of great help in improvement of the schools of Pitt county, and outlined many progressive programs which have been instrumental in rapid growth and almost uninterrupted development. Pitt county today takes first rank in consolidation of school systems owing to his efforts, and as a result facilities have been increased almost twofold. Raleigh is fortunate in its acquisition, for if there is anyone capable of placing its schools on a higher standard it is the man who has done so much for Pitt county and other parts of the country in which he has worked. While still a comparatively young man Mr. Underwood has reached an enviable goal in the educational field, and his record of service has been what may unreservedly be termed as incomparable. Pitt county reluctantly gives him up, but realizing that his opportunity of rendering the state greater service in Raleigh causes even the most regretful to permit him to pass on to the greater field of labor uncomplainingly.

No successor has yet been announced and the school board realizes that it will have a difficult job in appointing one yet it is hoped whoever it may be will perpetuate the excellent principles outlined under Mr. Underwood's administration. Mrs. Underwood also will be missed as she has taken an important part in religious and social welfare of the community. Both have done everything within their power to place the county on a higher plane of civilization, and that they will be an unspeakable loss goes without saying.

A Florida representative has introduced a bill prohibiting certain objectionable dances. Many other sections might do the same thing and be rewarded. Many forms of dances are becoming too immoral and the sooner they are restricted the better off they will be.

The Emergency tariff may be instrumental in lowering prices in this country but that must be proved before people will believe it. Many tariffs have been tried out but we are yet to see where any nations profit by it.

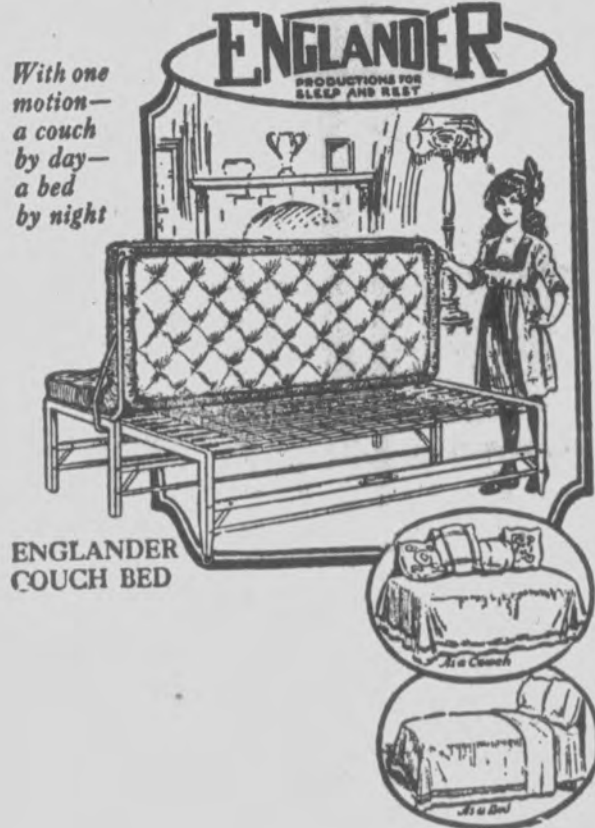
