President Harding some time ago intimated that the South was starving. If he will kindly look over the agricultural standing of each state he may have cause for a change of mind.

The Greenville White Way becomes more of an actuality every day. The contract for material has been awarded, and in course of a few days we may have the pleasure of learning that construction work has been started.

Secretary Weeks claims to have been disappointed with Henry Ford's offer for Muscle Shoals. That's more than the public can say, however, as the secretary may learn if Mr. Ford isn't awarded the project.

Senator Glass of Virginia is amazed at the generosity of the Federal Reserve board and defends action of that body in recent activity. It's to be hoped his support is justified and that generosity of the board will not be confined to Virginia exclusively.

Secretary Weeks probably is afraid Henry Ford will show the government where it made a mistake at Muscle Shoals. That he is right goes without saying. Ford is the kind of man that keeps the world moving, and if Muscle Shoals is capable of producing anything he will certainly bring it out.

North Carolina is becoming one of the greatest agricultural centers of the United States, as Federal reports show the state has taken fourth place in 22 leading crops produced in this country. This is a record everyone should be proud of. It is assurance of starvation is not as near as President Harding would have us believe.

The cotton meeting in New Bern is destined to be of great importance to growers in this section of the state, and will be of even greater benefit in event large delegations from all communities attend. The all world question is truly of great significance, and it is the duty of the farmer to fully consider points involved.

Greenville had the misfortune to lose one of its tobacco warehouses by fire, but it's a safe bet the building will be replaced within the next few months. Greenville market men are progressive in every sense of the word, and the market is bound to grow regardless of unfavorable conditions and occasional setbacks such as the fire certainly was.

The tobacco market continues to hold second position in the standing of bright leaf markets of the world, and may be able to even better the record next season with triple sales in progress. This is one of the greatest tobacco producing regions on earth, and there's no reason in the world why we should not have won first place long ago. The future, however, promises great things, and if everything is favorable, progress will be greater than ever.

It is gratifying to note the triple sale plan has been adopted by Greenville tobacco men for next season. This will greatly increase facilities for handling bright leaf here and place the market in position to dispose of considerably larger volumes than heretofore. The market would have been much greater if the plan had been adopted years ago, but since it has been delayed, we are glad we are to get it, even though sometime will be required to advertise the change.

There would be fewer offenders before the mayor if people would realize that traffic ordinances are enacted to be observed and govern themselves accordingly. Why rational people will persist in doing what is contrary to law when doing so brings them no pleasure but rather expense, is not easy to understand. Not half the automobiles plying the school scene are keeping within the ten mile speed limit as required by a recent ordinance. First thing you know many who are disregarding this law will be facing when they have to go to the mayor's court to answer for the violation.

WHITE WAY FUNDS NEEDED.

Reports indicate that only eighty-five per cent of funds necessary to complete the White Way has been collected by the committee having the proposition in charge, therefore, it is imperative that delinquents pay their part as early as possible and not cause any undue delay in plans.

The White Way system will mean much to the future growth and prosperity of Greenville, and those who subscribed liberally to its cause are to be congratulated upon the splendid spirit exhibited. Practically every town the size of Greenville is not the place it should be without adequate lighting systems, such as the White Way affords, and we have made a great stride towards continued growth in establishing the creditable system.

It is to be regretted, however, that Dickinson avenue is not to be included in the system, and it is hoped property owners and residents along this street will realize what they are losing and subscribe sufficient funds to make the system possible. The committee made every effort to include the street, but failed to receive proper encouragement and were forced to give up in despair.

The benefit Greenville is to derive from the White Way cannot be summed up in terms of dollars and cents, in fact, its intrinsic value cannot be estimated at this time, and the future alone will show exactly what bearing it will have upon continued growth and expansion of the city. Those behind in subscriptions should pay up immediately, and let the committee have the consolation of knowing it is one hundred per cent strong erea before construction work is begun.

IMPORTATION OF LUXURIES DECLINING.

Even the importers of luxuries are reducing materially the sums of money which they are sending out of the country for the classes of articles which may be properly included under that term "luxuries." Taking 50 principal imported articles or groups of articles usually included under that general title, it appears that their value in 1921 totals only \$330,000,000 as against \$525,000,000 in 1920, an apparent reduction of about 37 per cent in the amount of money sent out of the country for luxuries in 1921 when compared with 1920.

This fall in importation of luxuries says the Trade Record of the National City Bank of New York, is due in part to smaller quantities of the articles brought in and in some cases to lower prices, though in this class a merchandise reduction in price comes more slowly than in many other classes of articles imported, especially manufacturing materials and foodstuffs, which show a much larger fall in prices than do the finished articles and especially those classed as luxuries. In automobiles imported, for example, the number brought in to the country in the 11 months ending with November, 1921, is only 498 against 853 in the same months of the preceding year; plushes and velvets of cotton 304,000 yards against 955,000 in the same months of last year; silk plushes and velvets 226,000 pounds against 354,000; tapestries 2,726,000 square yards against 8,897,000; lace curtains 900,000 square yards against 1,2382,000; crude meerschaum for use in manufacture of pipes 1,731 pounds against

13,386; patent leather 56,408 pounds against 104,908; silk ribbons 6,508 yards against 10,762; marble and onyx 368,000 cubic feet against 416,000; confections 768,000 pounds against 1,084,000; undressed furs and fur skins 68,670,000 against 127,980,000; feathers and downs 2,000,000 pounds against 3,500,000; leaf tobacco 47,979,000 pounds against 78,848,000; platinum, unmanufactured 41,000 ounces against 56,000; mother of pearl shells 2,830,000 pounds against 7,468,000; buttons of pearl or shell 1,303,000 gross against 4,992,000; uncut diamonds 34,000 carats against 119,000 and diamonds cut but not set 239,000 carats against 292,000 in the corresponding months of 1920. From the above statement showing the reduction in the quantities imported of certain articles usually classed as luxuries in the eleven months of 1921 when compared with the corresponding months of 1920, it is apparent that the actual quantity of "luxuries" being brought into the United States has been materially, in many cases very materially, reduced. In those articles in which it is not possible to state quantities, there is also an equally large reduction in the stated values of the imports. Taking the great group, artworks, for example, the total for the 11 months of 1921 is \$18,764,000 against \$25,763,000 in the same months of last year; beads and bead ornaments \$8,073,000 against \$11,983,000.

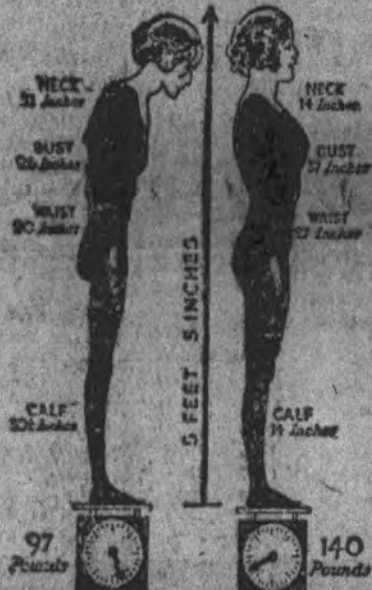

Resolved: it is the sense of this meeting that we advise the farmers that in our best judgment the crop of Tobacco should not be increased, but where possible should be reduced. The conditions at present demand a curtail in acreage, and over-production means low prices, and the resultant effect will be that no farmer would realize a profit for the 1922 crop.

In this connection we strongly advise all farmers to exert every effort to raise a crop of good tobacco, quality and not quantity will certainly count from now on.

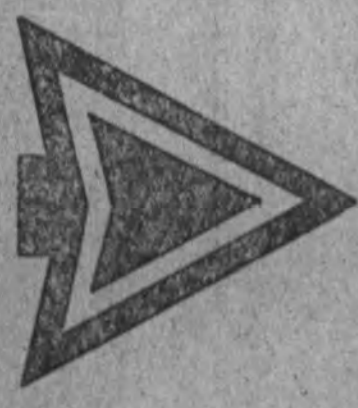

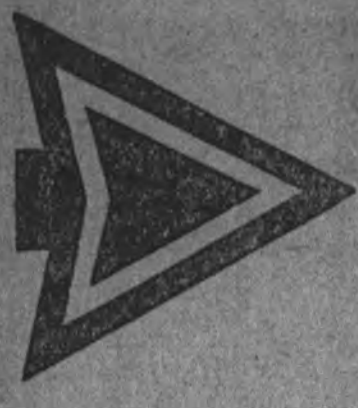

RULES FOR SUBMITTING INQUIRIES TO INTERNAL REVENUE DEPARTMENT

Collectors of internal revenue, internal revenue agents in charge, officials and employees of the bureau of internal revenue and others concerned:

Requests are being received daily for rulings and advice upon abstract cases or prospective transactions involving questions of income tax and credits liability. These requests are so numerous and the insistence on prompt action so great that it seems advisable at this time definitely to outline the Bureau's policy which will govern the consideration of these requests.

The revenue acts of 1918 and 1921 depart widely at many points from prior law or practice, and have given rise to new questions of such importance, complexity, and number that the resources of the Bureau are no more than adequate to advise taxpayers promptly of their present liabilities arising out of past transactions. It is impossible to answer every question which the invention or ingenuity of the inquirer may devise without neglecting the fundamental duty of determining tax liability upon the basis of actual happenings. Under these circumstances, the administrative necessity is obvious of giving precedence over abstract or prospective cases to actual cases in which the taxpayer desires to know what are his immediate liabilities under the law.

It will be the policy of the Bureau not to answer any inquiry except under the following circumstances:

- (a) The transaction must be completed and not merely proposed or planned.
- (b) The complete facts relating to the transaction, together with abstracts from contracts, or other documents, necessary to present the complete facts, must be given.
- (c) The names of all the real parties interested (not "dummies" used in the transaction) must be stated regardless of who present the question, whether attorney, accountant, tax service, or other representative.

THE GOV. SETS ASIDE MONDAY, FEBRUARY 6TH FOR JEWISH RELIEF

Governor Morrison Issues Proclamation Looking to Relief of Suffering Jews.

Governor Cameron Morrison yesterday issued a proclamation setting apart the week beginning Monday 6th and ending Sunday, February 12th, as Jewish Relief Week in North Carolina. During this time, the Jews of the State, through the permanent relief organization perfected at a meeting of prominent Jews of the State here last week, will put on a campaign for \$150,000 to relieve the suffering and aid in the rehabilitation of the Jews of Eastern Europe.

Lionel Weil of Goldsboro, is head of the organization perfected in this State, and already the movement for the relief of the suffering peoples of Europe is under way. It is not merely relief that is proposed but rehabilitation.

Here is the Governor's proclamation, issued at the request of the Jewish State organization:

A Proclamation

Whereas, there is great suffering among the Jewish people of Europe, thousands of whom are reported as being entirely destitute and in a dying condition, due to the lack of food and other necessities; and

Whereas, our own land has been blessed with a prosperity that not only guarantees our own safety but which enables us, and should impel us, to share our bounties with our less fortunate fellow human beings in other lands; now,

Therefore, I, Cameron Morrison, Governor of North Carolina, do hereby set apart by this proclamation, the week beginning Monday, February 6th, and ending Sunday, February 12th, as Jewish Relief Week: I ask that all newspapers of the State give wide publicity to this week, devoted to such a worthy cause; and I especially ask that on Sunday, February 5th, notice be given in all the churches that the following week will be observed as Jewish Relief Week, and that the ministers, Sunday school superintendents and teachers, and others, urge their people to seize this opportunity of helping the suffering and contribute to the relief of these worthy distressed people so far as their means of relief will permit.

In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State to be affixed.

Done at our City of Raleigh, this sixteenth day of January, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-two, and in the one hundred and forty-sixth year of our American Independence.

Just to remind you that this is prayer meeting night in the churches. M. W. A. meet tonight.
