

VIRGINIA GOVERNOR MAY ORDER TROOPS IN TROLLEY STRIKE

Governor Trinkle Faced by One of the Most Serious Situations Since Strike Started

DECLARES DISORDERS AT PORTSMOUTH MUST BE STOPPED AT ONCE

Strikers Throw Bricks at Workmen and Place Obstruction on Tracks of the Company Lines

Richmond, Feb. 3.—Governor Trinkle may be appealed to for troops by the Virginia Railway and Power company, it was learned here today. Officials said that unless disorder at Portsmouth ceases immediately troops will be necessary in protecting their property.
Efforts at operating cars where the trouble has been in progress for three weeks have been attended by trouble. Bricks have been shied at workmen and tracks obstructed in such way as to seriously threaten the lives of passengers.

Bethel, N. C., Feb. 3.—Our community is delighted with the road work being done on the road from here to Williamston, Mr. J. P. Discus, of Birmingham, Ala. recently began the grading of this road, beginning at the end of Church street, and will work from here to Williamston. He has three forces at work on the road. One about one mile out of town, another near Robersonville and the third about half way between these two camps. Mr. Discus expects to complete this work in about six months. When completed this will be one of the states' best roads and will be a most valuable link in the road to Norfolk and all points north east of here.

They are beginning the first of these which is over a large canal just outside the town limits. It is planned to complete this bridge work in possibly four or five months.

Mr. Corey is most enthusiastic for the warehouse proposition and for a larger crop of sweet potato for Pitt county. ALDERMEN DISCUSS PROPOSED WIDENING OF DICKINSON AVE.

Fire Fighting Equipment Also Discussed Without Any Definite Action Taken

The board of aldermen in regular session here last night were expected to take some action regarding the proposal to widen Dickinson avenue and the purchase of additional fire equipment, but nothing of any definite nature was accomplished.
The proposal to widen Dickinson avenue, however, received considerable discussion and a committee was appointed to confer with property owners relative to getting petitions signed in the matter. It was agreed that the street needed widening, but property owners must first sign the petition agreeing to bear their part of expenses incurred in the improvement.

The matter will be taken up again at a meeting of the board next Friday night, and in the meantime the committee will get in touch with property owners must first sign the petition and presenting them to the board at the next meeting.

Additional equipment for the fire department in all probability will be taken up from time to time, and the committee having the matter in charge is expected to report some decision in the near future. Two kinds of equipments are under consideration, and the committee has been unable to determine exactly which is the most necessary.

SOVIET LABOR DISPUTES ENDED BY MONEY-PRESS

New York.—A Bolshevik labor dispute in Russia, when printers running on paper money for the government struck for higher wages, was settled by an agreement that each printer should be entitled to the amount of money he could turn out in one hour each day, according to William B. Lippard, associate secretary of the American Baptists' Foreign Mission society, who has just returned from Europe.
The notes could not be of higher denomination than 500 rubles.

POLITICAL BREAK PREDICTED AMONG LEADING PARTIES

WOULD GIVE SOLDIERS WORK BUILDING HOSPITALS

Washington.—Hospitals for wounded veterans of the world war is the proposal made here by Director Forbes of the veteran's bureau.

The director made his proposal in connection with the \$10,000,000 construction program provided in the Langley bill now in congress. Director Forbes declared such a move would materially relieve the unemployment situation.

There are enough veterans of the world war now out of employment to furnish an army of constructors to carry out any building plan contemplated, said Forbes. Among the veterans out of work are mechanics of every line, draughtsmen, men from every one of the building trades and plenty of live wire executives. We could build every hospital provided in the Langley bill without going outside the ranks of veterans for the necessary workers.

WOMEN FIGHT RULING BY SINGLE SAM ON PASSPORTS

(By International News.)
The department of State says No. Some influential literary women say Yes, and cite a decision of former Chief Justice Chase of the United States supreme court that there was no law compelling a woman to take the family name of her husband and that while she had the privilege of assuming it she was not required to do so.
The State department's answer is based on a moral issue and points out the embarrassment that might be caused if American consul abroad if he were called upon to assist, for instance, a man who is traveling with a woman who does not use his family name yet claims to be married to him. It would make for sorry confusion in the issuance of passports, the State department holds, and therefore, it has refused to grant the request of many women that their maiden names be used in the making out of passports.

But the women have not surrendered. Persistent efforts are still being made by a large number of women—artists, authoresses, actresses and others—to have the State department, in issuing passports, recognize the legal right of married women to travel out of this country their Christian or family name.

Several test cases within the last month have effected no change in the department's attitude.

A typical case was that of a newspaper woman, affiliated with the Lucy Stone league, who applied for a passport under her maiden name, which is also her pen name. She insisted that it was her legal and only name. The State department refused to deviate from the long-established custom, however. The young woman protested vigorously when the passport was presented to her by the department officials, saying that her own name was descriptive of her person and personality, and that she had every legal right to use it as she saw fit. She explained that she had never used her husband's name and is not known by that name.

The question at bar, a statement by the women's league says, is not the number of links it may tie in social customs and usages, but the strength of legal right each individual has in the name he or she bears.

The women have only begun their fight, and the State department is preparing to defend itself against the verbal assault of the amazons.

The women's auxiliary of the American Legion in New York State is represented by 239 units and has a membership of 7,000 women.

Impressive Funeral Exercises Conducted at Immanuel Baptist Church Today at Two O'clock

RALEIGH MINISTER CONDUCTS EXERCISES AT BAPTIST CHURCH

Interment Made in Cherry Hill Cemetery, Attended by Hundreds of Friends

The funeral services of Professor Claude Wayland Wilson, who died suddenly at his home in this city Wednesday night, were conducted from the Immanuel Baptist church this afternoon at two o'clock by Dr. R. T. Vann, of Raleigh, secretary of the Home Mission board of Southern Baptist church and secretary of the Southern Baptist convention. Dr. Vann has been a life long friend of the deceased, and performed his wedding ceremony when he was married to Mrs. Wilson twenty-four years ago.

In the church short talks were made by Dr. Vann on his relation to the church, by Rev. J. C. Aycock as a former pastor; Rev. C. A. Anderson on his relation to Roanoke Association; Dr. R. H. Wright, as his co-laborer in educational work and Mr. J. B. James as a Kiwanian. These all bore highest tribute to the deceased.

The funeral was attended by a large concourse of citizens, the faculty and student body of the Eastern Baptist churches and secretary of bars and relatives of the bereaved family, prominent men and women from every section of the state, the Greenville Masonic lodges and the Kiwanis club. The services were of a very impressive nature and bore a fitting tribute to one who has given his entire life to the uplifting of the educational, religious and social life of the state.

After services at the grave the funeral cortege moved on to Cherry Hill cemetery where short services were conducted at the grave, and hundreds paid a last tribute to the mortal remains of one who has meant so much to people in every walk of life.

Half an hour before the funeral the students of the East Carolina Teachers college assembled in the auditorium where Dr. R. T. Vann conducted short but impressive memorial exercises. The services were very touching as Professor Wilson was held in the highest esteem and dearly beloved by all the students. He possessed those Christian attributes and fatherly ministrations which won for him a great place in the hearts of all who knew him.

Considering the results of the armament conference and the price the government had to pay, it begins to look like the United States is again the goat of strong headed politicians.

President Harding is keeping quiet about the success of the armament conference, as he is as disappointed as other members of the party looking for something entirely different from what they got.

Western farmers are planning to plant usual acreage this year, but intend to reduce expenses along other lines. While this may be all right where a few farmers are affected, it does not apply favorably to the majority. Pitt county farmers must reduce acreage, or suffer. The alternative is entirely with them.

The appointment of many more negroes to responsible positions by President Harding should result in a Democratic landslide next election. No party can expect to survive under such conditions, and unless the Republicans change their style of doing things they will go out quicker than they came in.

Those behind in subscriptions to the white way should pay up immediately so the committee will be able to meet its obligations when material for the project begins to arrive. The new system will be one of the best in the country, and Greenville people should be sufficiently proud of it to help the committee pay up and not be caused any embarrassment.

Instead of believing everything they hear the public should do everything possible to help members of the police department enforce the law. No official feels like doing his best when he believes the majority of people are always ready to criticize him severely everytime somebody brings charges against him and unless supported no one can demand efficient services.

It is stated now that President Harding is preparing to select a negro lawyer from West Virginia as recorder of deeds. What does the man mean anyway? Think of insulting the country again after he was so severely censured for appointing a negro as register of deeds in the District of Columbia. These kind of nominations may appeal to certain class of people, but to respectable Americans the president's action is repulsive indeed. He is strangely lacking when it comes to fulfilling promises of the campaign.

The Reflector is making an effort to give its readers all the news while it is news, but this is impossible unless the public keeps us informed concerning certain minor happenings which we would never get unless informed by some one. It is a matter of impossibility for a paper to get every little item, but it can be greatly assisted if the persons knowing of anything should tell it to us. Get the habit. If you know anything pass it on to us, and have the pleasure of reading it the same day you tell us.

It begins to look like Henry Ford will get the nitrate plant at Muscle Shoals after all, but if recommendations of Secretary Weeks have anything to do with it conditions of the bargain will be entirely different. Mr. Ford could make the plant the greatest in the country if conditions of the deal are favorable, but if he is to be hampered by a thousand minor recommendations such as Weeks has presented he can never develop the project as desired.

Pitt county farmers were impressed by the great part which storage warehouses are playing in preserving the sweet potato crop in Edgecombe and Nash counties, and it is probable their recent visit to Rocky Mount will result in the erection of similar houses in this county. The production of sweet potatoes made many a section prosperous and there is no reason in the world why it should not mean the same to this section. It is certain the cotton and tobacco crop must be curtailed this year, and the farmer who plants plenty of sweet potatoes and other food crops will be the one to enjoy prosperity despite ravages of the boll weevil or another pest.

A MEDDLESOME CRITIC.

The Reflector's morning contemporary is as quarrelsome and meddlesome as some unsophisticated child, who, not having sufficient experience to know right from wrong, is forever picking a fuss with others who happen to be more liberal in their views and show a disposition of doing the right thing by everyone, regardless of conditions.

This contemporary now comes out and directly charges this paper with not having the public good at heart because we failed to devote our entire editorial page in demanding an investigation of the charges launched against members of the police department by Lucile Pollock, woman of the underworld.

It is very evident by the editorial that the writer isn't able to distinguish the difference between a news story and an editorial, as he discussed both and severely criticized us because both did not demand an investigation of the charges, which Mayor Clark declared do not deserve investigation unless supported by testimony other than the woman presented.

For the benefit of our contemporary, we would like to inform him that editorial columns are supposed to reflect the sentiment of the paper, while the news columns reflects the news as the public sees it. Our news article dealt entirely with facts presented by Mayor D. M. Clark and Chief of Police Lester Jones, and there was no personal sentiment expressed. "That's news," buddy—not altogether "views" as you seem to think and it might be to the benefit of your paper to publish more "news" instead of so much of the underworld stuff.

This paper is in favor of an investigation if Mayor Clark finds such such advisable. He is the head of our government and represents the people, and should he find sufficient evidence to justify a proof, why we say go to it. But, until further evidence is presented kindly give the integrity of our officers some consideration, and not take the word of a woman of the underworld for granted.

Again, let us repeat—we favor an investigation, but for the sake of decent people, let the newspapers keep so much of the contaminating stuff out of their columns until the guilt of the officers has been established.

The proposal to increase efficiency of the Greenville fire department through the purchase of additional fire fighting equipment will meet with

the hearty approval of every business man. Increased equipment has been necessary for several past years, but condition of the treasury has prevented purchases up to the present time. Enormous sums of money are invested in tobacco town, and this property is daily jeopardized by the lack of proper fire fighting equipment in that section. Two fire stations for a town the size of Greenville isn't too much, and would insure the safety of men who have spent lavishly to make our tobacco market what it is today. The town certainly should show enough appreciation to give adequate fire protection.

Conditions have become so grave in Russia that many people are reported to have resorted to cannibalism as the last effort to satisfy pangs of hunger. This is the most terrible state of affairs that has faced civilization in years, and unless something is done Russia is doomed. Press correspondents forced to remain in that section to keep the world informed have had an opportunity of observing the seriousness of the situation, and urges those more fortunately situated to give as liberally as possible. It's to be hoped they will be listened to, and that people in this country will not be guilty of forgetting the duty owed humanity.

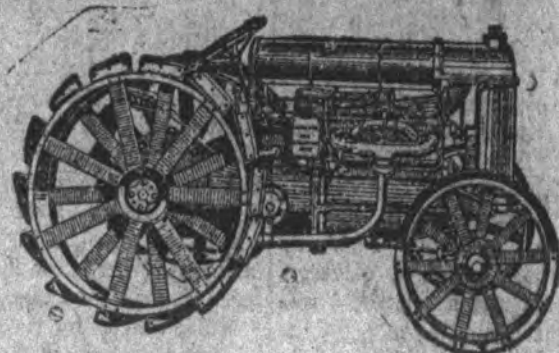

Thousands of Jews are starting in Russia and Eastern Europe, and unless they are giving aid by the American people the situation is destined to be even more serious. Pitt county's apportionment is \$1,000. The amount is small in proportion to the great prosperity which the section has enjoyed, and those who fail to give won't be doing the right thing by humanity.

Josephus Daniels says the five power naval treaty will be worth the price if it results in world peace, but like everybody else the former secretary of the navy has serious doubts about the issue. World peace can come through the league of nations alone, and all the treaties under the sun won't be able to better conditions if the league had been accepted at first the conference would not have been advisable and the nation would have been saved thousands of dollars.

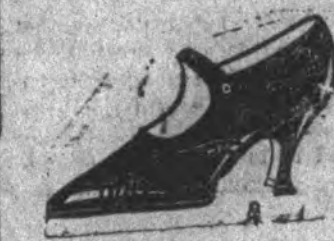

STATES REPORT MORE THAN \$165,000 FOR FIRST WEEK.

The first week of the campaign to establish the Woodrow Wilson Foundation marks a long step towards the attainment of the goal. With returns far from complete, the reports from fifteen states showed that more than \$165,000 had been raised in the first six days in these states alone. In the other states the returns at hand were too scattering to give any accurate estimate of the week's results.

This result is encouraging. When it is considered that most of this sum was raised in small contributions from persons of modest means, it is even more striking. The amount represents the expression of faith of thousands of men and women in the ideals that Mr. Wilson upheld.

The movement will go on until everyone who wishes it has had the opportunity to participate in the founding of the Woodrow Wilson Awards. In some of the states there seems to have arisen the impression that the campaign was confined to a single week. On the contrary, the canvass will continue until the fund is raised and until each state has attained its quota.

Even when a state has raised its proportion of the total amount and

there still remain other citizens of that state who wish to take part in the establishment of the Foundation, there will be no bar to the continuance of receiving gifts.

For each state to reach its quota is simply a question of organization. The response that has met our appeal, coming from every section of the country and from men and women in every walk of life has convinced us that there is a widespread, deep-seated, burning enthusiasm for this undertaking. It remains for those in charge of the organization in each state to provide the means for the expression of this sentiment.

Telegrams of condolence from all over North Carolina and other states have been received by the grief-stricken family, while a large number of floral designs also attested the large number of friends the deceased had.

The following expression of appreciation was issued at the East Carolina Teachers college this afternoon:

The death of Prof. C. W. Wilson on the evening of February 1, comes as a shock not only to College and community in which he worked but to the whole state. His continuous service with this institution since its foundation has caused all to think of him as an inseparable part of it. As secretary to the board of trustees he was a link between the board and the faculty, and as chairman of the appointment committee he was a link between the college and the children this school is trying to help.

His ability as an executor was shown in many years, but chiefly as director of the summer school. He knew how to direct others, whether teachers or students, through careful leadership. He never asked others to do what he was unwilling to do himself.

As a teacher he literally gave himself to his classes. He was an indefatigable and a scrupulously painstaking worker, a good student, and a conscientious critic. His friendly, sympathetic, unprejudiced criticism won many friends in the class room. He was not afraid of theories, but he cared for no theory that could not be made practical.

His application of the golden rule in teaching gave him a hold on his students that few teachers are privileged to claim.

One of the chief factors in his success as a man, in whatever he undertook, was co-operation. His associates in his profession were always glad to work with him singly, in committees, or in large organizations because of his fair-mindedness and willingness to study a problem from all view-points. He never permitted

his better judgment to be influenced by his personal feelings. In a broad way he associated himself with many organizations in order that he might have the opportunity of working with others for the good of his fellow-man.

His high ideals manifested themselves in every phase of his life: in his unselfish devotion to duty; in his passionate love for the children of North Carolina; in his religious convictions, which were bound by no particular creed, sect or denomination, but were as broad and as inclusive as the spirit and principles of Christianity; and in his deep abiding love for home and family. There was in his life a love for all mankind. He had the human touch which made him a brother to everybody. Commensurate strangers came to him for advice, and those who knew him best advised with him as with a father.

He will be sorely missed by the students whom he had taught; by his colleagues with whom he had labored so earnestly to promote right ideals of living; by his family who had enjoyed and rightly prized, for so long, his loving Christian companionship; and by the state that loses one of its best and noblest teachers and citizens. It is good to know that the ideals for which he stood will live forever.

CANADIAN STATES ARE FIRST IN GRAIN-GROWING

Winnipeg, Man. — For five years Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta had won the championship of North America in oats and for four years barley. These victories are pointed out in a recent government report on agriculture in the prairie provinces. In 1916 at the International Soil

Products Exposition at El Paso, Tex., Alberta won the international sweepstakes in oats, and in 1917, when the exposition was held at Peoria, Ill., the premier honor was divided by Manitoba and Saskatchewan, while Alberta ran second. In 1918, when the international exposition was held at Kansas City, Manitoba carried off the first three prizes in oats, as well as the sweepstakes. In 1919 J. C. Lucas, of Cayley, Alta., won the championship and repeated in 1920 at the International Livestock and Grain Show at Chicago.

In the past five years Alberta has won the oats championship twice, Manitoba once, Saskatchewan once and Alberta and Saskatchewan have divided it once. Never once has it left Western Canada.

Western Canadian barley has won the championship at the International Dry Farming congress at Lethbridge, Alta.; Tulsa, Okla., Wichita Falls, Tex., and Kansas City for the last four successive years Manitoba carried off the first three prizes in barley in 1918.
