

BEGIN CAMPAIGN AGAINST WEEVIL IN THIS COUNTY

Farm Department Shows First Pictures in Campaign Against Weevil at Lang's School House.

WELFARE DEPARTMENT ALSO SHOWING CHARTS OF BETTER FARM LIFE

Children at Various Schools Are to Be Instructed in Public Health Problems.

The campaign against the boll weevil and unfavorable living conditions of the farm to be waged by W. B. Pace, director of the county agricultural department and K. T. Futrell, of the welfare department, got well under way this week, and will be waged vigorously until conditions are greatly improved.

The campaign was carried into the Frog Level district yesterday, and yesterday afternoon the Frog Level school house was packed to its capacity by interested people despite unfavorable weather conditions.

Lang's school house will be visited by the two county officers this afternoon, where charts will be shown and tonight pictures dealing with the boll weevil campaign and community problems will be on program.

The same kind of program will be followed in each community to be visited within the next few months, and it is expected great good will be accomplished, especially in the effort to improve community life.

The charts show the school children are of a particularly interesting character and present various ways of improving the health. The value of milk in keeping the child healthy and strong is also concluded in the charts, while the urgent need of campaigns against the fly is also depicted.

NEGRO SHOTS WOMAN AND KILLS HIMSELF

Washington, March 3.—D. Rose, colored man employed by street paving forces in this city, shot and precariously injured Mary Campbell also colored and then killed himself in an altercation occurring at the woman's home on Telfair street this afternoon. The bullet fired at the woman passed through her abdomen, and penetrated the liver. The man fired three bullets into his head, death being instantaneous.

The woman was rushed to a local hospital where her condition was found to be precarious, and it is probable she may die before night.

800 GALLONS BEER POURED OUT NEAR AYDEN THURSDAY

MUSCLE SHOALS TO HAVE INFLUENCE IN FERTILIZER PRICE

Former Congressman of North Carolina Tells Congress of What Project Offers Country.

Washington, March 3.—Government property at Muscle Shoals, if properly developed and operated, will have a tremendous influence in lessening the cost of living, former Senator Butler of North Carolina, told the house military committee in support of the bid of Frederic Engstrom.

This offer, he said proposed to devote the southern project entirely to the production of nitrates and finished fertilizer which will give the farmer lower prices and relieve the depression in agriculture.

CONFERENCE FINDS DIRECT SOLUTIONS IN CABLE QUESTION

Atlantic Cable Problem at Last to be Settled by Plan to be Presented in Next Few Days.

(By International News.)

Washington, March 3.—Solution of the Atlantic cable problem, which for more than a year has perplexed international communications at the conference in dealing with allocation of former German cables, has been found, it was learned from an official source today.

This plan will probably be presented to the conference within the next three days, it was stated, and it is expected the issue will then be settled. The plan contemplates construction by Italy of a cable from Rome to Genoa through the Mediterranean, connecting with a transatlantic line at Azores.

No provision is contained for turning over Italy, Brst, Azores, and New York cables now operated by France. Consensus opinion is that under present assignment of lines there is ample facilities for all.

PERSHING TO ASSIST PRESIDENT IN EFFORT TO PREVENT ARMY CUT

Washington, March 3.—General Pershing will aid the president in preventing congress from cutting the regular army to a hundred and fifteen thousand men. He informed the president that the army should not be reduced below a hundred and fifty thousand at least.

TEN AIRPLANES REACH KEY WEST IN SAFETY

Key West, March 3.—Accompanied by a destroyer and tender ten naval airplanes arrived at the air station here today. The station had recently been abandoned, but will hereafter be used as quarters for the planes.

JAMES MANNING STILL SUFFERING FROM INJURIES

The many friends of James Manning, son of Mr. J. A. Manning, who was injured in an automobile accident several days ago, will regret that his condition is still quite serious. The young fellow suffered a broken collar bone in the accident, and was apparently improving until two or three days ago when his condition grew worse.

LLOYD GEORGE MAY RESIGN WEDNESDAY SAYS LONDON PAPER

London, March 3.—Lloyd George will present his resignation to King George Wednesday unless assured of the undivided support of members of the Commons, according to a story carried by the Evening Standard. It is reported that the king has already asked Austen Chamberlain to accept the position in event Lloyd George decides to retire.

NO DEVELOPMENTS OCCUR IN PROBE OF N'TL BANK ROBBERY

Policeman Whichard Still Dealing With Case, but No Other Arrests Have Been Made

Policeman J. Whichard, who has been engaged in rounding up colored boys connected with the robbery of \$500 from the National Bank of this city, stated this morning that no new developments had taken place and that he is expecting to make other arrests at any moment.

The five boys arrested the first of the week are still being held in jail awaiting final hearing in superior court, with the exception of one or two who have been released under bond. The little negroes still refuse to divulge anything regarding the robbery, but extend the money found in their possession was given them by the boy suspected of the robbery.

Mr. Whichard thought one time that a considerable amount of the stolen money would be recovered, but so far only a few dollars have been found in possession of those suspected of complicity. However, different clues are being diligently followed, and the culprit may be divulged at any moment.

HARDING SETS NEW RECORD IN GIVING PRISONERS PARDONS

Chief Executive Outclasses Lincoln and Wilson in First Year of Administration.

(By International News.) Washington, March 3.—President Harding in his first year at the White House, which ends tomorrow, has become one of the three greatest pardon-presidents in history of the nation.

In opening penitentiary doors to federal prisoners the president already ranks alongside of Lincoln and Wilson, and if the same place in maintained throughout his four years term it is certain he will set a new record in peace time pardons at the White House.

Altogether since March 4, 1921 the president has extended executive clemency to more than three hundred prisoners. In twenty-three cases full pardons were granted.

TENNESSEE FARMER SLAYS HIS FATHER FOLLOWING FIGHT

Nashville, March 3.—Marvin Whitson was jailed at Gallatin, Tennessee, today, charged by the police with slaying his father, a wealthy farmer residing near here, according to authorities. Whitson is said to have used a club in killing his parent. He surrendered to police authorities immediately after committing the crime, which resulted from a fight.

HARDING TO PRESENT AMENDMENT TO THE COMPENSATION BILL

Washington, March 3.—Governor Harding, chief of the Federal Reserve system, has prepared an amendment to the compensation bill providing acceptance of insurance certificate only by national banks. State banks and trust companies are to prevent loan sharks from buying loss from veterans.

M'GRAW MAKING NO CLAIMS IN THE 1922 PENANT RACE

Winner of Seven National Flags is Silent, But His Team Shapes Up Very Well

New York.—John McGraw is sitting pretty behind a world's championship ball club plus the off-season addition of Heinis Groh, ex-star of the Cincinnati Reds yet he is making no rash prediction that might be construed as mentioning the Giants and the 1922 National League pennant in the same breath. John wants it pretty generally known that he is not that kind of a monkey wrench.

Ask any baseball man what he thinks of the National League race this year and he'll crook his index finger in your buttonhole and begin to tell you in a confidential shout that the Giants will take walk to the flag. Not so McGraw.

On the subject of pennants he has become as wary as a tax dodger and not without reason. In all, McGraw has won seven pennants at the head of the Giants, starting with the 1908 championship outfit and ending with the team that came from the surreptitious rear to nip the Pirates at the wire last year.

Those Sour Tastes. But sour as a tenor's falsetto lingers a taste in the region of his soft palate a constant reminder of the fact that he started the 1914 and 1919 seasons with prospective pennant winners and finished with much the same. They never got beyond the prospective stage, in spite of the fact that they were supposed to be the class of the National League. It was merely a case of the records proving otherwise.

Wherefore, McGraw has decided to win no more pennants in mid-Winter, and if approached on the subject will do quite a lot of talking with his mouth shut.

He discourages dall talk of pennants during the off season while he was waiting around New York for the racing season to get a running start in Cuba; he avoided the issue whenever expedient if a conversation of the sort started in Havana and before he left to meet his players at the San Antonio rendezvous he confided to a friend that he meant to do the same among his men.

GREENVILLE IS SOON TO HAVE RESIDENT FLORAL ENTERPRISE

Dr. E. P. Spence to Erect Two Acres of Plant on Third Street in Front of Home.

EXPERT FLORIST TO BE IN CHARGE OF THE ESTABLISHMENT SOON

Construction Work on New Buildings to Be Started Within Next Several Days.

It will be of interest to the people of Greenville to know that the town is soon to have a resident florist, the name of the new concern is the Greenville Floral Company. The location of their greenhouses will be on the property of Dr. E. P. Spence on Third street, across from his residence.

Dr. Spence advised that he has awarded the contracts for building the greenhouses which will be the most up to date to be found in eastern North Carolina. They will have approximately two acres of land which is well adapted to growing flowers being a hillside with a southern exposure and a good clay subsoil. The company proposes to grow bulbs and shrubbery also.

Dr. Spence stated this morning that construction work on the greenhouses will begin within the next few days, or as soon as the property can be cleared and placed in condition, and in all probability will be completed and get everything in road mer.

The new enterprise will be under the supervision of an expert florist, who has had experience with some of the largest establishments of the country. He will move to Greenville shortly before the greenhouses are completed and get everything in readiness for the opening.

Dr. Spence is well known in this section of the state, having practiced dentistry in this city the past four years. He is a native of Goldsboro, a graduate of the Southern Dental College, and very popular in the social and business circles of Greenville.

This is a business that our town has needed for a long time and we predict for it a success from the beginning.

YOUNG MURDERER TO BE EXECUTED IN CHICAGO TODAY

Attorney for Harvey Church Make Final Effort to Stay Execution For Ten Days.

He will be executed while seated in the chair. The young fellow was still in a state of coma at noon today.

That the boll weevil will visit this community this summer is not to be doubted and the farmer that wants to beat the pest at its own game had better get busy and to like agricultural departments advise. The weevil didn't prove a joke to other communities, and it's a safe bet he won't in this.

Congressman Herrick, of Oklahoma is accused of taking a "snooze" during President's Harding's recent address before congress. Nobody can blame him for that. It looks like the entire Republican party has been asleep and is just waking to important issues at hand.

Greenville people should appreciate the spirit behind Fremont and Belhaven decision to play the championship game of basketball here, as it goes to show they like the town and believe the people will insist on fair playing. The game tonight will largely determine the trend of the championship race, and the success of both towns is at stake.

Rumors concerning the resignation of Lloyd George of England are going their rounds in this country and England too, but the majority of people over here are hoping they are nothing more than rumors. The resignation of this great leader would be a disaster which England would be long in recovering, and its statesmen have the country at heart they will insist upon Mr. George retaining his position. Europe can't afford changes of this kind when so much depends on the action of her statesmen, and unless something is done to prevent the impending calamity the future is very dark indeed.

That the Eastern Carolina chamber of commerce is destined to play an important part in the industrial and commercial development of the thirty-nine counties in this part of the state is quite evident, and it is up to the public to do whatever it can to support the institution. The resources of these counties are unbounded, and by proper advertisement and development, will be made of far greater value than ever before. This institution embraces the strength of every chamber of commerce in every town and city of the thirty odd counties involved, and this is evidence enough that it has sufficient influence to accomplish great things. The officers, at least the head officers, of the organization reside in Greenville, and it is up to Pitt county people to support them in every way possible.

The meeting to be held at the Carolina club tonight looking to our participation in the Eastern Carolina league should be well attended, as a summer without baseball is something the average citizen doesn't like to contemplate. Greenville can support baseball without any great outlay of money, and the town and its people would certainly derive greater benefit from money spent in this diversion than anything else. With Farmville making an effort to join the league, it is all the more necessary that Greenville join. The two towns would derive great pleasure from the experience during the dull summer months, and the spirit of competition will prove beneficial to both. If you are in favor of baseball, be at the meeting tonight and throw your weight into the campaign.

The announcement that Greenville is to have a permanent florist with over two acres of plant will be received with general interest throughout the city, as it is an industry the town has needed for years. Dr. E. P. Spence is to be congratulated upon the venture. That he will meet with success is not to be doubted in the least, as hundreds of dollars leave Greenville annually for flowers.

Republicans thought they had an easy job when they first went into office, but the bonus question has firmly convinced them that they have a hard road to travel. The entire party at this time is in a quandary as to what course to pursue in the important matter, and may be even months before a final decision is reached. They should make provisions for disabled veterans, but conditions are so bad at this time and taxation so high that it might prove advisable to postpone the bonus for those in jobs and able to take care of themselves.
