BARTLETT RESIGNS SECRETARY OF GEORGIA CHAMBER

(Continued from page one.) stated that a committee in charge of this would be ready to announce something definite in a day or two. Has Made Great Record. Mr. Bartlett was elected secretary of the Chamber of Commerce here in 1916, after he had been principal of the Dublin High School for several years. While he was new in the work, he very soon developed strong executive ability, and within a year had come to be a very valuable man. He has been re-elected since then, and was elected this year, also.

Develops Markets

His work in developing diversified markets as well as diversified crops in Laurens county has been especially the big feature of his work as secretary of the commercial organization here. When he took charge, the diversified crop idea was just beginning to take hold in Laurens. The first work on diversified crops has been done, but the marketing side of problems had not been touched. Mr. Bartlett began at once to agitate markets to handle all the farm produce a farmer could raise, and turn it into cash any day in the year. He was one of the leaders, if not the first man in the state, in arranging co-operative sales of hogs, cattle, corn, and other products. This was among the first he took up. A few months later he broached the idea of a stockyard for Dublin. Such was unthought of here, but Mr. Bartlett let preach the principle, of provide the market and the farmers will supply it. He negotiated this matter so strongly that a stock yard was finally established, and it proved a success from the very first. It is still going strong, and Dublin's livestock market is today said to be the highest market in the entire state. Along with the stockyard, the same corporation built a sweet potato curing house, the first one ever erected in this section of Georgia. It has now grown until it is a big industry in itself, with a new building separate from the stockyards now, of large capacity.

He absolutely ruled out of the arena, with the logic of plain common-sense plus the Bible, every excuse by which men hope to be relieved of Christ.

Men say, "I can't understand the Bible and unravel its mysteries." Dr. Matthis declared that the very excuse proved that the Bible was the mind of God, and that 99 out of every 100 who offered such an excuse, were utterly ignorant of the Bible and had no right to expect to understand it.
