MANY COAL MINES IN PENNSYLVANIA MAY BE ABANDONED

Steel Concerns Find New Kind of Coke Field in West Virginia.

(By International News.) Pittsburgh, Pa., May 2.—Some of the coal mines and coke ovens which have been closed down in the Connellsville region by the strike of the non-union miners may never be reopened.

The big steel companies declare they can get abundant and permanent supplies of coal from West Virginia and Kentucky fields which will meet all their requirements.

The perfection of the by-product coke oven and its general adoption throughout the steel industry during and since the war is said to play an important role in this new situation.

It is claimed that the batteries of by-product ovens, which are constructed at or near the steel mills, are rapidly replacing the old and wasteful beehive ovens at the coal mines.

It is also pointed out that while the by-product oven is a permanent installation and contributes many useful products to the sciences and arts, in addition to furnishing ample supplies of coke for the steel works, the beehive ovens at the mines make

Elias King, Colored Draws two Years to Roads for Robbing Cafe.

OTHER DEFENDENTS DRAW TERMS RANGING FROM 6 TO 12 MONTHS

Assault with Deadly Weapon and Whiskey Cases also Featured Hearing.

Elisha King, colored man of this city who last week entered the cafe owned by R. E. Garris on Fourth street, securing about \$19 in cash, was sentenced to two years on the county roads by Judge Louis G. Cooper in yesterday's session of county court.

George Aey Carr, recently arrested by city authorities on a charge of larceny, was sentenced to six months on the roads. Marcellus Sugg, charged with assault with deadly weapon, drew six months in jail to be assigned to work on the county roads.

Quincy Harper, Luther Waters and Matthew Blood, recently arrested for gambling, fined \$10 and cost of action. Tony Harris, carrying concealed weapon, was released upon payment of \$50 and cost.

Appropriations of nine million dollars were urged by Secretary of the navy Denby to be used to complete the new aviation base on the Pacific coast. He also urged completion of the great naval air fleets to supplement the eighteen capital ships left by the disarmament conference.

HARDING DECIDES TO END STRIKE IN NEXT THIRTY DAYS

Government to Act if Coal Workers Fail to Reach Amicable Settlement.

Washington, May 2.—Unless the nation-wide coal strike is amicably settled within the next month President Harding, backed by all powers of the government, will act to end the controversy, it was learned authoritatively here this afternoon.

The president is said to feel that the situation isn't sufficiently acute to warrant government intervention, but if industry should continue to be paralyzed this will probably necessitate stepping into the breach.

The miners and operators were today as far from a settlement as ever, and indications seem to point to government interference unless a change takes place soon.

REPORT CASHIER SHORT OF FUNDS AT HIGH POINT

Bank, However, Fully Protected Against Shortage, Officials Say.

High Point, May 2.—Basil H. Hedgecock, cashier of the Home Banking Company, is short in his accounts, according to T. F. Wrenn, president of the bank.

Mr. Wrenn stated this afternoon that he does not think the shortage will amount to more than \$10,000.

The chief bank examiner and his two assistants are at work on the books of the bank this afternoon.

Saturday the cashier's father, J. H. Hedgecock, gave the bank a guaranty bond of \$10,000 to cover any shortage up to that amount.

It was rumored on the streets this afternoon that Mr. Hedgecock had been arrested and was out under a heavy bond.

Clarence Latham, chief State bank examiner, issued a statement tonight in which he said the shortage in the Home Banking Company's accounts has been covered and that the bank is absolutely solvent.

UNITED STATES WILL FUND ELEVEN BILLION DEBT, HUGHES DECIDES

BEGIN SURVEY OF LABOR CONDITIONS IN THIS TERRITORY

R. D. Markham of State Department to visit industries of City

SURVEY TO CONSUME THREE OR FOUR DAYS AND PROBABLY MORE

Environments of Children to be Greatly Improved in the Future

Mr. R. D. Markham, of Raleigh, authorized agent of the State Child Welfare commission, is in Greenville today conferring with K. T. Fawell, welfare officer of Pitt county, regarding a survey of industrial and manufacturing places of Greenville in interest of the child labor law.

The purpose of the survey is to definitely ascertain the extent of child employment here, and remedy whatever irregularities may be found. The commission has made remarkable progress in its activities throughout the state and expects to improve conditions to no little extent within the next several months.

At least three or four days will be consumed in the inspection of the various industries of the city, when this is completed the commission will have sufficient information upon which to base on the campaign in behalf of child welfare laws, some industrial and unintentionally, and purpose of the commission is as to what they will be doing.

Environments of Pitt county children have been improved during Mr. Fawell's administration. In fact, children have been aided in hundreds of instances.

Mr. Markham has never before made the county department so perfectly well informed about the conditions of many industries. Ignorant of provisions regarding employment of children, and that violations have been committed because of this fact.

JUSSERAND ADAMS FRANCE MAY RECALL HIM

Dean of Ambassadors has Not Been Officially Notified Yet, However

(By International News.) Washington, May 2.—Ambassador Jules Jusserand, of France, dean of diplomatic corps at Washington, today expressed his views concerning apparently reliable reports that he will be recalled by his government after twenty years service as French Ambassador to the United States.

Jusserand has not been officially notified of his government's desire to recall him, but admits such a step is entirely possible. It is understood to have angered him when French officials blamed him for ill effect on the American public of French activities at the arms conference.

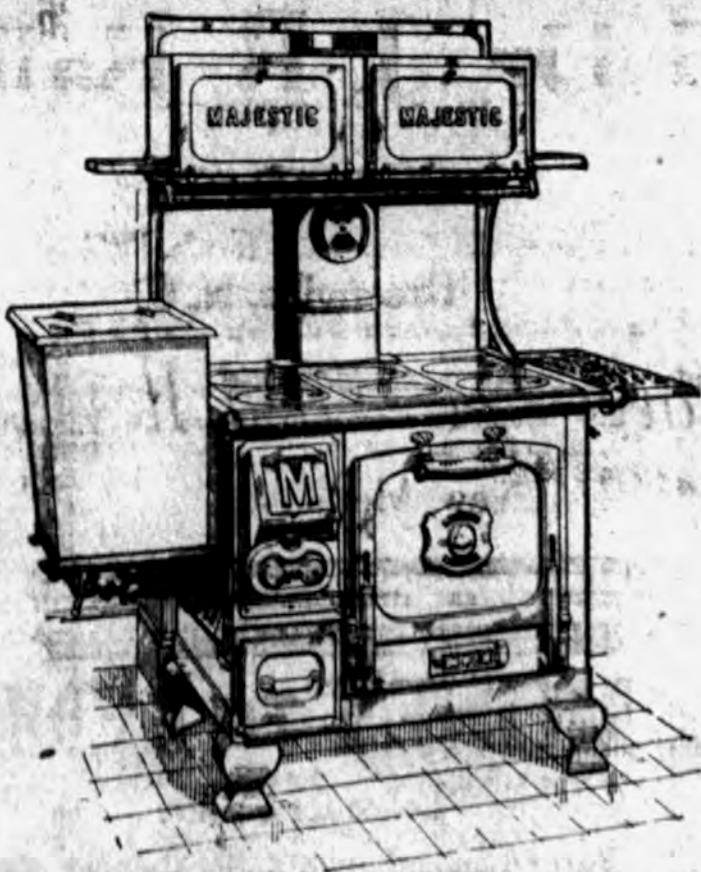

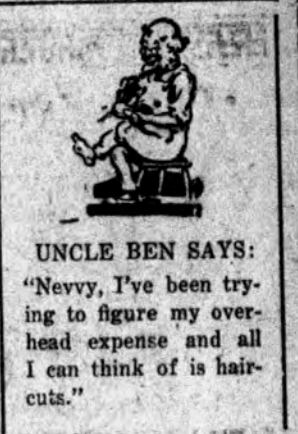
