Greenville will turn over its keys to the D. O. K. K. ceremonial Thursday. We would like to do the same to the Shriners in 1924.

Pitt county Shriners will attempt to bring the spring ceremonial of Sudan Temple to Greenville in 1924. And here's hoping they will meet with success.

The federal reserve system is planning to send a representative to the European conference. Nobody will object, unless they should take a fool notion of loaning more money.

Revolution in India is inevitable unless Great Britain changes its present policies, say lat dispatches. War in India is inevitable anyhow regardless of policies.

President Harding isn't in favor of the legislation to save daylight. That's strange. His entire platform was based on conservation, and now he comes out and opposes it. The way of Republicans is strange, and especially the president.

Russia is making an effort to reassure France of her sincerity in the recent treaty negotiations, but if Russia is sincere in this issue she will be establishing a precedent. Welfare might be declared and the public would believe it, but this declaration of sincerity will be received with incredulity.

Greenville extends a cordial welcome to members of the D. O. K. K. to assemble here tomorrow, and authorizes the mayor to turn over keys to the city immediately upon their arrival. This is the first time we have ever entertained a ceremonial of the kind, and as it is the greatest ever held in the state Greenville should feel proud of the honor.

Trade conditions in America have improved considerably in past months, and those fully informed believe the country will be on road to permanent recovery in the near future. This is gratifying indeed. In fact, exactly what the country has been clamoring for. Improved business will mean improvement along all lines, and that is exactly what everyone is desirous of.

After lingering around sixteen cents for several weeks cotton prices have mounted to nearly eighteen cents. This information will be received with gratification on all sides, especially by the man with several bales on hand that cost him about ten or twelve cents to produce. Mighty few in this situation will be found however and the market will have to reach twenty cents before much activity is observed.

The drainage meeting recently held in Goldsboro should result in even greater progress than heretofore, as much enthusiasm was in evidence. Drainage and its value to this state is gradually being realized and the next few years should see considerable progress made along this line. Proper drainage of farm land is essential to proper development of the farming industry and it is up to the public to boost the issue as much as possible.

Today concludes clean-up campaign in Greenville, and those who haven't participated should get busy and do their part before the day comes to a close. The chamber of commerce is to be congratulated on its effort to improve civic conditions of the city. This is exactly what we have needed all the time. Instead of making the campaign annual occurrence they should become semi-annual or even more often. In this way cleanliness will become an actuality instead of something dreamed and talked of.

President Harding has indicated his willingness to intervene in the strike of coal miners should the strike continue thirty days longer. Evidently, he means to wait until the surplus

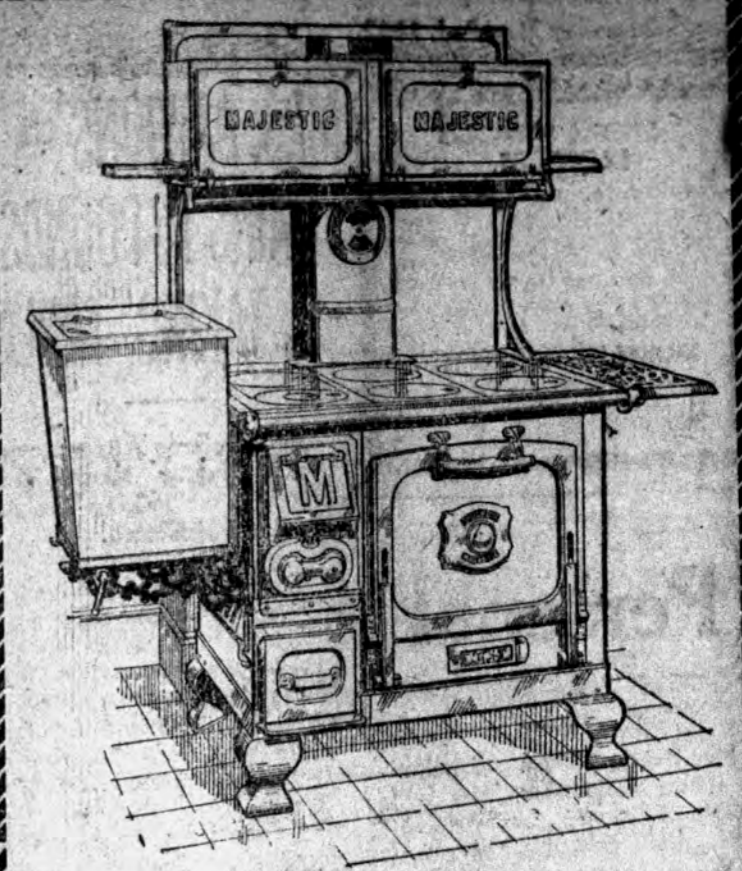
