### W. H. TURNER CASE FEATURES TODAY'S SESSION OF COURT

Former Night Watchman Being Tried for Shooting Young Man When He Crossed A. T. Co's Property

With the exception of a few cases which were continued, the case against W. H. Turner, charged with assault with deadly weapon with intent to kill, consumed practically the entire today's session of Pitt County Superior Court for the trial of criminal cases. Mr. Turner, former night watchman for the American Tobacco Company, a few weeks ago while guarding the property of said company, shot and wounded a young white man while he was taking a short cut to Gorman's Warehouse, which carried him through the property which was being guarded. The shooting occurred about seven o'clock in the evening and Mr. Turner at the time claimed that he thought the young man was a prowler and meant harm to the property. For a few days he was held in the local jail awaiting the results of the boy's injuries. When it was ascertained that the wound would not prove fatal, Mr. Turner was released under bond.

The following cases were given a hearing in yesterday's session:

Man Price and Joe Gray plead not guilty of the charge of larceny. Joe Gray was adjudged not guilty while Lyman Price was adjudged guilty and sentenced to jail for a term of 4 months to be assigned to work on roads.

W. E. Terry was adjudged not guilty of the charge of manufacturing liquor.

Jack Dail tenders a plea of guilty on charge of operating a car while drunk. Judgment was continued for a term of one year upon good behavior and payment of costs.

Marcellus Carner, Milton Williams and Willie Mack Carner charged with robbery, assault with deadly weapon and carrying concealed weapon. Defendant Willie Mack Carner called and failed. Judgment nisi si factus and continued. Other defendants agree that all cases be consolidated and tried together. Each defendant enters a plea of not guilty.

At conclusion of the evidence, however, Marcellus Carner tenders a plea of guilty of assault with deadly weapon, carrying concealed weapon, and driving car without license. Judgment that defendant be confined in jail 12 months to be assigned to work roads for assault with deadly weapon, and for a term of five months for offense of carrying concealed weapon. He was sentenced to work roads for 30 days for offense of driving car without license, to begin at expiration of 12 months sentence, 30 day sentence to begin at expiration of former sentence. Defendant Milton Williams pleads guilty of assault with deadly weapon and is sentenced to jail for six months to be assigned to work roads.

### Special Term of Court to Be Held In Buncombe County

Asheville, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Thirty-two men are expected to go on trial here next week, in the special term of Buncombe county Superior court over which Judge A. M. Stack is presiding, charged with participation in a riot and mob violence.

The charges grew out of the storming of the Buncombe county jail by a mob on September 19. The jail was stormed in an effort to secure Alvin Mansel, negro, jailed on a charge of an attack upon a white woman. The officers spirited the prisoner away, eluding the members of the mob.

In addition to the 32 who will go on trial next week, true bills have returned against others not yet apprehended. Because these additional persons have not yet been arrested, their names have not been made public. Most of the parties participating in the disorder, however, have been apprehended, Solicitor J. E. Swain states.

### Tentative Limit of \$300,000,000 Reached for Tax Reduction

Washington, Nov. 5.—(AP)—A tentative limit of \$300,000,000 as the total amount of the forthcoming tax reduction was determined upon today by the House Ways and Means Committee.

This is the figure set by Secretary Mellon and it was agreed to after the committee had gone over estimates of government expenses for the next fiscal year with Director Lord of the Budget.

Although some members favored a greater reduction, Director Lord warned them that there was little likelihood of a treasury surplus exceeding \$300,000,000 at the end of the fiscal year.

Chairman Greene in announcing the committee's decision said it was not absolutely binding and indicated the limit might be exceeded slightly if necessary to accomplish the wide spread tax revision desired by the committee.

With its goal fixed, the committee consideration of new rate schedule, taking up first the income taxes.

### Duke Campus Now Is Rather Unightly Building Operations

Durham, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Owing to the building activities at Duke University, together with the coming of rough weather, the University's streets are muddy, and the work of excavation and grading has made the campus almost impassable in places.

The Duke campus, once considered one of the South's most beautiful parks, now is rather unightly, and will doubtless continue to be until the first \$4,000,000 building unit is completed.

### RECOMMENDS THE CREATION BUREAU CIVIL AERONAUTICS

Proposed Bureau Would Be Authorized to Develop, Establish or Take Over and Maintain Air Navigation Facilities

Washington, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Creation of a bureau of Civil Aeronautics in the Department of Commerce with broad powers to regulate and promote all civil and commercial flying in the United States was virtually recommended by the committee of civil aviation, which was appointed by the Department in the American Engineering Council last June to make an exhaustive study of the question.

The committee in its report made public today says that the possibility which it sees for the development of commercial aviation in the United States can be realized only through a definite and continuing program of Government Assistance for the industry. The lack of this and of a definite legal status and government control for the industry, it found have been the chief causes of its failure to keep pace with the development in Europe.

In addition to its function of regulating air navigation, including licenses of pilots and inspection of planes, the proposed bureau would be authorized to develop, establish, or take over and maintain air routes and air navigation facilities.

### MR. B. F. GWALTNEY DIED LAST NIGHT

Funeral Services Conducted This Afternoon With Interment Taking Place in Wainright Burying Ground

Mr. B. F. Gwaltney, Sr., 70, died at his home a few miles north of Greenville last night at 7 o'clock after an illness of about ten days. Funeral services were conducted from the home this afternoon at 3 o'clock by Elder E. B. Joyner, of Saratoga. Interment followed in the Noah Wainright burying ground.

Mr. Gwaltney possessed a host of friends throughout his community. He was a prosperous farmer and held in high esteem.

The deceased is survived by his wife, one daughter, Mrs. Lee Crawford and three sons, Peter A., B. F., Jr., and A. L. Gwaltney all of this county.

### Eighth Bank Fails in South Carolina Last Two Weeks

Greenwood, S. C., Nov. 5.—(AP)—Failure of the Commercial Bank of Greenwood to open its doors for business today made the eighth bank failure in north western South Carolina in the last two weeks.

The largest of the institutions to close was the bank of Anderson, which was placed in the hands of the state bank examiner on October 27. It had deposits of \$1,200,000. Other banks that have been placed in the bank examiner's hands since October 22 are located at Abbeysville, Donalds, Lowndesville, Iva, Panxville and Sandy Springs. A Bank at Due West closed more than two weeks ago on October 19.

### Official Reports of Pastors Various Churches Submitted

High Point, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Official reports of pastors of various churches in the State were submitted at today's session of the North Carolina Annual Conference Methodist Protestant church, which opened here today.

83 pastors handed in reports showing large membership gained during the past year. The conference statistical Secretary Reverend Henry F. Surratt, of Charlotte will tabulate the figures and render a report at a later session.

### Crash Perils Couple in Sedan

### MITCHELL AGREES WITHDRAW REQUEST THREE SUBPOENAS ALVIN MANSEL TO BE ELECTROCUTED WED, JANUARY 13

Major General R. C. Davis, Hilary P. Jones and Major A. N. Kradstod Will Not Be Summoned According to Agreement

Washington, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Further compromise in the matter of witnesses and documentary evidence were made today between the prosecution and defense counsel in the court martial trial of Colonel William Mitchell.

Colonel Mitchell agreed through counsel to withdraw requests for subpoenas for Major General Robert C. Davis, Adjutant General of the Army, Rear Admiral Hilary P. Jones, head of the Navy General Board and President of the Shenandoah inquiry court, and Major Arthur N. Kradstod, of Luke Field, Honolulu. At the same time Lieutenant Colonel Joseph I. McMullen, Assistant trial Judge Advocate obtained the consent of the White House and the War, Navy and Agricultural Departments that documents in their possession relating to aviation would be turned over to the defense counsel.

### Parent Teachers Ass'n. West End School Holds An Interesting Meeting

The Parent-Teachers Association of the West Greenville School held an interesting meeting on Wednesday afternoon.

The program consisted of songs by the first, second and third grades.

The subject for the afternoon was Book Week. Miss Fuller the Librarian of the Public Library made a very instructive, helpful, and appropriate talk on Book Week—its object and its observance in Greenville. She urged the use of good literature in the homes, and the censorship of the magazines the children read. She made a plea for the child's use of the Public Library.

Matters of business were discussed. It was agreed to co-operate with the faculty in serving milk at the recess period.

The meeting adjourned to meet the first Wednesday in December.

### WHEELER ASKS FOR INDICTMENT TO BE DISMISSED BY JUDGE W. M. BOND

Says He Was Acquitted in the Federal Court of Charge Based on Identical Allegation of Facts

Washington, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Senator Burton K. Wheeler, Democrat of Montana, prosecuting the Senate Daugherty investigation, asked the district of Columbia Supreme Court today to dismiss indictments charging him with conspiracy to defraud the Federal Government in connection with air prosecutions permit in his home state. Two principle grounds for the motion were advanced; That the Senator was acquitted by a jury in the Federal court in Montana of the charge based on identical allegation of facts and that the District of Columbia is no jurisdiction of the offense charged, or sought to be charged.

The plea of a former acquittal and the demurrer alleged will be argued the latter part of this month.

Should the court sustain the plea of former acquittal for the demurrer, the case would be ended insofar as the present indictment is concerned and the prosecution here probably would not be renewed.

Should the court over rule the demurrer and the plea, however, Senator Wheeler still could avail himself on the plea in abatement charging irregularities in obtaining the indictment in the District of Columbia. If this should be denied the case would then come to trial on its merits.

### MILK CAMPAIGN IS ON IN PITT COUNTY

Survey Being Made of All the School Children in the County to Ascertain How Many Are Drinking Milk

The members of the county health office, the Superintendent of Education, the County Agent, the Welfare officer, and the Home Demonstration Agent, with the direction and assistance of Miss Maude E. Wallace, assistant State Home Demonstration agent, are making a survey of all the school children in the county. They are gathering statistics of the number of children drinking milk, and those drinking tea and coffee each day. The results of the survey will be published at the end of the week. These workers have also made talks in all of the schools of the county teaching the children the value of milk as a food.

They are giving picture shows and lectures in the consolidated schools of the county. These shows have been given on Griffon, Winterville, Falkland, Fountain and Bethel. These have been well attended and much interest has been shown. Shows will be given in Arthur, Belvoir, Grimesand and Pactolus.

### CASE AGAINST DICK HABOURNE SET ASIDE BY JUDGE W. M. BOND

Manslaughter Charge Against Rocky Mount Young Man Not Prossed at Requests of Dead Youths' Parents

The case against R. G. Habourne, of Rocky Mount, charged with manslaughter as a result of an automobile accident which occurred near this city several months ago, in which J. Robert Cooper and Bonnie Lee Wilkerson lost their lives, was not prossed by Judge W. M. Bond in Pitt County Superior Court here this afternoon after requests for such action, signed by parents of the two deceased had been presented to the court by counsel for the defense. The defendant together with the other occupants of the car at the time of the accident agreed to pay the damages to the negro dwelling which was struck and partially wrecked by the car. Habourne and seven other young men were enroute from Rocky Mount to Washington to attend a dance at the time of the accident.

The request, signed by the parents and presented to the court was as follows:

To Hon. W. M. Bond, Judge and Hon. Jessie W. Davis, Solicitor, Greenville, N. C.

Dear Sirs:

We the undersigned parents of J. Robert Cooper, Jr., and B. L. Wilkerson, who lost their lives in an unfortunate automobile accident near Greenville on the night of June the 5th, 1925, beg leave to request the court that Mr. R. G. Habourne, a companion of our sons on said occasion, be not prosecuted for this unfortunate affair, and we will not take any part in the prosecution of the manslaughter charge pending against young Habourne in the Superior Court of Pitt county and if consistent with your duty we request that said prosecution be not prossed or dropped from the docket.

### Woman Serving As Sec. State Delaware First Time in History

Wilmington, Delaware, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Miss Fannie S. Herrington, for 27 years an employe in the Delaware State Department, today was serving as Secretary of State and was the first woman to fill a state office in Delaware. She succeeds William G. Taylor, who has not been heard from since sailing south with Edward R. Pusey on the Yacht, Bunny Second, two weeks ago. The burned hulk of a vessel identified as the South Carolina coast. Durham, Nov. 5.—(AP)—In a recent contest with a professional wrestler who was touring the country with a circus, William "Big Boy" Mathewson, Duke University student, and a member of the variety team, was victorious, throwing his man in three minutes and winning a cash prize.

The match which was held here, under the circus tent, was witnessed by several thousand people, including many students, who were enthusiastic supporters of the collegiate grappler, and delighted with the outcome of the match.

#### AMERICA'S PLAYGROUNDS

Vast sums have been expended by the federal government in purchasing, developing and

maintaining the nation's 38 national parks and monuments and the money has been well spent, judging from the number of persons who visited them during the summer season just closed. The number of visitors probably greatly exceeds the park registration of the season, which was almost 2,000,000, but even at the registration figure these government reservations of America's natural wonders and beauties were not for naught.

America is famous for her industrialism, her democratic form of government, her polyglot people and her opportunities. One hundred years from now she will also be remembered for her past natural beauties, her wooded mountains, her cataracts, her virgin forests, for the generations of the past and present have, through the establishment of national parks and monuments, preserved for future generations liberal samples of what was once the United States from coast to coast and from border to border. These national preserves will be the most cherished heritage of posterity.

It is lamentable that although the center of population is east of the Mississippi, 37 of the 38 national parks and monuments for which summer registration figures are given are west of the Mississippi. This is readily explainable by the fact that the country's greatest natural playground is the Rocky Mountain region and that at the time the majority of the reservations were acquired by the government land was cheaper and more sparsely populated in the West than in the East. The situation in the East has been such that where national parks came in people had to move out.

Lafayette national park—an island of rugged mountains and tall trees lying off the coast of Maine—is the only nationally-owned natural park in the East, but its registration last summer was ninth on the list so it seems that the people are content to go West in search of nature and her mysteries. No natural park has been slighted by the outdoors-loving American people and some more national playgrounds of the Mississippi could be created with satisfaction to the public.
