## W. K. Jacobson One of Oldest Editors and Publishers in State From Point of Service Dies After Long Illness

Washington, Nov. 9.—W. K. Jacobson, one of the oldest newspaper editors and publishers in North Carolina from the standpoint of service, died at his home here late Saturday night, following a period of ill health that had extended over several years. The funeral services were held Sunday at 4 o'clock from the home, Rev. L. D. Mayman, pastor of the First Methodist church, officiating. Interment was in Oakdale cemetery.

For more than thirty-five years Mr. Jacobson had been editor and publisher of the Washington Progress. He was well known throughout the State and was generally recognized in this section as being one of the most loyal supporters that the Democratic party ever has had. He represented Beaufort county in the lower house of the Legislature in 1907 and for many years was a prominent in local politics. He also was one of the leaders in the local Methodist church.

During his lengthy career as a newspaper man Mr. Jacobson was confronted with the usual trials and tribulations that go with operation of a country newspaper. Through it all, however, he maintained a steady and even pace, and for many years the Progress was recognized as the leading newspaper of this section. For the last four or five years Mr. Jacobson not only edited the paper but he did all of the mechanical work himself, collected the bills and attended to every other detail in connection with getting out the Progress every Thursday.

His health had been poor for some time, and it was principally on this account that he decided to sell the Progress early this spring to Carl Goerch, the present owner and editor. His release from the arduous tasks under which he had been laboring, however, brought no improvement in his general physical condition. About two weeks ago he went to Baltimore for a special examination. Physicians there were frank in telling him that there was absolutely no hope for his recovery. He came back home last Sunday and was confined to his bed until death came last night. Kidney and liver trouble, coupled with a general run-down condition, brought about the end. He is survived by his wife, a sister, who resides in Miami, Florida, and several nieces and nephews. His funeral Sunday afternoon was largely attended.

## Says European Plot Being Formed Against A. Prohibition Law

Chicago, Nov. 9.—(AP)—William E. Puseyfoot Johnson, International temperance lecturer, says a European plot against the American Prohibition law is being formulated and will be launched at the gathering of wet advocates at Washington January 16. Mr. Johnson's information was given out today by Dr. Ernest H. Cherrington, Secretary of the World League against alcoholism, one of the principal speakers at the Anti-Saloon League Convention in session here.

The American Anti-Prohibition demonstration announced for Washington, D. C., January 16, will be engineered from Europe, and financiers for it will be distillers and brewers, Johnson's report said.

## Cotton Market Broke 120 Points After Report Was Issued

New Orleans, Nov. 9.—(AP)—The New Orleans cotton market broke 120 points, or \$6 a bale after the government crop report was issued, December, which traded at \$19.70 before the report, was issued and at \$18.50, as business was resumed following the report.

## Reports Show That 43 Persons Were Killed and 208 Injured in Ten Southern States

Birmingham, Ala., Nov. 9.—(AP)—Forty-three persons are known to have been killed and 208 injured in traffic accidents in ten southern states last week, reports collected today by the Associated Press reveal.

The outstanding accident of the week was near Nahutts, Georgia, when an A. C. L. train struck a truck loaded with school children on their way to school. Eight were killed outright and 22 injured. Four of the 22 died later in the week from their injuries.

This put Georgia in the lead with 12 fatalities for the week while Florida ranked next with seven deaths.

Florida with 91 injuries led that column, while Georgia trailed with 36. Out of the 11 southern states, Mississippi, so far as could be ascertained, escaped without any traffic fatalities or injuries reported.

In North Carolina there were three deaths and nine injuries from automobile accidents.

## MITCHELL SAYS HE IS FULLY PREPARED TO PROVE CHARGES

## Another Cannonade of Accusation is Turned Loose by Mitchell Against Those in Charge of Air Services

Washington, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Another reverberating cannonade of accusation was turned loose today by Colonel William Mitchell against those in charge of the Military and Naval Air Services.

Through his counsel, Frank R. Reid, the Colonel informed the court martial trying him because of his previous utterances in the air controversy that he was fully prepared to prove his charge of criminal and almost treasonable negligence in Government Aviation.

Among the multitude of offenses for which the defense promised to furnish proof were these:

That the Shenandoah went on her fatal Western trip unfit and against the will of her Commander, Zachery Lansdowne.

That a naval officer sought to have Lansdowne's widow give false testimony. That those who arranged the unsuccessful Hawaiian flight of the PN-9, No. 1 were "incompetent."

That high army and navy officers had testified falsely before committees of congress.

That Colonel Mitchell himself was demoted and transferred because he told the truth.

That government aviators are put to unnecessary hazards and many killed as a result.

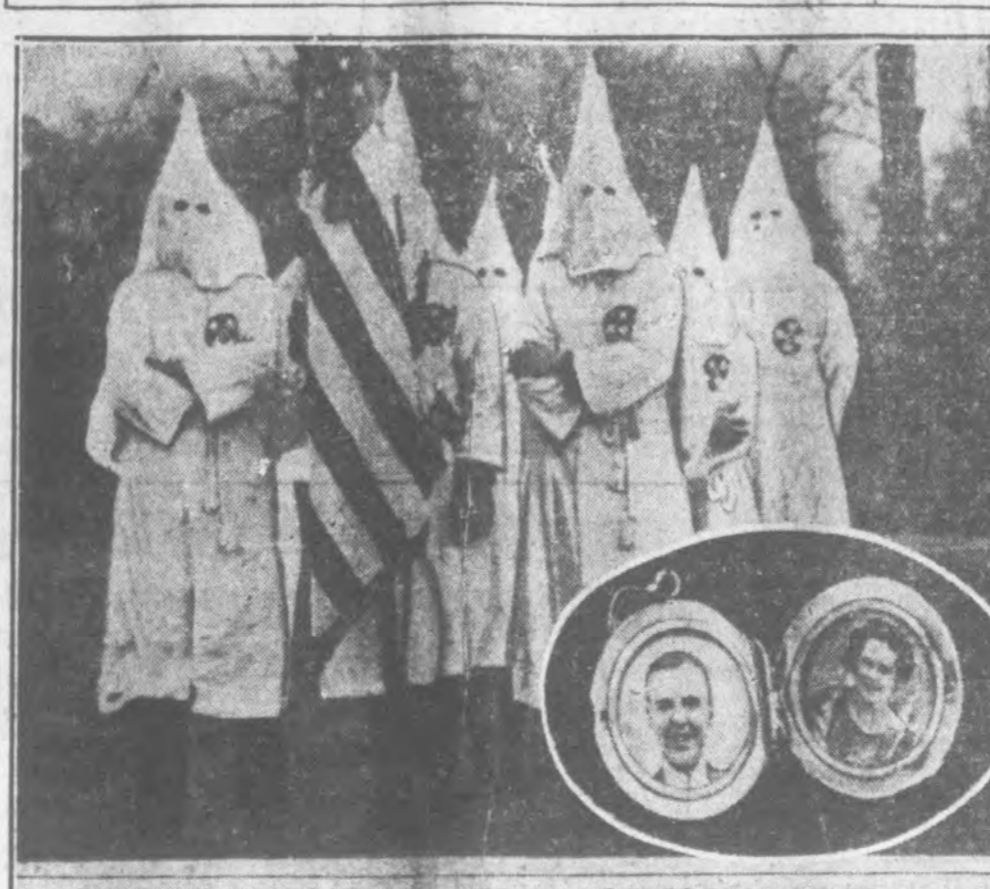
That the government has failed to thwart a project to give foreign flight organization a foot hold near the Panama Canal and to provide adequate protection to Hawaii and the Philippines.

## TO BUDDY--FROM BUDDY EDWARD BRITTON DIES EARLY TODAY

Washington Correspondent for Raleigh News and Observer Since 1920 Dies at Capital Today

Raleigh, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Edward E. Britton, veteran newspaper man and Washington correspondent of the Raleigh News and Observer, died today at ten o'clock at Washington Josephus Daniels, publisher of the paper, was informed of Mr. Britton's death by long distance telephone.

Mr. Britton yesterday suffered two hemorrhages and was removed to hospital in a serious condition. He had been Washington's correspondent to the News and Observer since 1920. During the eight-year Josephus Daniels was Secretary of the Navy, Britton was his Secretary and prior to that time he was for a number of years managing editor of the Raleigh News and Observer.

## Colored Woman Hurt When Auto Runs Into Wagon

## RAILROAD SURVEY SHOWS PROSPERITY THROUGHOUT SOUTH EVERYTHING READY FOR ARMISTICE DAY CELEBRATION HERE

Condition Railroad Treasuries One of Surest Barometers of General Business Conditions to Be Found

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 9.—(AP)—Prosperity in Dixie in the past two years is graphically reflected in survey of railroad earnings and stock advances for the period. Bank officers agree that or students of economics agree that the condition of railroad treasuries is one of the surest barometers of general business conditions that can be found. In a recent comparison seven railroads serving southern territory were selected and taking the low prices of the common stock in 1922 on hand and the high prices for the past week or the other, the following figures were gathered:

## Young Man Dies From Injuries Sustained in Lenoir Rhyne High Point Game Saturday

Salisbury, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Baxter Gillion, 23 of Salisbury, Captain and full back of the Lenoir Rhyne football team, who died early yesterday morning at a High Point hospital from injuries sustained in the Lenoir Rhyne High Point game Saturday, was buried this morning at 10:30 at his former home, China Grove, ten miles from here. The funeral took place at the home here and was conducted by the Rev. Edgar Woods, of the First Presbyterian Church, while interment was at China Grove. Members of the Lenoir Rhyne football team acted as pall bearers while practically the entire student bodies of the two colleges attended the funeral. Both colleges were closed during the funeral.

## 855,650 Bales Cotton Were Ginned in North Carolina Up to Nov.

Washington, Nov. 9.—(AP)—A probable cotton production of about 15,336,000 equivalent 500 pound bales this year if average influences prevail during the remainder of the season, the Department of Agriculture announced today in making a report as of November 1 on conditions, abandonment, probable yield, ginning, and other factors.

At the same time the Census Bureau announced that the cotton ginned from the 1925 crop prior to Nov. 1 totaled 11,988,000 running bales compared with 9,715,643 bales to that date last year and 7,556,042 in 1923. A probable yield of 16.4 pounds of lint cotton per harvested acre was indicated compared with 16.7 pounds a fortnight ago and 15.4 the final yield per acre last year. A fortnight ago a crop of 13,226,000 bales and an acre yield of 16.7 pounds was indicated, while last year's crop totaled 12,267,936 bales.

The indicated production by states based on November 1 condition was announced as follows:

Virginia 48,000 bales; North Carolina 1,080,000; South Carolina 860,000; Georgia 1,150,000; Florida 42,000; Missouri 245,000; Tennessee 483,000; Alabama 1,200,000; Mississippi 1,883,000; Oklahoma 1,520,000; Arizona 94,000; California 130,000. All other states 21,000. About 68,000 bales in addition to California will be grown in lower California, Old Mexico.

For North Carolina the ginnings to November 1 were given as 855,650 bales.

## Methodist Protestant Conference to Hold Next Meet G'boro

High Point, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Selecting Greensboro as the place for the next meeting, the North Carolina annual conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, which has been in session since last Wednesday, was signed by Sanderson and endorsed by Thomas E. Cooper, and was assigned to be a legitimate transaction by William E. Cooper.

## Appeal of Cooper Being Argued in Circuit Court Appeals

Richmond, Nov. 9.—(AP)—The appeal of former Lieutenant Governor William E. Cooper, of North Carolina from an 18 months sentence imposed for misapplication of funds of the Commercial National Bank of Wilmington, N. C., was argued before the circuit of appeals here today. The plaintiff in error claimed that he had no knowledge of any wrong doing in connection with the note of Edward L. Sanderson, which resulted in the crediting of \$12,905 to Thomas E. Cooper, now serving a sentence in the Atlanta Penitentiary for his part in the matter. The United States Represented by Irwin B. Tucker, attorney for the eastern district of North Carolina, claimed William E. Cooper was aware of the transaction through which his brother received a credit of \$12,905.

"Dutch" Anderson, alleged accomplice and avenger of that super-bandit Gerald Chapman, has been killed. After eluding the nation's crack police forces and ablest detectives for months, he was shot down by a "hick" detective in a small city. The cashing of a counterfeit note for a paltry \$20 was his undoing. What an ignoble end for this super-criminal! What an ignominious defeat for his vaunted prowess!

Such is the end of the lawless. They may gain notoriety, because of some daring bit of banditry, and they may even gain fame in the underworld through participation in some spectacular crime, but what a price they pay for this bit of glory. For them the future holds nothing better than years in prison, or a violent death and if neither of these, then poverty or years filled with the fears of the hunted.

Anderson was an educated man, able and talented. A successful career in some lawful business or profession might have been his.

Instead he chose to devote his equipment to the so-called easy and exciting life of the bandit. For his moments of excitement he paid years of the dull routine and hopeless drudgery of prison.

For his brothers and sisters-in-crime there should be a convincing moral in the last days of this nationally-known bandit. For all the greatly boasted profits from his participation in the New York mail robbery and other "big jobs" he was eking out a scant living, when killed, through passing counterfeit money of small denominations.

In between their few days of prosperity and fame criminals lead tawdry, hunted, miserable lives and in the end die discreditable, miserable deaths.

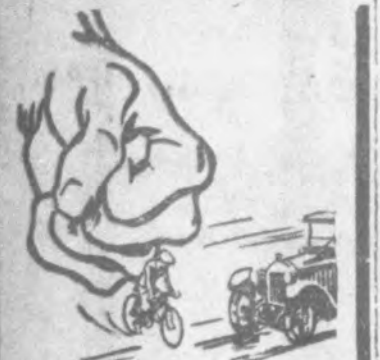

## NEW ARMENIA RISING FROM DEATH AND DEATH AND DISEASE

Erivan, Armenia. — Dreary and monotonous Armenia has blossomed out like a tropical South American state. The little Asiatic country which is squeezed in between Turkey, Persia and Soviet Russia, seems at last to have its own place in the sun. Free from Turkish massacres and continual incursions, the people are devoting themselves steadily to agriculture and industrial pursuits. Through irrigation and intensive methods of cultivation great waste spaces have been transformed into fertile areas covered with farm lands, vineyards and vegetation.

Armenia, which is about the size of the state of Maryland, is full of romantic scenery and fascinating folklore. The American traveler finds the country's claim to be the original seat of the Garden of Eden almost justified. The Valley of the Araxes River, where, according to tradition, Eve first tempted Adam, abounds with smiling vineyards, bubbling streams, crystal brooks, great stretches of beautiful trees, endless varieties of birds, and a fairland of flowers.

On the foothills of Mt. Ararat where, according to the Old Testament, Noah landed his ark after the flood, are villages founded 800 years before Christ, in which now live Armenians who once resided in the United States and who have returned to their native country to taste of its new prosperity.

Dr. Fridtjof Nansen, who made an economic survey of Armenia on behalf of the League of Nations and the American Near East Relief, expressed amazement at the rapid progress the country had made since his last visit in 1923.

This feeling for the American people has been strengthened and fostered by the work of the American Near East Relief organization. Alexander Drexler, which was rebuilt largely through American energy, money and enterprise, resembles a city in the United States. A splendid theatre is now being built there by the municipality, which will be called the "American Theatre," in honor of the American relief workers.

### HOSPITAL EMPLOYEES IN VERA CRUZ STRIKE; THEY APOLOGIZE

Vera Cruz. — A singularly polite strike has been recorded in this city, where strikes of one kind or another, frequently anything but amiable, are almost incessant.

Hospital employees and attendants walked out when their salaries had not been paid for several months. Formal and elaborate expressions of regret were transmitted to the patients.

"We deplore the unfortunate condition in which we must leave you," the strikes said to the patients, "but our own cases are more lamentable. Our salaries in most instances are \$30 or less per month. And when even that salary is not paid, we must with renewed expressions of infinite regret, proclaim that we cease work!"

**Fresh Fish for Breakfast**  
 Stockholm.—Fish caught in the North Sea during the night will be taken into Gothenburg, loaded into an aeroplane and be on the table in Stockholm at nine next morning. This is Sweden's latest venture in air transport and will be carried out by two planes, each carrying half a ton.

**GIRLS AND MARRIED AS MINORS. OLDER THAN FAMILY**

London.—There are many 15-year old English girls married to widowers who have children of their own who sometimes are no younger than their little step-mother. There are boys of 17 wedded to widows with children scarcely less juvenile than their step-father.

This was brought out in a survey made in connection with putting into effect a new act requiring the consent of parents to the marriage of minors. It also was shown there are more than 95,000 husbands and wives in England and Wales under 21. Of these, 38,000 were boys and girls in their teens.

These minors, it was stated, marry at the ratio of one out of every 30 girls between the ages of 15 and 20, and one out of every 40 boys of the same age group.
