MANY CASES HEARD IN COUNTY COURT HERE YESTERDAY

Two Sessions Fail to Clear Unusually Heavy Docket and Hearings Will Be Continued Thursday

This week's county court began yesterday with one of the heaviest dockets in recent months and after two sessions which consumed the entire day court adjournment was taken until Thursday when an effort will be made to clear the docket.

The following cases were heard yesterday:

Walter Bailey pleads guilty of the charge of driving auto while drunk and is fined \$50 and cost.

C. D. Tunstall was adjudged not guilty of driving auto while intoxicated. C. D. Tunstall charged with receiving, possessing and transporting whiskey. Defendant pleads guilty of unlawful possession of whiskey and judgment is suspended for a term of 18 months upon payment of costs.

Joe Baker pleads guilty of transporting whiskey and is fined \$200 and cost. Automobile is confiscated and ordered to be sold by Sheriff as provided by law.

H. N. Farmer was adjudged not guilty of driving while drunk.

R. N. Farmer and Elsie Wright were charged with receiving, possessing and transporting whiskey. Elsie Wright was adjudged guilty and sentenced to 12 months in jail. Judgment suspended for 30 days upon payment of cost, if thereafter defendant is found in Pitt County. Capias to issue at direction of court and defendant to be confined in jail 12 months and serve term. Defendant R. N. Farmer was fined \$200 and costs.

Hert Dunn pleads guilty of transporting whiskey and is fined \$25 and costs.

Younger Pitt pleads guilty of the charge of assault with deadly weapon and judgment is suspended for a term of 2 years upon good behavior and payment of costs.

Noah Cox, pleads guilty of driving car while drunk and is fined \$50 and costs.

Henry Venters, Jr., was adjudged not guilty of possessing whiskey.

Henry Venters, Jr., pleads guilty of driving automobile while drunk and is fined \$50 and costs and ordered to pay J. F. Evans, the sum of \$84.10.

John Allen pleads guilty of larceny and is sentenced to jail for 3 months to be assigned to work roads. Eddie Hardee was adjudged not guilty of larceny.

C. W. Grisham, was fined \$50 and costs for driving car while drunk.

Theodore Harris was adjudged guilty of assault with deadly weapon, and judgment was suspended for 2 years upon good behavior and payment of costs.

Jesse Armstrong was adjudged guilty of receiving and possessing liquor and judgment was suspended for 2 years upon good behavior and payment of costs.

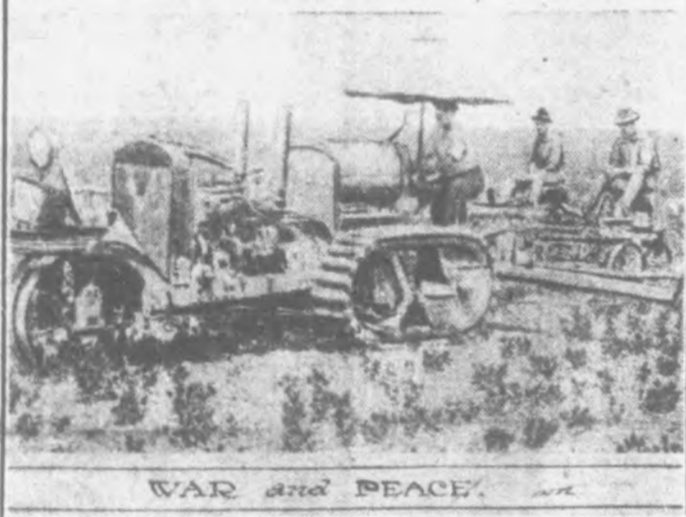

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—A corn crop of 3,013,390,000 bushels, one fifth larger than last year's crop and the sixth in the history of the nation to exceed the three billion mark was announced today by the Department of Agriculture in its November preliminary estimate. Iowa, the premier corn producing state, has surpassed all its previous records with an indicated production of 477,386,000 bushels.

PRESIDENT TO LAY WREATH UPON TOMB UNKNOWN SOLDIER

Wheels of Government to Pause at Eleven O'clock As Tribute of Silence to Those Who Fell in War

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Leading the nation's observance of the seventh anniversary of the Armistice President Coolidge will make a pilgrimage tomorrow to Arlington Cemetery to lay a wreath upon the "Unknown Soldier's" tomb.

The ceremony there carrying out the custom inaugurated by President Harding will take place at 11 o'clock, the hour the Allied and German guns were silenced in 1918 and will be one of the many tributes to be paid during the day to those who fell in the war.

Coincident with the presidential ceremonies at Arlington governmental business will be suspended for a minute or two as a tribute of silence to the war dead. This will be in accordance with the desire of the president and his cabinet who agreed today that the nation should fittingly observe the day.

SPECIAL VENIRE FROM DURHAM TO TRY JESSE WYATT

Former Raleigh Police Captain to Face Murder Charge On Thursday for Killing S. S. Holt, of Smithfield

Durham, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Fifty men of Durham city and county were selected as a special venire to try Jesse Wyatt, former Raleigh policeman, for the murder of S. S. Holt, of Smithfield, tonight and immediately after the drawing the sheriff's department began the serving of summons to jury service upon those selected. The special venire has been ordered to report in Wake county Superior Court Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

Raleigh, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Judge Garland E. Midyette in Superior Court here late today granted the motion of the state that a venire be summoned from another county to try Jesse Wyatt, former Raleigh police captain for the murder of S. S. Holt, of Smithfield.

Judge Midyette ordered a venire of fifty men to be drawn from Durham county at eight o'clock tonight to report for the trial Thursday afternoon.

Mrs. Lansdowne to Reappear Before Shenandoah Court

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Mrs. Margaret Lansdowne, widow of the airship Shenandoah's commander will be recalled Monday before the naval court of inquiry that is investigating the wreck of that craft, for questioning as to the charge made at the Mitchell court martial that an officer of the Navy Department sought to have her give false testimony before the naval court.

In opening the Mitchell defense yesterday Representative Frank Reid asserted he could produce evidence that Mrs. Lansdowne had been approached by a naval officer in an effort to have her retract before the Shenandoah court of inquiry her original statement that her husband had been ordered to take the Shenandoah on the fatal flight over his protest to the Navy Department.

PENSION CHECKS OF CONFEDERATE VETS LARGER NEXT TIME

State Auditor Durham Announced Yesterday That Checks Received Just Before Christmas Will Show Big Increase

Raleigh, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Confederate Veterans of North Carolina, when they receive their next pension checks shortly before Christmas will find the checks considerably increased. State Auditor Baxter Durham, said today in announcing the amounts the veterans and their widows will receive.

First class veterans will receive \$200, second class, \$185, third \$170 and fourth \$155, he said. First class veterans' widows will receive checks for the sum of \$200 while widows of fourth class veterans will get checks for \$100. There will be about 3,200 soldiers on the pension list this year.

Two Women Added to Commission to Study County Governments

Raleigh, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Mrs. Thomas O'Berry, of Goldsboro, and Miss Mary Henderson, of Salisbury, were named today by Governor Mehan as additional members of the commission for the study of county governments. Other members of the commission were appointed by the Governor some time ago.

HELPLESS SYMPATHIZER WILL BE MULE IN COAL SHORTAGE

Shamokin, Pa.—(AP)—A helpless sympathizer will be the mine mule if a shortage of anthracite coal, in the production of which it plays a part, pinches the needy humans or causes human beings. Suspension of operations figuratively takes the mule's stop away.

Ordinarily the nine mules live underground from one year's end to the other. There the temperature remains fairly even, summer or winter. When the mines closed down the mules were brought to the surface many for the first time since the last suspension of operations. It was warm weather then and the mules were turned loose outdoors. The arrival of the first cold snap found most of them still in the open and stable facilities few.

RED CROSS BUDGET FIXED \$7,155,211 FOR ENSUING YEAR

Chairman Payne Announces Majority of Budget Will Go Toward Special Services, Including Disaster Relief

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—On the eve of the annual drive for new members and maintenance of its standing arm of supporters intact, Chairman Payne of the American Red Cross announced tonight the Society's budget for the year ending June 30, 1926, had been fixed at \$7,155,211, a majority of which will go toward special services, including disaster relief.

Special services of the relief organization will absorb \$4,957,883 of the budget. This phase of the Society's work includes relief for service and former service men, and \$1,400,000 is set aside directly for camp, hospital and liaison services in their behalf. Grants and loans to former service men and women are expected to total \$20,000; transient service, including former service men's welfare, \$140,000; emergency work for those men \$25,000, and creation of convalescent houses \$150,000.

A sum of \$200,000 is tentatively fixed for disaster relief, which is the amount set aside each year because of the impossibility of calculating the relief demands in this respect. As an example, Judge Payne pointed to the contributions in the mid-western tornado relief operations which amounted to \$2,644,920 up to June 30, last. This sum, with donations received subsequently, and added to the Red Cross appropriation of approximately \$250,000, made a total of \$3,000,000 available for this single operation, the largest in the peace-time history of the Society.

Out of the tornado relief fund for the mid-west victims, the budget lists \$2,702,233 to meet the continuing requirements from that section, to which use it is restricted, and the expense of administering the fund will be borne by the Red Cross, to permit every cent of the relief money to be spent for actual relief work.

The budget appropriates \$6,750,733 for domestic operations and \$404,477 for foreign work. Headquarters and branch office operations are allotted \$1,469,600.

PARROT PAT AT 70 YEARS IS ELIGIBLE FOR A HERO MEDAL

Denver.—(AP)—"Pat" Callahan, 70-year-old parrot, has viewed many an exciting exploit of Western frontier history but despite his natural prerogative he declines to relate any of his experiences.

If medals for heroism were distributed to parrots, "Pat" probably would have been eligible when, in 1875, he aided in routing a band of Indians who attacked a party of white men, one of whom was his owner. Disregarding a shower of lead "Pat" flew over the heads of the Indians and screamed; "Give 'em hell!" His war cry, although an encouragement to the enemy, evidently disconcerted the red men. After several attempts to shoot the bird, they fled.

Asquiths Like River Homes

London.—The Asquiths have a passion for riverside homes. All the members of the family are fond of The Wharf, Lord Oxford's house on the Thames. Lord Oxford also has an apartment in Temple Chambers, overlooking Victoria Embankment, and Raymond Asquith also has an apartment in the same building. Lord Oxford's daughter, Princess Bibesco, wife of the Rumanian minister to Washington, has a home on the Quai Bourbon, and is dividing her time between the shores of the Seine and Thames.

NOXIOUS PLANT FOUND TO BE PRODUCTIVE OF PAPER PULP. Harrisburg, Pa.—The Chinese "tree of heaven" will produce paper pulp of good fiber length. Whereas it was about to be condemned as a noxious plant, it may in later years help to solve the problem of wood shortage for paper manufacturing purposes.

The tree's paper pulp possibilities were discovered in experiments conducted by the Pennsylvania department of forests and waters, co-operating with the forest products laboratories at Madison, Wis. As a result, the department will plant thousands of alanthus (tree of heaven) seeds which in 25 years should produce 43.2 cords of wood to the acre. The tree grows rapidly and produces a prolific crop of seeds. The first tree in Pennsylvania was planted in Philadelphia about 133 years ago.

Stephen Everett was adjudged guilty of illegal possession of whiskey. Judgment that defendant pay fine of \$200 and cost and be confined in jail for 4 months to work roads. Capias to issue and sentence to begin at direction of court at any time within a period of 2 years upon defendant violating any criminal law of state.

Robert Oakley plead guilty of operating auto while drunk and is fined \$50 and costs.

Elijah Sweeney, charged with possessing liquor, was adjudged guilty and sentenced to jail for 6 months to be assigned to work roads. Defendant appeals to Superior Court under bond of \$300.

"SAW AND HAMMER" ARTIST IS FADING FROM THE PICTURE

Hollywood.—The "saw and hammer" screen artist is fading from the picture. Actors may still be found in the Hollywood studios who in their early days had to bring overalls and carpenter tools with them when they reported for work in the pictures, but their number rapidly is diminishing.

Film executives sometimes speak with regret at their passing. For these movie folk of the old school, who helped build the sets they acted in and sometimes sacrificed sleep to protect the "pop" from wind or rain, exhibited a loyalty and esprit corps hard to match on the modern movie lot.

Those were the days before 1910, when to be seen in a motion picture was, to any self-respecting actor, something like being seen in jail. Those skilled in make-up did their screen acting under assumed names

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and took special pains to disguise their features so that no one could actually prove they had fallen to the film level.

Even stage carpenters steered clear of the screen studios, fearing the wrath of the theatre men, who had boycotted the movies as a menace to the legitimate stage. Consequently, the actor forced by poverty into accepting work in the films had to be willing to help overcome the shortage of carpenters.

There came a day, however, when actors no longer consented to double as carpenters. According to J. Stuart Blackton, one of the founders of the old Vitagraph company, Maurice Costello was a leader in this revolt against the saw and hammer. Before he consented to go to work

for Vitagraph, Costello stipulated that he would do no driving of nails and sawing of boards. "Do I look like a carpenter?" he said.

Hiss daring defiance went unpunished, and the fact that he later became a star probably encouraged other actors to scorn the carpenter's kit.
