TAX REDUCTION FIGHT WILL BE CARRIED SENATE

Fight for \$500,000,000 Reduction Being Waged by Democrat Members of Finance Committee

Washington, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Defeated in Committee, demoralized members of the Senate Finance Committee will carry their fight for a \$500,000,000 tax reduction to the Senate.

Vital rate reducing provisions of the non-partisan house measure were approved yesterday by the Committee by unanimous vote in almost all instances except on the proposal of the Democrats to increase the reduction in surtaxes and to repeal the admission and dues levies which were defeated on straight party vote.

Says Aluminum Co. Agrees Have Books Examined

Washington, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Senate investigators of the case against the Aluminum Company of America, in which Secretary Mellon is a heavy stockholder, were told today by Assistant Attorney General Donovan that the company had agreed freely to a full investigation of its books by the Department of Justice.

Mr. Donovan made this exposure before the Senate Judiciary Committee as his story of the Department's part in the case. Under instructions from the Senate the Committee did not institute contempt proceedings against the company after the Federal Trade Commission had accused it of violating a court decree against certain trade practices.

A. V. Davis, president of the company, was quoted by Mr. Donovan as having stated that his company had no objection to the Department having the confidential data which the Trade Commission withheld.

## ITALY WATCHES AS INDUSTRIES GO TO FASCISM

### Interests to Have Seat On Supreme Council of Party As Part of Government; Earlier Members Suspicious of Late Comers' Sincerity—Wonder What May Happen

By GUGLIELMO EMANUELE, I. N. S. Staff Correspondent Rome, Jan. 12.—The decision of the General Federation of Italian Industries to become thoroughly Fascist and assume a new title of General Fascist Federation of Italian Industries is most important and quite significant of the new situation which is being created in Italy.

Evidently the leaders of industry in this country have been persuaded to "insert" themselves in the Fascist movement as a result of the recent bill passed by the Chamber on syndicates.

Recommending that measure to the Chamber, Premier Mussolini admitted the radical character of the law, when he said that even Soviet Russia had demurred to make it compulsory for industrialists to have all their differences with labor settled by arbitration "because the Soviets were afraid to frighten capital which was al-

ready shy," but he added that Italian industrialists could feel guaranteed as long as he was there to apply the law and keep an even balance between industrial and labor interests.

The industrialists agreed, but it made it double sure thought that since the State was going to be the umpire issuing final decision it would have been a good thing to have a say in the government and the party.

In fact it has been decided that the representatives of industrial interests will have a seat on the Fascist Supreme Council, which now that parliament has been practically deprived of all initiative and power becomes the most important organ of the regime, where the important decisions and plans are mooted and decided.

But this conversion of Fascism of the Industrial Federation is typical of the moment because it shows that the prevailing tendency now in Italy is for everybody and for every existing organization or group of interests to become Fascist.

In a very brief period it will be extremely difficult to find anybody who is not Fascist, since it is the general opinion that is the only way to protect either individual or collective interests.

Some Fascists of the first period are rather preoccupied by these invasions of the new recruits in the ranks of the party since they apply the same to them not to be sincere. And they are asking themselves what will happen when everybody in the country will be Fascist and Fascist will be practically synonymous with being Italian. They are afraid that the differences of opinion and tendency which are practically suppressed now with the suppression of all opposition and the destruction of all adverse parties, will be recreated in the same ranks of Fascism with the difference that in-

stead of having an opposition from outside they will have it from inside.

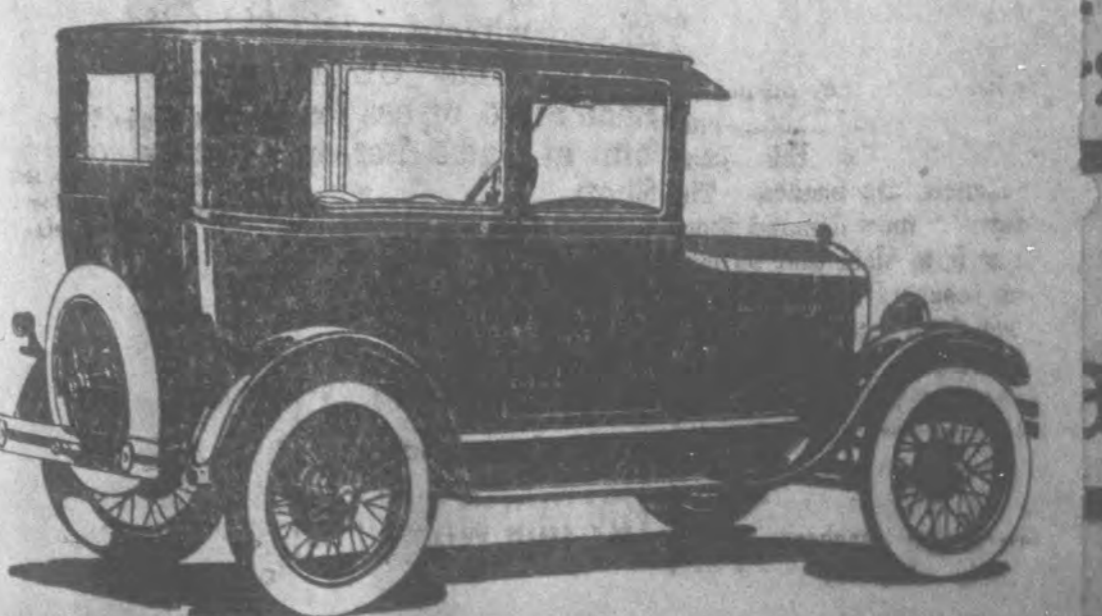

B.H.B., Jan. 12.—(L. N. S.)—
"Rattling the sword, great words,
and thoughts of revenge still is the
favorite pastime of the ex-Kaiser,"
says the democratic Frankfurter
Zeitung, commenting on a letter of
the Kaiser to a German publisher,
thinking him for the receipt of a
book of the World War.

The letter written by the personal
friend and "house-marshal" of
the Kaiser, Count Fickenstein,
reads:
"His Majesty expressed his hopes
that the book may contribute to
revive the patriotic spirit of the
German nation and to stir the spark
of heroic spirit glowing under the
ashes of hatred until the flames
flame up which will and must bring
freedom to the German nation.
May the book also show the Ger-
man youth how our forefathers
had to fight and suffer in order to
shake off the French yoke and re-
gain their old freedom."

The letter is dated December 1,
1925, the day on which the Locarno
Pact was signed in London.

Good saxophone players are rare
in Germany. Since the extension
of police hours the demand for
them has become much stronger
than the supply. Saxophone play-
ers are the best paid musicians in
Germany. They are getting an
average salary of a thousand marks
a month as an equivalent to about
five to seven hours' work a day.
Star players even get as much as
fifteen hundred marks a month.

Berlin alone has about 200 jazz
bands playing in dancing halls and
restaurants. For the time being
foreign players, especially Ameri-
cans and Englishmen, are prefer-
red to Germans. The Anglo-Sax-
on players have a name for skill-
fully mastering the erratic rhythms
of jazz, which has only become
known in Germany after the war.
The Germans, therefore have been
severely handicapped and just
started to learn to play jazz prop-
erly. It is, however, forecasted
that within two or three years Ger-
many need no longer "import" jazz

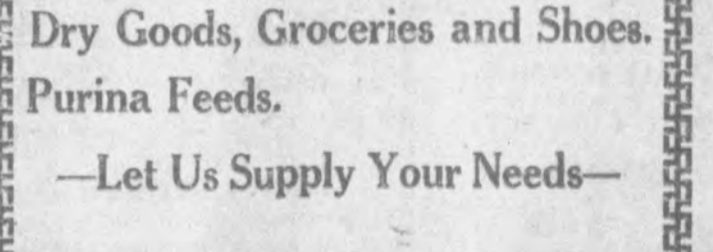
