## BELIEVES TAX BILL WILL BE CAUSE OF A GREAT DEFICIT

### President Coolidge Holds Belief That Treasury Will Face Deficit of \$100,000,000 At End Of Next Fiscal Years.

Washington, Feb. 27.—(AP.) Provisions of the new tax reduction bill were in operation today with President Coolidge holding the belief that the measure will cause a treasury deficit of \$100,000,000 at the end of the next fiscal year. Further reductions may be possible within a few years if the public debt total is lowered, but in the meantime Mr. Coolidge hopes congress will call for additional appropriations. He has particularly in mind the proposal for increasing by about ten per cent the expenditures in behalf of the army and navy.

The threat of the treasury deficit at the end of the next fiscal year may be removed if congress is careful of the government finances, Mr. Coolidge thinks, and he foresees additional revenue for the treasury if the tax reduction effects increased productivity throughout the country.

### Declares He Will Give Word Story Rise Of Facism

Nice, France, Feb. 27.—(AP.) General Cesare Rossi declares he will give the world the inside story of the rise of Fascism in Italy, "created for a good cause and then prostituted by Benito Mussolini," even though he is threatened with bodily harm.

### Plans To Wage War Against Mosquitoes

Washington, Feb. 27.—(AP.) The government is going gunning for the salt marsh mosquitoes of the south Atlantic and Gulf States. An appropriation of \$25,000 for the preliminary work was added today to the agriculture department bill by the senate.

### Burglar Takes Fur Coat And An Electric Fan

New Orleans, Feb. 27.—(AP.) Police today were searching for a burglar who equipped himself during the night to carry on operations anywhere from the equator to the North Pole. Mrs. Edmund Lange reported the loss of a fur coat and an electric fan.

## GREENVILLE HIGHS DEFEAT NEW BERN BY SCORE 30-20

### Best Contest Of Season And Hard Fought Throughout The Entire Four Quarters.

The Greenville High School basketball team added another game to its long string of victories last night on the local court when they defeated the New Bern quint 30 to 20. It was one of the best contests of the season to the spectators and was hard fought throughout the entire four quarters.

The entire Greenville team entered into the game at the sound of the first whistle in early season form, their speed and accuracy in goal shooting being much better than of the two preceding games, which were their only losses of the season out of 11 games played. As is his custom in each contest, Doug West was the individual star of the performance, accounting for 17 of his team's 30 points, with Fred Forbes following with seven, and Billy Brown for the remaining six counters. Henry, the right guard of the visitors, lead his team mates with 13 points, the remaining seven points being gained by Ferebee 3, Graney 2, and Lane 2.

At the close of the first half the score stood 16 and 5 in Greenville's favor, and the margin of lead they retained although some members of the quint failed to show their usual form in the last two quarters, guarding was lacking and there was less speed in their passing, several times allowing New Bern players to intercept several attempts that should have been safe for at least a try at the basket.

The locals will go to State College on next Friday to compete with more than fifty other high school quints of the state for a loving cup and other prizes. These games have no connection with the championship series that are now in progress, in the state from which the locals were eliminated by Mavesville. The games next week will give the individual player an opportunity to display his worth, and in this feature Greenville is expected to present more than one eligible for state recognition.

### Guerra Religiosa Had Mujeres Desnudas Worse 3,000 Bullseyes. Canessa To Berlin.

The energetic De Mexico, published in Los Angeles by Rafael Quijano, says in big type "MEXICO ESTA AMENA ZANO POR IMMIXTENTE GUERRA RELIGIOSA," which means, Mexico is immediately menaced by a religious war.

Mexico will do well to get rid of that menace by letting all religious believe, preach and pray as they choose as long as they don't meddle with each other or with government. Of all wars religious wars are the bloodiest, most brutal and destructive.

Governor Rooftiguez, ruling the north Mexican territory threatens to close the border, shutting out California's exports. He resents United States criticism of conditions in the dives of Mexical and Tia Juana under Rodriguez dominion.

But inasmuch as United States citizens are at the same time owners and customers of the dives, the blame certainly does not rest on Rodriguez or Mexico. That United States citizens cross the border to gamble and get drunk in American owned dives on Mexican soil is United States, not a Mexican disgrace.

Mexicans, hurt by United States criticism, find comfort on the front page of that Herald de Mexico of this date. In type an inch high, Editor Quijano tells his readers: "En un wild-party de nueve York Fieron banadas con champagne bellas y juvenes mujeres desnudas" which means, "young and beautiful women in a wild party at New York were naked in champagne," the spanish language, it means, supplies no synonym for "wild party."

No wonder Mexico reminds us not to throw stones in glass houses. You read of young Americans going to the dogs via the Charleston, jazz and bootleg whiskey. Then Samuel Moore, 17 year old captain of the high school rifle team at Newton, Mass., reassures you with his new world's record.

That young gentleman, it sounds unbelievable, made three thousand consecutive bulls eyes between eight o'clock in the morning and five in the evening. Neither harleston nor premature hootch has ruined that young man's nerves.

From Innsbruck, representatives of the Tyroles Cable Senator Borah asking him to curb Mussolini, calling attention to "Italian injustice in the South Tyrol and Mussolini's threats against North Tyrol."

Senator Borah and others in the United States government should sympathize with the Tyrol and all the rest of Europe and stop short with sympathy. There should be no meddling or mixing in European affairs. Italy and Germany full grown long before 1776, are old enough to attend to their own business.

Did you read Lloyd George's extremely interesting article on Mussolini's defiance of Germany. Nothing could be more interesting as showing how young the world is than the continuing struggle between Goths and Romans down to our own day.

That Brenner pass in the Tyrol interests Mussolini atavistically and practically. Through that pass pass the "Germanic Barbarians" marched down to conquer the Italian peninsula, leaving there the blue eyes and flaxen hair, now conspicuous in northern Italy. Through that pass there came the northern warrior that sat dressed in his furs on the throne of the Caesars. And through the same pass perhaps, in our Christian days, rode that repentant German Emperor, when he came to stand barefooted in the snow before the Pope's window in mid-winter humbly begging the Pope's forgiveness at Canossa.

## RAY'S FATE MAY BE IN HANDS OF JURY LATE TODAY

### Mountaineer Observes Proceedings As Time Nears For Third Jury To Retire To Determine His Fate.

Philadelphia, Feb. 27.—(AP.) Vinegar is being used in large quantities by bootleggers in the manufacture of synthetic alcohol. John Whitehead, an agent of the internal revenue bureau announces that he has uncovered this method for cheap process of making alcohol. He says manufacture is on a large scale all over the country, and if it is not quickly checked it will make prohibition enforcement all but impossible.

In an investigation under way since last November he has learned that with vinegar and two chemicals, obtainable at any drug store, alcohol may be made as cheap as 50 cents a gallon. No still is required for the process. Whitehead says there is no way to prevent the manufacture unless the bootlegger is caught with the alcohol in his possession. In the process the vinegar is placed in a vat, the chemicals thrown in and the mixture allowed to stand. After a period of time the chemicals sink to the bottom of the vat leaving the alcohol on top.

Paris, Feb. 27.—The French government today gave the Briand government a vote of confidence 258 to 34 on the government tax program.

## APPROVE GIVING \$6,000,000 ERADICATE BOVINE TUBERCULOSIS

Washington, Feb. 27.—(AP.) Approval was given today by the senate to an appropriation of \$6,000,000 for the eradication of bovine tuberculosis. This was \$1,900,000 more than the house provided in the annual agricultural department appropriation bill.

Of the total \$5,925,000 would be for payment of indemnities to owners of tubercular cattle destroyed. \$1,000,000 would be available immediately upon the passage of the agricultural appropriation bill.

## SAYS VINEGAR BEING USED IN MAKING ALCOHOL

### Bootleggers Manufacturing Synthetic Alcohol On Large Scale Over The Country.

Asheville, Feb. 27.—(AP.)—The case of Wallace Ray, charged with the murder of Dr. O. V. Burnett in a pistol duel last November, is expected to go to the jury this afternoon, according to information reaching here from Marshall.

Attorney E. R. Edmen, of Mars Hill, assisting in the prosecution, made his argument after court opened this morning. He was followed by Attorney Thomas Rollins, of Asheville, for the defense. Solicitor J. E. Swain, of Asheville, was scheduled to close the argument after Attorney Rollins had finished.

As the time neared for Ray to see the third jury retire to determine his fate, the 48 year old mountaineer sat closely observing the proceedings. With him were his ten year old son and two daughters, even younger. One of the little girls sat on her father's lap, and both were eating candy. The court room proper and the gallery were filled to overflowing this morning. A large proportion of the crowd was women, and scores of school children were present.

## Maharajah Abdicts In Favor Of Son

Bombay, Feb. 27.—(AP.)—The wealthy Maharajah of Indore, storm center in a scandal involving the murder of a merchant friend of his favorite dancer, has abdicated in favor of his son.

Lee Maharajah's heir is Prince Yeshwant, Rao Halkar, who was born in 1908 and who now is ruler of the state with an area of 9,500 square miles and a population of 1,500,000.

## REVIVAL SERVICES BAPTIST CHURCH TO CLOSE SUNDAY

### Closing Day To Be Featured By Three Sermons; Special Musical Program To Be Rendered At Each Service.

I can't understand the Bible; I haven't enough faith; there are too many hypocrites in the church; I haven't the right feeling; I will some other time; I will tomorrow. These, declared Dr. H. Frederick Jones in last night's sermon, are the excuses men give in answering the call of God. "If you don't give your heart to God, then you had better write your list of excuses to give God, because you do not know the hour when the slender cord will break, and you will pass into eternity," declared Dr. Jones. "But the best way is to give your heart to God, and be prepared."

On Thursday evening Dr. Jones gave the calls of God, and last night gave men's answers. After giving the various excuses, the speaker then showed how absolutely absurd each is. He appealed to his audience to be men and to stand four square for God and those things that mean for a greater life. In the excuse that a man stays out of the church on account of hypocrites, Dr. Jones declared that the hypocrites if he is able to keep a man out of church, is greater than the man himself. The man who expects to hold out by his own strength will fail. We can't hold out without God. Give God your heart and He will help you to hold out, declared Mr. Jones, in answering the excuse, "I am afraid I can't hold out." Tomorrow is a misnomer. It never comes. Tomorrow becomes today and so on throughout all time. Time belongs to no man. Time belongs to God. We spend our lives by seconds, minutes, hours and so on.

Don't put off until tomorrow that which should be done today. Thus reasoned the speaker in his attempt to show the sinner that tomorrow never comes, and that the excuse, "I have time enough," is presumptuous, because God rules time. "You will never understand the Bible," said Mr. Jones. "If I could understand everything in it, I would throw mine in the river, and go in for it. We can take nothing from it, we can add nothing to it. The plan of salvation as given by God is so simple that even a child can understand. Any man can understand enough to give his heart to God." The excuse that man must feel something, must be knocked down before he is saved was shattered into bits by Mr. Jones, when he declared that in order to feel that we are saved we must first give our hearts to God. We don't quench our thirst if we don't drink water. We drink the water, that quenches the thirst. We can't be saved unless we are winning to be saved. God will forgive our sins and save us if we go to Him and give Him our hearts.

Sunday will be the closing day of the revival services. The day will be featured by three sermons; morning sermon at 11 o'clock, subject: "Christ for Sale"; afternoon sermon, for men only, at 3 o'clock, subject: "Citizens of This World"; evening sermon, 7:30 o'clock, subject: "The Banquet of Death."

Special musical program will be rendered at all the services, under the direction of Prof. E. L. Wolslagel, soloist and musical director.

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**OUR SATURDAY NIGHT MEDITATION**

**Three Great Certainties**

Psalm 90:12: "So teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom."

There is one aspect of human life we usually avoid facing; yet it is really one of the most obvious of its aspects; that is, the uncertainty of it.

We do not, as a matter of fact, know from day to day what is going to happen. The strongest of us may, in a few hours, be fighting for our life.

Not one soul in Greenville knows what is waiting around the corner; what will happen at the next turning of the road.

No one has any idea of what the morrow will bring forth.

This uncertainty of life is one of its most bracing and ennobling features. Life is a great adventure. But it would be terribly disheartening, both for ourselves and for those we love, if in the midst of these uncertainties there were not some certainties.

I have often passed whitewashed trees on the side of the road; so whitewashed and arranged as to mark the path. It seems useless as one motors through the country in the summer sunshine, but in the darkness of a winter's night the value of these guide-marks is realized.

There are such guide posts planted down for us in our journey of life; fixed certainties in our uncertain existence.

And by the light which lighteth every man that cometh into the world, you may see them standing along the pilgrim road.

First of all, there is certainty of the Love of God.

That there must be some sort of a God, few will deny today. Blank atheism is absurd. Among men of thought it has gone out of fashion. Our more plausible and common proposition now is that we cannot know anything of this God.

Yet when you think of it, this is also absurd. Burbank and others, forget that we can know God, as we know each other, only through His manifestations.

We have never seen each other. Not one of us has

ever seen the man or woman next to us. You judge me by what you see me do, and hear me say. I know you, if I know you at all, by the look in your eyes, the smile on your face, the word on your lips. So, precisely, we know God.

Who put conscience in the heart of every man but a righteous God? Who planned the beauty of the sunrise and the glory of the sunset, but a God of beauty? Who gave the love of a mother for her child, but the God of love?

Yes; we know God through His manifestations, and in Jesus He is seen as the God of all grace and beauty and truth and love. The second certainty in this changing world is the ever growing and increasing certainty about Jesus Christ.

He stands not merely head and shoulders above the people of His day—but high above the best people of our own day.

After 1800 years of faith, and 100 years of criticism, Jesus stands unique. He—the Nazarene Carpenter—the mechanic of a lowly and despised Galilean village, is seen to hold the only solution of the tangled problems of our life today. Whether you believe Him to have been only a carpenter, or whether you believe of Glory and the Everlast-Him to have been the King-Son of the Father, you cannot deny that He teaches the only way to personal, national and international peace.

You do not need a Dictionary of Antiquities to understand Him. He is the only man who is modern nineteen hundred years after He spoke. He has a message for men today that "grips" them; and He is the great sign-post on our journey from time to eternity.

The third certainty I would mention is the certainty of life beyond the grave.

The general belief of all mankind, heathen as well as Christian; the testimony of the greatest thinkers in every age; the witness of the most notable scientists; all go to prove that this life is not all there is. If this life were all, God has made the supremest blunder of the ages; and our highest ideals and aspirations are but a mockery and a sham.

But God has not created us, and brought us up to our present position of hope, to frustrate our hopes. Jesus says "In my Father's house are many mansions—I go to prepare a place for you—Whoso believeth in me shall never die." And we believe Him, knowing full well that His assurance needs no verification.

With these three guide posts—God—Christ—Immortality—our prayer may well be "So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom."

"To number our days"—not by some secret science to discover when we shall die. Still less, to look upon death as a great enemy. No, death has been described as the sable slave who takes off the sandals of the wearied worker at the close of the day. We must, however, remember that our days are so many, and no more.

Under the heading liabilities for filing returns, a single person having a net income of \$1500 or over, or a married person having a net income of \$3500 or over.

Under the heading persons exemptions and credits, a single person is allowed an exemption of \$1500 instead of \$1000, and the head of a family or married person allowed an exemption of \$3500 instead of \$2500. Where the head of the family is married during the taxable year the exemption shall not exceed \$3500. The tax on the income for the first \$4000 is to be computed at five rate of 1 1/2 per cent instead of 2 per cent.

Special attention is called to the fact that any tax payer whose gross income is \$5000 or over is required to file a return regardless of his net income.

Partnership and domestic corporations are still required to make a return.

Partnerships and domestic corporations have been granted until May 15, to make their returns.

Revenue act of 1926 has now become a law and special attention is directed to the following changes in instructions which must be compiled with in making out a federal return for the cal-

having a net income during the taxable year of 1925 \$1000 or over if single, or if married and not living with husband or wife; or if resident or non-resident having a net income for the taxable year of \$2000 if married and living with husband or wife shall make a return.

The tax on the first \$2500 is to be computed at 1 1/4 per cent instead of 1 per cent.

Partnerships and corporations are required to make a return regardless of the amount of their net income.

## CABLE LETTER

London, Feb. 27.—(AP).—The Prince of Wales' latest accident in the hunting field, in which he suffered a broken collar bone, has proved to be one of those blessings that come in disguise, in the opinion of his physicians. They claim that it will tend to correct the slight droop in one of his shoulders which resulted from the breaking of the other collar bone in 1924. The droop was becoming quite noticeable.  
 The Prince has been caused very little inconvenience by this accident, and has been able to keep all of his appointments. It will be some time, however, before he will be able to dance or take part in most of his athletic pastimes.  
 England's first countess to sing before motion picture audiences has had a tremendous success. She is Catherine, Lady Westmoreland, who, under the name of Cathreen Morland, has been taking concert engagements in motion picture houses to raise money to assist several poor families in whom she has been interested for years.  
 Lady Westmoreland's most needy proteges are a farm laborer, his wife and six children whom she came to know when she and the late Earl had a home near Sittingbourne. Some years later there were financial reverses all around and when the Countess was pressed for cash to continue her charity work she took to the stage.  
 Americans living in London now number 6,700 and the number of Australians is approximately the same. The Canadian population is 5,000, and there are 4,700 South Africans and 1,760 New Zealanders in London.  
 Of the 147,000 foreign residents nearly one half are Russians and Poles. Three millions of the 4,500,000 living in London are London born. The French population numbers 13,500. There are 11,300 Italians and 8,800 Germans.  
 The little Scottish town of Carnoustie claims to be the greatest golf nursery in the world. During the last thirty years nearly 300 professions have left Carnoustie and of these 200 have found homes in the United States. At one time or another Carnoustie has provided practically every state in America with a golf champion, as well as supplying a champion of the United States, a champion of Australia and champion of South Africa.  
 Several Scottish professions and three amateur champions have also been taught the finer points of the game on the Carnoustie links.

Berlin, Feb. 27.—(AP).—Thirty department store owners and managers from various parts of Germany will sail shortly for the United States to study store management, especially what the Germans call "jazz band advertising."  
 Although the department store idea was imported from the United States by Herman Tietz, of Berlin, 25 years ago, the Germans still profess amazement over the vigorous advertising campaigns and artistic window displays used by the big stores in America.  
 The delegation plans to visit New York, Chicago, Philadelphia and Detroit.  
 Secretaries and other functionaries of the Russian embassy in Berlin are preparing for an orgy of banquets ordered by George Tchitcherin, the soviet foreign minister.  
 It has become known here that Tchitcherin, having recently admonished his diplomats to "devote more attention to their personal appearance" and not hesitate to consult the smartest tailors, has passed out the word that banquets are an effective background for diplomatic conversations.  
 The Russian embassies in Berlin, Prague and Warsaw especially have been designated to entertain the hated bourgeoisie library.  
 The amazement with which a woman automobile driver is regarded in Germany, women's organizations say, is owing to the fact that a person has to be a mechanic to obtain a permit to drive a car.  
 The motor vehicle law prescribes a written and an oral examination with two trial trips for all applicants for a driver's license. Many women and some once between a carburetor and a man who cannot tell the difference between a radiator and a radiator must take a two weeks' course in automobile mechanics before their application will be considered.  
 Women's clubs which are demanding a modification of the law declare that a mechanic is not necessarily a safe driver. They point to statistics for 1925 which show that with only 200,000 automobiles in Berlin, 143 persons were killed and 4,929 injured in 11,156 traffic accidents, a record which is said to be unsurpassed by any other city.  
 The tipping problem in German railway stations has been simplified by law. The legal rate station porters may expect in tips is about seven cents for carrying baggage weighing 55 pounds.

 The law requires porters or employes to explain the legal tipping rate to any traveler who asks the porter how much is expected.
